
Celebrate With Us


Join the Alumni Choir

The Liberty Memorial Building first opened as a school in the fall of 1923 at 1400 Massachusetts Street in Lawrence, Kansas. Built to serve as Lawrence's high school and a memorial to local young men lost in the First World War, almost 700 students attended Liberty Memorial High School beginning August 27, 1923. Through the decades, the building has been renamed as Lawrence Junior High School, Central Junior High School and Liberty Memorial Central Middle School, but it has not wavered from its purpose of housing the teaching and learning of Lawrence students.
