



# ARP ESSER Health and Safety Plan Guidance & Template

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Section 2001(i)(1) of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires each local education agency (LEA) that receives funding under the ARP Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website a *Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan*, hereinafter referred to as a *Health and Safety Plan*.

Based on ARP requirements, 90 percent of ARP ESSER funds will be distributed to school districts and charter schools based on their relative share of Title I-A funding in FY 2020-2021. **Given Federally required timelines, LEAs eligible to apply for and receive this portion of the ARP ESSER funding must submit a Health and Safety Plan that meets ARP Act requirements to the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) by Friday, July 30, 2021, regardless of when the LEA submits its ARP ESSER application.**

Each LEA must create a Health and Safety Plan that addresses how it will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff, and which will serve as local guidelines for all instructional and non-instructional school activities during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. The Health and Safety Plan should be tailored to the unique needs of each LEA and its schools and must take into account public comment related to the development of, and subsequent revisions to, the Health and Safety Plan.

The ARP Act and U.S. Department of Education rules require Health and Safety plans include the following components:

1. How the LEA will, to the greatest extent practicable, implement prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning;
2. How the LEA will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social,

emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services;

3. How the LEA will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff and the extent to which it has adopted policies, and a description of any such policy on each of the following safety recommendations established by the CDC:
  - a. Universal and correct wearing of [masks](#);
  - b. Modifying facilities to allow for [physical distancing](#) (e.g., use of cohorts/podding);
  - c. [Handwashing and respiratory etiquette](#);
  - d. [Cleaning](#) and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving [ventilation](#);
  - e. [Contact tracing](#) in combination with [isolation](#) and [quarantine](#), in collaboration with State and local health departments;
  - f. [Diagnostic](#) and screening testing;
  - g. Efforts to provide COVID-19 [vaccinations to school communities](#);
  - h. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies; and
  - i. Coordination with state and local health officials.

The LEA's Health and Safety Plan must be approved by its governing body and posted on the LEA's publicly available website by July 30, 2021.\* The ARP Act requires LEAs to post their Health and Safety Plans online in a language that parents/caregivers can understand, or, if it is not practicable to provide written translations to an individual with limited English proficiency, be orally translated. The plan also must be provided in an alternative format accessible, upon request, by a parent who is an individual with a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Each LEA will upload in the eGrants system its updated Health and Safety Plan and webpage URL where the plan is located on the LEA's publicly available website.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to review their Health and Safety Plans at least every six months during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. LEAs also must review and update their plans whenever there are significant changes to the CDC recommendations for K-12 schools. Like the development of the plan, all revisions must be informed by community input and reviewed and approved by the governing body prior to posting on the LEA's publicly available website.

LEAs may use the template to revise their current Health and Safety Plans to meet ARP requirements and ensure all stakeholders are fully informed of the LEA's plan to safely resume instructional and non-instructional school activities, including in-person learning, for the current school year. An LEA may use a different plan template or format provided it includes all the elements required by the ARP Act, as listed above.

\* The July 30 deadline applies only to school districts and charter schools that received federal Title I-A funds in FY 2020-2021 and intend to apply for and receive ARP ESSER funding.

## Health and Safety Plan Summary: **Northgate School District**

1. How will the LEA, to the greatest extent practicable, support prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the CDC for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning?

Northgate School District will support prevention and mitigation policies in accordance with CDC guidelines by addressing:

### **Cleaning, Sanitizing, Disinfecting, and Ventilation**

While there is no way to completely mitigate the risk of COVID-19, the district will put in place procedures designed to reduce the risk of transmission. A detailed plan for cleaning and sanitizing buildings was created specifying routes, procedures, times and the person responsible for each area. Particular attention will be given to increased daily cleaning and sanitizing of all buildings and spaces with EPA-approved disinfectants, paying special attention to high-traffic areas including restrooms and hallways, and frequently-touched surfaces such as desks and doorknobs .

The custodial/maintenance staff received training prior to the start of the 2020-21 school year on cleaning, sanitizing, and disinfecting. This was provided by Buckeye International. During the school year, custodial supervisors will do random checks on a weekly basis to ensure cleaning/disinfecting is occurring per the district plan and to identify any issues.

Administration and faculty have received training on cleaning, sanitizing, disinfecting and proper hygiene procedures. Time will be scheduled throughout the day for hand washing and sanitizing. In classrooms, teachers will wipe down student areas with antibacterial wipes. This will occur throughout the day. Students will be provided with a set of needed classroom materials as no sharing will be permitted. Wall-mounted hand sanitizer units will be available in all learning spaces.

