

## DISCOVERY TO HOST YOUNG LOCAL AUTHOR AND ENVIRONMENTAL ACTIVIST SAWYER ANDERSON

A young local author will visit Discovery Middle School on Tuesday and will show the students that despite their age, young people can make a huge impact on lives around the world.

On Thursday, February 9, Karlie Kerr's students at Discovery Middle School along with their mentors from the school's peer mentor program, will welcome 13-year-old Fargo native Sawyer Anderson, author and illustrator of the book "Water Works" and recipient of a 2022 International Young Eco-Hero Award, to present and read to the class.

During the visit, Anderson will read her book, "Water Works," to the students in class. She will then show examples of how water is transported from bodies of water to homes. At the end of the visit, she will provide each student a copy of her book. Funding for these books was provided by community sponsors.

After her father returned from a mission trip to Zambia and told her about the struggles many families in Africa face obtaining clean and usable water, the then-10-year-old Anderson was determined to help. In order to raise money to help individuals access clean water, Anderson started by selling her grandma's cookies at a garage sale. She aimed to raise \$50, the total required to provide clean water to one individual for life, but she far overshot that goal and was inspired to think bigger.

Wanting to do even more, Anderson wrote and illustrated the children's book "Water Works" in 2019. The book illustrates the challenges African villagers face in procuring clean water and to raise more money for additional wells. Proceeds from the sale of each book are matched by donors and secure clean drinking water for one person for their entire life.

Anderson's charity project has raised more than \$1 million in donations to build 72 wells and save more than 22,000 lives.
