Miller Place Students Excel at Long Island Regional Trade Show and Business Plan Competition

Students taking Mr. Thomas Frank's Virtual Enterprise class at Miller Place High School know a thing or two about business. So when 39 of them were invited to the Long Island Regional Trade Show and Business Plan Competition, asked to set up a business plan to sell their products, and pitch a business idea to angel investors, they knew they would do well.

In fact, they excelled! Multiple students presented business plans at the trade show.

- Lindsey Galligan and Grace Flammia presented their Fits4Fans, a celebrity-inspired clothing line that boosts the confidence and styles of their customers. Lindsey and Grace placed gold in multiple categories, saw 90 sales transactions, and generated over \$100,000 in sales.
- Jake Ryan and Lucas Damon ran Memory Lane Toy Co., a retro toy store that sold rare and exclusive toys from across past generations. Their toy firm placed gold in the category of "Booth Design," and silver multiple categories, ultimately generating over \$170,000 in sales.



John Leen and Samuel Cangelosi ran Technology LLC AI
 Aid, a company which sought to assist individuals through the
 implication of artificial intelligence. They placed gold in the
 category of "LI Regional Trade Show Best Booth Competition"
 and silver in "LI Regional Sales Pitch Competition." The
 company brought in \$105,609 in sales.

Of course, in addition to rolling out our five-year Strategic Plan, there were many other exciting things happening around the District these last few months.

- A sensory hallway has been created at AMPS. Sensory spaces were developed to support students who need help with sensory deficits and sensory sensitivity. It also provides needed movement breaks for all students.
- Laddie A. Decker Sound Beach School fourth-grade classes learned all about energy in science. After learning about how energy can transfer from one form to another, each class began designing their own solar ovens in groups. In this hands-on activity, the students observed solar energy from the sun being transformed into thermal energy by heating up their ovens.
- Nine Miller Place High School students, along with music teacher Pat Isenberg, traveled to Europe with the American Music Abroad program for 16 days this summer. Traveling to six countries and performing six concerts, the students learned a great deal about other cultures and shared the experience alongside over 200 other high school musicians from Pennsylvania, New York and New Jersey.
- Professor Tate from Syracuse University's Project Advance was invited to speak to college forensics students. Drawing from his experience at the Onondaga County, NY crime lab as a latent fingerprint examiner, he discussed the intricacies of latent fingerprints.
- At MPHS, nine students' artwork will be displayed at the 2023
 Suffolk County Community College High School Art Exhibition.
 Our students did a great job representing our District and the Art
 Department at this exhibition. Maya Murphy (10th grade) was awarded
 the first-place award at the Suffolk County Community College High
 School Art Exhibition for her sculpture *Noise*. Maya's sculpture was
 chosen as the first place winner by the faculty of the SCCC Art
 Department.
- MPHS students had the exciting opportunity to participate in the American Mathematics Competition (AMC). Participation in the AMC is not only a chance to engage with complex mathematical concepts but also serves as the starting point for a series of contests that leads to the International Mathematical Olympiad for top scorers.

■ Secondary students were recognized for academic excellence with their induction into three different honor societies. Miller Place High School and North Country Road Middle School honored students for their overall academic excellence and their induction into national honor societies. Our most decorated music students were inducted into the Tri-M Music Honor Society.

■ Field Trips

Seventh grade students participated in an annual field trip dedicated to measuring the health of our local shoreline ecosystem. The classroom moved to Cedar Beach and Sadderly Landing to take samples of the water quality and collect some specimens from the shore using a process called seining, which uses a net to safely collect sea life.

AP Biology students visited Stony Brook University for a hands-on Bacterial Transformation Lab, a key part of their curriculum. Students injected plasmids into bacteria, altering DNA to showcase traits like glowing green or red, and mirroring techniques used in biotech industries such as insulin production. It was a display of real-world science applications in action!

AMPS HONORS DR. KING

In honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, Andrew Muller Primary School students spent Friday, January 12th involved in educational activities that encouraged and taught peace and kindness. Students were welcomed by their teachers with a personal greeting chosen from the greeting menu. During morning meetings, classes discussed kindness as well as how Dr. King wanted all people to have equal rights and to be treated fairly based on the kind of person they were, not what they looked like.

Discussions were held about how kindness starts with caring about others. For a writing activity, students wrote about why a classmate is kind on a colored heart that was then turned into grade-level rainbows, hung in the school for all to see. Each grade level additionally conducted age-appropriate science experiments that celebrated unity. For example,



kindergarteners examined how brown eggs and white eggs look different on the outside, but are the same on the inside. In first grade, students discussed the same topic using green and red apples, while second graders used carnations and food coloring dye.

The day ended with the entire school coming together to sing "You Can Count On Me." Thank you to the members of the SIT Committee for organizing this wonderful day, and to music teacher Ms. Rowburey for her invaluable help with the singing performance.

LADSBS SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT TEAM ANNOUNCES NEW CHALLENGE THAT HELPS STUDENTS EXPLORE THE INCREDIBLE WORLD OF LITERATURE

The Laddie A. Decker Sound Beach School recently launched The Million Word Challenge, a fun and engrossing program that encourages students to explore literature. A voluntary program open to all students, the Million Word Challenge began on December 15th, 2023 and will run until March 1st, 2024.

Here's how the reading challenge works: Each participating student is encouraged to complete a reading log once they finish reading a book. The reading log will be used to record the titles of the books they read, the number of words in the book (using wordcounters.com), and a brief review. Once a book is logged, the word count will be tallied and added to the class's total. To

motivate our students, we will be offering incentives for the class that reaches 1 million words first. All classes and their progress will be displayed on a large bulletin board outside of the main office.

At the end of the challenge, we will organize a special reading celebration to honor the achievements of all of our students. We believe that the Million Word Challenge may not only help our students become better readers, but also encourage a lifelong love for reading. The love of reading is one of the most valuable gifts we can give our students, and this challenge is designed to support that goal!