Where possible, interior doors and exterior windows will be left open to increase ventilation. Due to safety, all exterior doors will remain closed and locked. School buses and vans will be cleaned and sanitized frequently and no less than once daily when in use for the school year. All ventilation systems have been inspected by the district's HVAC contractor and any needed equipment repairs/replacements have been completed.

The Facility Manager will maintain regular contact with the custodians to identify any issues or additional needed supports.

### **Social Distancing and Other Safety Protocols**

When in classroom spaces, students will be seated at individual desks where they will maintain their own supplies.

PE classes and recess will be held outside weather permitting.

Wall-mounted hand sanitizer units have been placed in every learning space. At the elementary level, time will be built into the schedule for hand washing.

### **Monitoring Student and Staff Health**

The school nurse will monitor students and staff for symptoms and history of exposure

Staff will be expected to perform self monitoring at home prior to entering school. If a staff member has any Covid-19 related symptoms, he/she should notify the CSN and stay home.

If a student verbalizes any signs and symptoms of Covid-19, the student should be sent to the school nurse.

Isolating or quarantining students, staff, or visitors if they become sick or demonstrate a history of exposure will be based on the state health official and Allegheny County Department of Health recommendations.

Isolation Plans/Dedicated Space: a space will be dedicated for students who may need to be quarantined, taking into consideration sensory needs, supervision by personnel familiar with the student and appropriate ventilation

Returning isolated or quarantined staff, students, or visitors to the school will be based on state health officials and Allegheny County Department of Health recommendations as well as CDC Guidelines.

Any changes or modifications to the plan or school year will be communicated to all stakeholders via multiple methods of communication including robo calls, letters home, district website or social media.

The district contracts transportation through Roenigk. Below are the guidelines followed by the drivers:

Drivers will be required to sign an affidavit once at the start of the school year, stating that by coming to work they affirm that they do not have any symptoms and by checking out daily remain symptom free.

Drivers and students will be required to wear masks and follow all CDC guidelines any time specific mandates are put in place. These guidelines can be either Federal, State, Local or District mandates.

### **Other Considerations for Students and Staff**

Masking is no longer required in the Northgate School District but students and staff are strongly encouraged to wear masks when the county is experiencing high transmission rates. However, the Superintendent reserves the right to return to masking in response to outbreaks in the buildings. This decision will be made in consultation with the school nurses and Allegheny Health Department.

The Northgate School District has resumed normal in-person operations. Should conditions change and a closure becomes necessary, the district will revert back to our previous plan outlined below utilizing a virtual or hybrid model to continue providing services.

Using the MTSS framework being presented by PDE in the ESSA Plan as a district/school-wide improvement model, Northgate will support the following objectives using initiatives outlined below:

- \*Implement a well-rounded program of instruction for academic needs of all students.
- \*Curriculum infrastructure based on the principles of UbD.
- \*Assessment system to track standards-aligned student learning outcomes longitudinally.
- \*Alignment of professional learning goals with expected shifts in pedagogy toward culturally responsive, cross-curricular learning.
- \*Identify students at risk for academic failure utilizing the MTSS framework
- \*Early Literacy Framework that provides skills-based data on student learning progressions to intervention teams.
- \*Provide additional assistance to students who need help in meeting PA Academic Standards.



\*Deployment of intervention teams at the elementary and secondary levels that will be charged with remediating content and skills gaps identified in students.

\*Implement instructional and other strategies to strengthen academic programs and improve school conditions for learning.

These frameworks and initiatives will be supported through School-wide Positive Behavioral Instructional Supports (PBIS) that also emphasize school safety and positive behavior. Impact of programming will be identified via PBIS surveys.

Beginning in the 2021-2022 school year, Northgate will be implementing the Chill Project, Pre-K to Grade 12 in all District buildings. Through Allegheny Health Network, the intent is to address mental health, social pressures and anxiety impact of COVID-19. This program is accessible to students, families and staff and includes the following components:

One-to-one counseling

Support groups

Medication management

School-Based Outpatient Services

School-Wide Preventive Services

Professional Development Opportunities

A social-emotional curriculum and classroom consultations

School Community access and support

The program provides a Licensed Clinician and Behavior Educator in each building. School counselors also provide support via meetings with students and parents/guardians, email, phone call check-ins, zoom meetings/video chats as necessary, announcements (schedule appointments, study tips, mindfulness ideas), parent resources, and career readiness services.

Vaccination proved successful for staff that wanted to be vaccinated.</p> <p>Northgate students had an opportunity to be vaccinated through partnerships with local health agencies. Should a need continue for vaccine clinics the district will continue to partner with local agencies to provide them.</p> <p>-Communication was conducted via email blasts, and website.
