




Hudson City School District received a four-star rating on the State of Ohio Auditor's Star Rating System. This is the Highest Achievement for the Award. A four-star rating means that the district was compliant with all Sunshine Law requirements and has implemented at least five best practices.

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OPERATING REVENUE: Where Does it Come From?



Local Property Taxes

The chart to the left shows the distribution of the district's revenue sources for its main Operating Fund, the General Fund. Property taxes* make up 79% of all district operating revenue. Property taxes are supported by operating levies. The last new operating levy was passed in May 2011.

State Funding

State foundation funding and all of its components represent 16% of the district's revenue. The formula that governs state funding places Hudson on the "State Guarantee." As a guarantee district, Hudson receives a fixed amount of state funding that cannot grow due to Hudson's property and income wealth. In fact, Hudson receives slightly less state funding today (\$11.5M) than it did 12 years ago (\$11.8M).



Expenses by Purpose


The chart to the right depicts the district's actual operating expenses for Fiscal Year 2023. When the categories of Instruction, Instructional Support, Transportation, and Extracurricular are combined, 79.8% of all expenditures are directly tied to the student experience.


EXPENSES: DISTRICT COMPARISON

The chart below compares categories of spending per pupil among 19 comparable, high-performing school districts in Northeast Ohio. Spending per pupil varies among school districts based upon the total funding available and the number of students enrolled. The Hudson City School District spends \$15,087 per pupil, which is typical within this peer group.



District Performance Ranking vs. Spending Per Pupil


In addition, the district has been able to direct a higher percentage of funding towards student learning and experience which has contributed to a Performance Index Score of 105.1, falling in the top 3.5% statewide. In comparison to its peer districts, with comparable spending, Hudson City schools offers a superior education to its students and a tremendous value to the community.



FINANCIAL FORECAST

The Hudson City School District has maintained a positive cash position since the last operating levy was passed in 2011. Although the revenue from past voted levies remains relatively constant, additional revenue from new residential and commercial construction has helped to sustain the district financially over the last twelve years. During that time, the district has consistently employed efforts to contain and reduce spending, including staffing and programming reductions, staffing efficiencies, operational efficiencies, and a recent operational budget reduction. Inflationary increases in basic operational costs as well as a rise in expenses related to student learning and supports following COVID-19 have recently put the district into a cycle of deficit spending. The table below shows the dramatic compounding effect of deficit spending on the district's cash balance over the next four years. It is for this reason that, after twelve years, the district is finally ready to once again appeal to the community for a new operating levy.

Levy Duration

Historically, the district has reached out to its voters every 3-5 years for new operating dollars. The last operating levy was passed in May 2011 extending the current levy cycle for 12 years! Comparable districts have passed 2 and 3 new operating levies during the same period of time.

Why Do We Need Operating Levies?

House Bill 920 serves to protect taxpayers from inflationary increases in property values and taxes by reducing the tax rate of VOTED levies when property values increase. Thus, unless a school district passes a new levy, the total revenue collected by the district will not materially increase. Individual properties can fluctuate based on their property value change relative to the average change, but the total district tax collected will not. Long term this leads to levy cycles where districts must return to voters periodically for new levies.
