THE LEGACY OF RASHAAN WILLIS

On the most somber of occasions, a sea of navy blazers and khaki pants form a sad congregation to honor a fallen classmate. They pray for grace.

On March 2, 1997, without much warning, it rained and rained and rained. Over 10 inches of rain fell in 24 hours overcoming the locks on the Ohio River and the creeks that feed it. The "Flood of '97" took the lives of seven people, one of whom was **RaShaan Willis**, a junior at St. X. While coming home after a night with friends, less than a mile from his house, Shaan's car was swept away by rushing water that had crested the nearby creek in Charlie Vettiner Park. To get to safety, Shaan exited the car but was carried away.

Shaan Willis was a charismatic, baby-faced, Tar Heel-loving connector. He had a gift for making people feel appreciated and good about themselves. Shawn was energy. He was a ray of light. Shaan brought color to the muted hallways of St. X with a voice that could be heard coming from a mile away. "He never met a stranger. He never had a bad day," recalls Matt Kuerzi '98.

Shaan's death devastated the St. X community. Longtime friend Brian Logsdon '98 remembers struggling with the reality that one of his closest friends was suddenly gone. He recalls the support of St. X teachers Karen White, Joe Bergamini, Brother John Wills,

Tom Simms, and Mary (Keene) Jefferson. "They helped me get through one of the most difficult periods of my life."

While time can heal some wounds, it also becomes the measure of resolve. After Shaan's passing, his friends prayed for strength and promised to remember him. They kept their promise.

Beginning casually, on the first anniversary of Shaan's passing, Kuerzi, Logsdon, Bart Becker '98, and Trinity alumni Andy Hennessey and Jeremy Jarvi hosted a gathering of friends to tell stories about Shaan. After coming home from college, with guidance and exemplified strength from Shaan's parents, they decided that to truly honor their friend they should do what he would have done-make a positive impact. Logsdon recalls, "It felt natural to turn our remembering of Shaan into something that could help other people. When you think of Shaan and his family, you think of giving to others." His mother Marita Willis adds, "Shaan would always say, 'Mom, if you don't do it, who's going to do it?' Service was just part of his being."

In 2005, the five friends formalized the Team Shaan Foundation, a non-profit organization, with the mission of supporting local causes impacting the lives of children, something that mattered deeply to Shaan. Since then, Team Shaan has raised more than \$500,000 for over 30 local non-profits including Best Buddies Kentucky, Cabbage Patch Settlement House, Louisville Urban League, First Tee, Neighborhood House, and St. X. The RaShaan Willis Honorary '98 Scholarship Fund is the largest endowment at St. X that funds scholarships to promote diversity.

"Even though he didn't live a long life, I always want him to be remembered because he was a great kid. He loved to give back," says Bob Willis, Shaan's father. "For me to see the guys take this tragedy and create a positive out of it has been amazing."

Shaan continues to shed light. His lasting impact created a legacy of service that honors the man Shaan most certainly would have become and is a demonstration of his enduring grace in this world. To learn more, visit teamshaan.org.

FROM TIGER TO FIREFIGHTER

Bobby Cooper '94 has devoted his life to the community and helping those in need since graduating from St. X. While it has been several decades since his time on campus, he still has fond memories of his time there. Mary (Keene) Jefferson was his favorite teacher. Describing her, he said, "I was far from the perfect student, with little academic or extracurricular motivation and a lengthy disciplinary file. She recognized abilities and gifts in me that I could not. She subtly, but persistently, urged me not to waste them. Mrs. Jefferson eased teenage angst with confidence, warmth, and encouragement. She challenged me to be better." Cooper also acknowledged teachers

Tony Scheler, Mike Glaser, and Mike Stewart. Expressing an appreciation for the interest they took in his success and wellbeing while holding him accountable, he said, "The principles, life lessons, knowledge, and advice they shared still echo nearly 30 years later."

After St. X, Cooper graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1998 and then began working in the National Civilian Community Corps. He described it as "a full-time national service program that deploys teams throughout the United States to provide needed aid to our country's most compelling needs." Cooper's time there was the beginning of his journey to the Louisville Fire Department. As Cooper progressed in his career, he went on to complete his Master of Arts in Communication from Bellarmine University in 2018.

Promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in 2023, Cooper is an Assistant Chief for the Louisville Fire Department. His responsibilities include developing the budget, managing the department's procurement and purchasing process, and prioritizing spending. He analyzes data, mapping, and response schemes to improve emergency response. Additionally, Cooper manages and supervises the daily activities of the department's administrative support services, which includes information analysis, project management, the public information office, and facilities maintenance.

