

Happy March fourth grade families! With spring just around the corner, the fourth grade classes are buzzing with excitement for all of the marvelous adventures March has in store. To kick off this month's festivities, all of the fourth grade classes are looking for-



For this month's learning, all of the fourth grade classes are reading *Because of Winn-Dixie*, by Kate DiCamillo, in ELA. This heartwarming tale follows a young girl named Opal who forms unlikely friendships in a small town with the help of a lovable stray dog named Winn-Dixie. Throughout their adventures together, Opal learns about love, forgiveness, and the power of belonging. In math, we are continuing to work with fractions in Module 5 as everyone begins to add and subtract mixed numbers. Up next, Module 4! All of the classes are also wrapping up their learning on Native Americans in social studies, and transitioning back to science for "A Walk In the Park." In this unit, students will learn about the internal and external structures of plants. They will also learn how animals use their senses to take information from their surroundings and process this information.

Thank you to the LADSBS School Improvement Team for always working hard to create new and exciting events for our students and families. Last month, we hosted a "Math Escape Room" for our fourth graders. Students had a wonderful evening exploring the building at night during a scavenger hunt and trying

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Third Grade Thoughts...

It is hard to believe that March is already here! March is a busy and exciting month for third grade. We have begun to work on Fractions in Math and will be spending the month exploring the ins and outs of fractions and comparing them. In Science, we are learning all about Forces and how they affect our world.



We are doing a lot of exciting experiments exploring Forces. We are deep into our HMH reading program and have just finished up a non-fiction unit on historic places, documents and symbols of our nation, which goes well with our Social Studies unit we just finished up on our Government. Next, we will be exploring Stories and Plays, which should be very interactive and exciting for our students. We are also continuing to produce various writing pieces to add to our end of the year writing portfolio.

This year we will be participating in our School Wide March Madness Reading Contest and are very excited to see which books make the final cut! On March 14th, we will be having our evening family event,

With the start of a new year, our fifth grade students are off and running in their last year of elementary school. They are learning and growing everyday and we are so proud of how much progress our students have made thus far. It is exciting to think that our fifth grade students will continue to grow until the end of the school year.

February brought a lot of fun at LADSBS. The students celebrated P.S. I Love You Day and decorated classroom doors with their classmates to continue to promote kindness and anti-bullying. A novel study that some fifth grade classes have started in February is *Hatchet*, by Gary Paulsen. This novel study is important because students will be learning about literary devices, high level vocabulary and inferencing, and how to use your resources around you if you need to.



In Math, the fifth grade students are working on Module 4: Multiplication and Division of Fractions and Decimal Fractions. In Social Studies, students have been learning about the Age of Exploration, Early Explorers, and the Columbian Exchange, as well as Geography and Government. In Science, students have worked in the unit Properties of Matter. We will be beginning a new Science unit entitled "Got Water?" where students will explore interactions between Earth's systems.



Our fifth graders have had the opportunity to interact with exceptional student-athletes, who champion good sportsmanship, decision-making, and authentic conversations as a part of MPHS "Athletes Helping Athletes" Program. Last month was their second visit to our fifth grade classrooms, and they were awesome! They know how to connect with our fifth graders through the use of games and role-playing. - Wear a Bicycle Helmet. Everyone at every age, should wear bicycle helmets while riding.
- Adjust your Bicycle to Fit. Be sure that your seat and handlebar are adjusted to the proper height and fit before riding.

Fraction Fun!

Did you know that fractions are part of our every day life? Everyone uses fractions at some point during their day from pouring milk into your cereal in the morning to paying for something at the store, fractions are all around us! Here are some fun ways to use fractions at home:

Supermarket Fraction Hunt:

When walking around the grocery store look around and see how many different fractions you can make. For example, two-fifths of the apple bins are red, two-fifths are green, and one-fifth is yellow.

Get Cooking:

Fractions are a huge part of cooking. Take out those measuring cups and spoons and follow a recipe. Want even more of a challenge? Double or triple the recipe and share what you make with your family and friends.

Fraction Hopscotch:

Draw a hopscotch board and label the squares with fractions. Throw a rock to a spot and name and equivalent fraction before jumping.
