# New Required Financial Literacy Class Starts Next Year

Bellevue High School students have had the option to take a Personal Finance elective course for the past several years. Beginning with the 2024-2025 school year, however, all high school students will be required to take Financial Literacy.

The course will meet the new ½ credit of financial literacy graduation requirement and will help students make informed decisions about their finances. Topics will include the following: financial responsibility and decision making, planning and money management, how to be an informed consumer, investing, credit and debt, risk management, and insurance.

# Financial Update




Bellevue Schools wrapped up Fiscal Year 2023 in a sound financial state. Ohio's schools are primarily funded by state funding and local taxpayer dollars. The Fair School Funding Plan, which went into effect in Ohio's 2019 budget bill, is designed to fund schools based on a community's capacity to pay.

Related to our expenses, we route the majority of our dollars directly back into our classrooms in the form of staff and supplies. Like all districts across the state, we must use the last of our COVID-19 funding by September of 2024. Additionally, we continue to see an increase in costs for goods and services due to inflation.

Funding for students with disabilities, English learners, gifted students, economically disadvantaged students and those participating in career-technical education.


#### STATE SHARE PROPERTY TAX

# Grants Support Literacy Improvement

Bellevue Schools is working hard to improve literacy instruction for students across all grade levels. To aid in this mission, we have rolled out a new curriculum to address both word recognition and language comprehension skills.

We are also working toward certifying nine teachers in introductory dyslexia training. The district was able to secure \$32,800 in grants to make this possible, including:

\$25,000

\$5,400

from the Erie County Community Foundation

\$2,400

from the Huron County Community Foundation




# Breakfast of Champions
