



- 4. Prepare





- Dates: June 3-July 12 (No classes July 4 & 5)
- Times: 7:45-10:00 am and/or 10:10 am-12:25 pm
- Classes offered:
  - Credit: US History (sem. 1); Computer Applications 1; PE 9 OR Wellness
    - Students can take a max of one PE/health course
    - Students can take a max of two summer school courses total
  - Non-credit: Enrichment
- Sign-up procedure:
  - First come, first served classes typically fill
  - Online registration begins April 12, 2024 (TBD)
  - Indicating interest in summer school on your course selection sheet does NOT sign you up - you must still go through the summer school sign up process

### Registering for Classes ONLINE

- Use the directions on the back to enter course requests online
- Log into <u>student</u> PowerSchool account with <u>student's</u> ID and password
- Follow directions on back of sheet & on screen to enter requests
  - O Do not enter study halls, alternates, or summer school interests

- 5. Follow the on-screen instructions to sign up for each of your classes.
  - a) Click on the edit button to open each subject area to select your courses.




- a) Enter all of your course requests in one session.
- b) When signing up for a year-long class, be sure to select BOTH semesters.
- c) You must select a minimum of 7 "Credit Hours" (see bottom of screen).
- d) Green check marks vindicate you are done with a section.
- e) Red exclamation points indicate you are not done.
- f) Look at all pages of each subject (1, 2, 3 pages for some subjects).
- g) You do not need to click a course to request a study hall/commons or your summer school interests.
- 6. CLICK SUBMIT to save your requests!

### Registering for Classes

- Remember semester- vs. year-long classes
- Freshmen must sign up for at least 7 classes each semester
  - Study halls are encouraged
- Rank elective course choices
- Check course prerequisites
- Check math placement (Pg. 34)
- Consider Honors Diploma options (Pg. 5)



### Points to Remember

- Students who do not return their course selection sheets will have a schedule built for them
- The master schedule is student driven:
  - Will be built after course requests have been entered in the computer
  - Will determine what classes will be offered for the 24-25 school year
  - A class you register for now may not be offered based on low numbers

### Schedule Changes

- Schedule changes will only be allowed for:
  - Students who do not have enough credits
  - Students who do not have the necessary prerequisite
  - Students who have scheduling conflicts with requested courses
  - Mistakes in scheduling

## High School Academics

This handout explains what we just talked about on the transcripts, but gives you a copy for home.

Reminder: Onalaska Middle School calculates GPA in a slightly different way, but your class rank still compares you and your peers based on the OMS cumulative GPA.

#### Where Does My GPA Come From F

<u>Quarter Grades</u>: Every quarter you receive a report card with grades. Quarter report cards do indicate a *quarter* Grade Point Average (GPA), but this along with the quarter grades should be viewed as a report on progress towards semester grades.

<u>Semester Grades:</u> Every semester your first & second (or third & fourth) quarter grades are averaged with your final semester test score to create a semester grade. Semester grades are used to award credit for passing classes and create a cumulative GPA.

<u>Cumulative Grade Point Average</u>: Your cumulative GPA is (re)calculated every semester based on the average of all of your semester grades throughout your high school career (this includes middle school Geometry, Algebra 2 and summer school session grades just before the freshman year).

<u>Class Rank</u>: Your cumulative GPA will show up on your high school transcript and determines your class rank, which compares all students' GPA's in your grade. The student ranked #1 in the class would have the highest GPA, and the student with the lowest GPA would be ranked at about 220 (depending on class size).

The following are the points assigned to each grade earned in high school used to calculate a GPA:

<u>Weighted Grades:</u> Some schools award more grade points for honors or AP courses (eg, earn a 5.0 for an A in my honors class). Onalaska High School does not weight grades. There was a time when we did, however the negative effects of this practice on students outweighed the benefits.

Onalaska High School puts great emphasis on students developing, modifying and following an Academic and Career Plan (ACP) to help specifically prepare for career and college options after high school. Students who follow an outline of rigorous (honors) courses, and perform at a high level can be eligible for one of three honors diploma recognitions (see our Course Description Book).

#### How to Get Good Grades in High School & Advice from OHS Seniors

#### Step One: Believe in Yourself

- Prepare for sabotage by identifying anything that could interrupt or ruin your stud and figure out how to avoid it

#### Step Four: Be Successful in Class

- Be in school, on time, every day. When you miss school, you miss lectures notes quizzes, and tests. Communicate with teachers when you miss class
- Learn how to adapt to different teachers. Part of your education is to learn how to personalities and teaching styles. Plus it will help you adapt to different superviso
- . Be prepared for each class by bringing books, paper, pencils, etc. You will also nee





## Preparing For Your Future



#### **Preparing for your Future**

- It's not too early to start thinking about college, career or military interests.
  If you have any questions, ask friends, a teacher, or your school counselor.
- Talk to your child about his or her interests and help match those interests with a college major and career.
- Help your child develop good study habits, such as finishing all work before going on social media or playing video games.



- Keep an eye on your child's grades, and help him or her find tutoring assistance, if necessary.
- Encourage your child to take challenging classes in core academic subjects including Advanced Placement classes where they can earn college credit by taking the AP exam. In addition, some colleges require two years of world language for admission.
- Keep a list of awards, honors, extracurricular activities, and paid or volunteer work.

#### How to plan for college costs

- Use FAFSA4coster to find out how much federal student aid your child might receive. This information will help you plan ahead. (https://fafsa.ed.gov/spa/fafsa4c)
- Save for your child's college education. If you have not opened a savings
  account, learn about the tax advantages of saving through the Wisconsin EdVest
  529 plan (edvest.com)


