KING COUNTY PROMISE HOSTS THEIR YEAR 2 LAUNCH CONVENING

As we embarked on Year 2 of the <u>King County Promise</u>, we took a moment earlier this October to celebrate the collective achievements and milestones we've reached in partnership with our seven Promise Partner Organizations. The launch included relationship-building, cross-partner learning, and discussions about collective decision-making, all to strengthen our collaborative efforts.

In the first year of implementation, our Promise Partners collectively served over 220 students, providing advising and financial support on their journeys to higher education. Both partnerships experienced high rates of FAFSA completion and overall engagement. Students attending partner colleges received equity stipends to help cover unexpected expenses.

In Year 2, the King County Promise is co-developing a youth voice strategy in collaboration with our partners. This model will serve as a robust framework to integrate student voice into promise programming. By doing so, we aim to empower our students, ensuring that their voices are centered and their unique perspectives are valued. We look forward to sharing more progress on this in the future.



Why Washingtonians value credentials but aren't completing them

Washington's job market continues to deliver – our state has added more than 500,000 jobs since the pandemic's peak, with another 500,000 expected by 2030. But there's a problem: employers are facing an exceptionally tight labor market, with the skills they need are increasingly outpacing workforce capabilities.

At the same time, fewer students are showing up in postsecondary programs that offer the education and training that can launch Washingtonians into career opportunities and success. How can our state ensure more residents gain the skills and knowledge the economy needs?


WHITE SWAN HIGH SCHOOL: NADYA'S JOURNEY


The High School and Beyond Plan helps students explore their options after high school.