Cooper explained what he loves the most about his career with the Louisville Fire Department—the people. "I work with extraordinary men and women, and it's no fluke. LFD firefighters are well vetted before being hired, and they are thoroughly trained and tested as recruits. Throughout their careers they put the interest and well-being of the public over their own. I'm surrounded daily by incredibly competent and capable people who literally work to make the world a better place for complete strangers."

When he's not at work, Cooper spends time with his wife, Meredith, and their daughters, Whitney (15), Natalie (11), and Emily (9). In addition to running and traveling, he enjoys family trips and attending his kids' sporting events. He also makes time for his dogs—a German Shepherd named Rosie and a Boston Terrier named Bruce.

Reflecting on his career to date, Cooper provided a few words of wisdom. First, keep on learning! Second, find a career that you love because money isn't everything. Identify your passion and follow it. Lastly, life can get busy quickly, and it's important to make time for what's important to you. Develop a balance between work and personal life so that you can find your true purpose and be all you can for those around you.

FIVE-TIME BLUE RIBBON HONOREE



Saint Xavier High School was recognized as a National Blue Ribbon School of Excellence in 2023. Bestowed by the U.S. Department of Education, this is the fifth time St. X was named a recipient. The distinction as a National Blue Ribbon School was last awarded in 2016. We are one of three private high schools in the country and the only private high school in Kentucky to achieve this milestone five times.

"St. X is still carrying out the mission first established by the Xaverian Brothers when they founded our school 160 years ago: to engage young men in rigorous academic programs and extracurricular activities that

foster respect, honor, and service to God's world," said St. X Principal Amy Sample. "We continue to uphold that tradition every day by fostering an environment where all students are welcome and can receive an exemplary education."

St. X President Paul Colistra added, "The National Blue Ribbon School recognition is a testament to our entire St. X community and the work we are doing to support our students' success in their academic journeys."

Additionally, the U.S. Department of Education presented Principal Sample with the 2023 Terrel H. Bell Award for Outstanding School Leadership. She was one of nine principals in the country selected as a recipient.

Before Saint Xavier High School opened on the current Poplar Level Road campus, the property featured the chapel and Ryken House, which served as the Xaverian Brothers' residence for more than 70 years. After the Xaverian Brothers moved to Treyton Oak Towers in downtown Louisville in 2021, St. X purchased Ryken House from the religious order and immediately began planning for its use. The new Theodore James Ryken Hall opened its doors in October and serves as the main entrance for alumni. The building houses the Stuckert Engagement Center, Admissions Office, Ogden Counseling Center, President's Office, Institutional Advancement, and the Business Office. St. X sincerely thanks its generous benefactors for supporting the renovation of key space that serves both students and alumni.

During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, Saint Xavier remained within the parameters of the budget and finished the fiscal year securely in the black.

GREENS & GOLD - ST. X'S TIE TO MAJOR CHAMPIONSHIP GOLF

Jimmy Kirchdorfer '87 strolls between cubicles like he's walking down a fairway. In his Valhalla-logo shirt, he returns good morning nods and a few shout-outs. More than a few St. X grads working at their desks sit along his path. He is giving a tour of the downtown Louisville headquarters of ISCO Industries, home to 150 of nearly 800 employees around the world.

It's a business—a "sprinkler company," as he described its origins, started by his late father Jim '58 back in 1962, known then as Irrigation Supply Company, providing the infrastructure to hydrate golf courses -- now thriving as a global pipe innovator for moving all kinds of materials. Jimmy joined the business upon graduating from college, first in sales, then becoming president in 2000, and is currently the chairman and CEO. Along with his brother Mark '91 as president, Jimmy has parlayed ISCO's successes into an iconic force in the Louisville community, including Jimmy's induction into the Kentucky Entrepreneur Hall of Fame in November.

"You have to make it very people-centered," Jimmy says, "and part of our culture is to have fun."

Without question, the underlying theme at his workplace is golf. Putters lean against the walls, a cluster of Titleists always nearby. Jimmy grew up hacking around Crescent Hill Golf Course, next to his St. Leonard neighborhood. He later was part of St. X's state championship golf team in 1987. But his golf career was just beginning. Playing the sport, like running his business, he is always looking to improve.

"Every golf round could have been better, or it could have been worse. That's the way business is," Jimmy says. "We're not perfect, but we can always do better . . . golf is a never-ending pursuit of perfection. I can be a better boss. Golf taught me that."

