Students & Teachers Serve in Guatemala

On Saturday, January 13, 17 students and leaders traveled to Guatemala City. They went to a foster care facility called Casa Aleluya. The leaders of the team that traveled to

Guatemala over Expo Week included Dawn Shute, Seth Holler, and an ECS alumna and mom, Kim Benson. Mike and Dottie Clark founded the organization in 1989. It was established more than 30 years ago by US missionaries to provide a safe place for children in impoverished or abusive circumstances, and all of their needs are generously provided by donations of supplies,

volunteers like our ECS team, and other resources.

There is also an establishment called Casa Antony for children who receive dialysis due to



Guatemala's high rates of kidney failure. The purpose of the team's visit was to demonstrate what healthy, loving relationships look like between young people and adults through the love of Christ! The team had the opportunity to assist in classes and to provide activities such games, bracelet-making, as water balloon fights, soccer, basketball, volleyball, and more. All of the children live in different dorms according to gender and age. On Sunday, the leaders and students worshipped together in their church.

Additionally, the team visited the city of Antigua for shopping and sightseeing (Antigua is the former capital of Guatemala, but was destroyed by an earthquake in 1717.)

The team also worked with Hilmar Avila and his ministry

called Ministerio Senderos de Luz Guatemala, which ministers to people in very marginalized communities. This ministry provides vocational training in sewing, cooking, painting, and carpentry, along with English classes and classes for preschoolers. They bought school supplies, packed 40 backpacks, and drove to a small community on the outskirts of Milpa. They then went house to house visiting and praying with families. Then, they distributed backpacks to 40 preschool and elementary-age children.

This trip was such a fun and eye-opening experience for our ECS team, and they are excited to have left sharing the love of Christ and carrying the love of our ECS family across the globe!

In case you missed it, last year was a triumphant win for all things movies. What felt like the first true return to life since COVID, 2023 saw the release of box office hits, cinematic masterpieces, and movies accessible all for ages. One particular movie, which was released back in June, will be the focus of today's review: Past Lives. Directed by Celine Song (her directorial starring debut) and Greta Lee, Teo Yoo, and John Magaro, Past Lives is a story all about what happens when you
