Class expectations:

There are three basic expectations for this class:

- ★ Be respectful: Use kind words, respect others' opinions, wait your turn, and keep your hands, feet, and objects to yourself.
- ★ Be productive: Be in your seat by the time the late bell rings, follow directions, put away distracting devices, and tend to personal grooming outside of class.
- ★ Be responsible: Do your own work, keep your area clean, turn work in on time, and be accountable for your words and actions.

Grading policies:

Each standard/objective will receive two grades:

- 1. Artifacts: These are assignments completed throughout instructional units to determine if a student has demonstrated proficiency. Students will need to demonstrate at least a basic understanding of the material to move forward. Artifacts are worth 30% of quarterly grades.
- 2. **Mastery:** These may be tests or projects and will be completed at the end of each unit to demonstrate proficiency on all standards within the unit. Mastery assessments are worth 70% of quarterly grades.

Late work:

Meeting deadlines is a skill that will help students in middle school and beyond. NWPMS encourages students to turn in work by the assigned due date. When that is not possible, late work will be accepted with the following conditions:

- Work turned in more than one day late may not be included in a student's grade depending on its current relevance to student learning and practice.
- Graded work may not be accepted late, as the answers were given to students. Students may be given an alternative assignment.
- Work will not be accepted after the current unit and/or grading period is completed except in extenuating circumstances.

Academic integrity:

All assignments are critical ways to analyze your progression towards mastery of the standards. Any student caught cheating or plagiarizing work will be given the opportunity to redo the assignment so that it represents their original work. The assignment in question may be modified to ensure fairness. Additional instances of cheating or plagiarizing may be referred to the administration for discipline.

School-Wide Policies:

- **Phone Policy:** NWPMS students will not be permitted to have out their cell phones unless otherwise instructed by the teacher.
 - **First offense:** Confiscation the phone will be returned to the student at the end of the class or school day. A parent/guardian will be contacted.
 - **Second offense and subsequent offenses:** Confiscation may result in parent/legal guardian collecting the device in person. Additional consequences may apply.

If a student refuses to give their phone to the teacher, they will be considered insubordinate, and the administration may assign additional consequences up to OSS.

• The following are <u>prohibited</u>:

- Bringing or using drugs, alcohol, or vapes of any sort
- Clothing depicting profanity, vulgarity, obscenity, or violence
- Clothing promoting substance use including nicotine, alcohol, or drug use
- Items intended to convey gang membership or affiliation. Bandanas are not prohibited under any circumstances
- Hats, hoods, and sunglasses may not be worn inside
- Full face coverings and Halloween-type masks are prohibited