Jimmy has teed it up for this staff, too. ISCO is consistently listed among the Best Places to Work in Kentucky, voted by its employees more than 10 times, according to the state's chamber of commerce. "I'm really proud of that," he admits.

Jimmy is taking aim at finding the next champion. His company sponsors several touring professionals in the minor leagues of the PGA. You may have seen the Team ISCO logo displayed on the shirts of these prospective stars. The move is not to necessarily add more

ISCO customers but to provide financial support to golfers familiar to him. "I don't sponsor guys unless I know them really well," says Jimmy, who counts Cooper Musselman '13 and Stephen Stallings, Jr. '13, competing on the Korn Ferry tour, as his protégés. "I track these guys as if I have a stable of thoroughbreds."

Another chance to make golf more affordable to a younger generation locally is ISCO's dedication to Youth On Course, a national program that subsidizes greens fees for kids around the country, including 59 courses in Kentucky. Youngsters pay \$5 to play a round of golf, while the YOC program covers the remaining fee. "If I had to pay \$20 per round back in the day, I don't think I would have played much as a kid," Jimmy says.

What's as exciting as making a 30-foot birdie putt is Jimmy's latest endeavor. In 2022, he and his partners, including Cooper's dad Ches Musselman '81, purchased the prestigious Valhalla Golf Club. "We wanted to make sure it stayed in local hands," Jimmy claims, as he counts down the days when it hosts the 2024 PGA Championship in May, the fourth time this major has been held there. He's the chairman of the tournament committee and eager to witness another epic week.

"Everyone remembers Tiger (Woods) beating Bob May, Rory (McElroy) winning in the dark, the Ryder Cup in '08," Jimmy says, confident that future majors will be played there. "This community loves major championship golf . . . and we're all rooting for JT (Justin Thomas '11)."

His chairman duties dominate his time these days. Changes around the Valhalla property will exude a Kentucky flavor. "We have a lot of out-of-town folks who play this course, and we want them to know where they are," Jimmy says, describing a plan for white picket fences, exposed limestone rock, and a pasture of horses grazing near its entrance.

Back in his corner ISCO office, among the plaques, signed memorabilia, and unique bourbon bottles sits his most prized display—a glass-encased *Courier-Journal* photo from 1972 of his dad, part of a five-generation legacy at St. X, hunched over three-year-old Jimmy in what could have been one of his first putting lessons. "A memory forever," Jimmy says. "I feel so fortunate that my father made the sacrifice to send me to St. X, which led me to understand the values it created."

Xaverian Brothers Laid to Rest



We mourn the loss of two beloved men who devoted their entire lives to religious ministry. **Brother Rodney** Sulzer, C.F.X. '56

and Brother Cornelius Hubbuch, C.F.X. '54 died

November 8 and December 2, 2023, respectively.

Brother Rodney, formerly Brother Pierce, taught at Flaget High School and at schools in New York and Maryland, even serving as principal of Mount Saint Joseph in Baltimore. From the 1990s until his retirement in 2008, Brother Rodney engaged in retreat work and was Director of St. X's Ryken House as well as a Xaverian community in Florida.

Brother Cornie, known by classmates as Buddy, served as an educator in New York and Maryland between 1960 and 1976. He held leadership positions with the Xaverian Congregation, including Provincial of the American Xaverian Central Province until 1982, and Vicar General from 1989 to 2001. Brother Cornie taught at Xaverian schools in Africa and supported mission work in Bolivia and Haiti. He retired to St. X's Ryken House in 2014, and he remained engaged with the school community until his death.

Byrd Lands in Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame

In July, All-American and MLB All-Star Paul Byrd '88 was inducted into Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. The former LSU pitcher and College World Series champion tallied 31 wins against 11 losses, seven complete games, two saves, and two shutouts in his three seasons. Paul passed up a 13th-round draft pick after St. X. The Cleveland Indians selected him in the fourth round of the 1991 MLB draft. Paul spent 14 years in the big leagues (1995–2009), and he was inducted into St. X's Alumni Hall of Honors in 2010.

Paul became a best-selling author with his book FreeByrd: The Power of a Liberated Life. In 2013, he began his next career. In Paul's 10 years broadcasting for the Atlanta Braves, primarily as a sideline reporter and color commentator, he earned three Emmy Awards.

Paul and his wife, Kym, are cofounders of Byrdhouse Ministries.
