

OAKLAND CATHOLIC CELEBRATES 35 YEARS OF EXCELLENCE WITH A FUTURE FORWARD FOCUS

Buses, vans, and cars of all colors and sizes descend upon 144 N. Craig
Street each morning, transporting young women from across the region to
Oakland Catholic High School. They come from approximately 50 different
elementary and middle school institutions. They walk, carpool, ride a public bus,
sit in a yellow school bus, or hitch a ride with parents who work in the city. They
live as close as a building away and as far as a 45-minute drive. They cross
bridges and rivers, go through tunnels, travel highways and by-ways,
and even commute all the way from Mars (PA, that is)!



The commitment to seeking an all-girls, collegepreparatory education grounded in Catholic teachings and values unifies the entire community. OC Parents choose to send their daughters here because they want a faith-based, exceptional education in the unique environment that Oakland Catholic provides. OC Students understand that they attend OC not just to improve themselves, but because they are called to become the best version of themselves in order to make a difference in the lives of others through service. OC Alumnae manifest the impact a purposeful and purpose-filled education has on our world as they lead their families, churches, communities, workplaces, and industries. 
A LEGACY OF WOMEN SERVING WOMEN

The value proposition of an all-girls Catholic high school like Oakland Catholic High School started over a century before the school's official founding on July 1, 1989. Both the Sisters of Mercy and Sisters of Charity recognized the incredible resource that lay hidden in an underserved and undervalued segment of society—girls. In 1809, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, a convert to Catholicism and the first American-born saint, founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph in Emmitsburg, Maryland. Dedicated to the care of the children of the poor, particularly through education, she is credited with founding the parochial school system in the United States. The Venerable Mother McCauley answered a similar call in 1831 when she founded the Sisters of Mercy in Dublin, Ireland.

From their inception, the Mercy Sisters were committed to the poor and uneducated, particularly women. Both orders responded to requests from Bishops in the young Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh to address the needs of a growing population of working families through education, ministry, and healthcare.

This call to educate young women, to develop in them a deeper understanding of the Catholic faith and their Christian responsibilities, and to train them to become servant leaders in a world filled with need is the historical foundation of Oakland Catholic's legacy of Spirituality, Scholarship, and Service.

In 1844, the Sisters of Mercy opened Our Lady of Mercy Academy (OLOMA), the first private academy for girls in Pittsburgh, at St. Mary's on Penn Avenue. Although its location shifted over the years, it remained part of the "Mercy Corridor" in Oakland for years, joining Mt. Mercy Academy (now Carlow University), the Campus School, and the schools of the Cathedral. OLOMA moved to a larger campus in Monroeville in 1963 and eventually closed its doors in 1979, but the school's spirit lives on.



St. Paul Cathedral High School for girls grew in size and stature during the early 1900s. The Joan of Arc Building housed the high school until the "new building" was constructed in 1960. An aspiration for families that populated Oakland, Hazelwood, the Hill, Shadyside, and many other city neighborhoods, it truly served a diverse population and embraced the Mercy charism. In 1989, St. Paul Cathedral High School for girls graduated its last class, but the concept of how important it was to provide this unique educational opportunity to the Pittsburgh region persisted.

The Sisters of Charity responded to Bishop O'Connor's first request to staff St. Paul Cathedral school in 1844 but were called a year later to other endeavors. Decades later, they expanded their educational endeavors in the city, establishing Sacred Heart High School in 1915. Originally a co-educational institution, Sacred Heart fluctuated between co-ed and all-girls until it solidified its identity as an all-girls Catholic high school in the 1940s. Like Cathedral, Sacred Heart was a powerhouse institution where young women of the city and beyond were educated in the tenets of the faith, grounded in Catholic Social Teaching that prioritizes service to others, and prepared academically to lead.



Its doors closed as well in the Spring of 1989, but the vision of an all-girls, college-preparatory education rooted in the Catholic responsibility to live the teachings of the gospel remained.

Ruth Egler, a graduate of Mt. Mercy Academy, whose daughters attended Our Lady of Mercy Academy, believed strongly in the value an all-girls Catholic education provided to the entire region. She worked closely with the Diocese on establishing an all-girls diocesan high school to parallel the existing all-boys diocesan Central Catholic. Why shouldn't the young women of Pittsburgh enjoy the benefits and advantages of a diocesan community dedicated to their formation and development?

Working with her friend, **Rhodora J. Donahue**, and Rhodora's oldest daughter, **Katherine D. Freyvogel**, Ruth garnered growing support for a regional high school that focused on the education, formation, and enrichment of girls. A community of believers in the importance of all-girls Catholic education; a legacy of women striving to provide for the next generation of women; a shared history and philosophy by OC's three alumna schools of OLOMA, CHS, and SHHS; a focused vision; resources; thoughtful collaboration; and a call to make a difference... these are the foundational building blocks that launched the founding of Oakland Catholic High School, the first, and only, all-girls, college-preparatory, Catholic high school in the Diocese of Pittsburgh.

In July 1989, only weeks after two prominent all-girls Catholic parish high schools had held their final graduation ceremonies, Oakland Catholic High School took up residence at 144 N. Craig Street, proudly sitting in the Mercy Corridor, embracing the charism and missions of its predecessors, and opening its doors to any young woman in the region who sought what students continue to seek today—a rigorous academic experience based on the ultimate call to develop your talents and skills in order to bring a glimpse of God's kingdom to this world.

OAKLAND CATHOLIC TAKES THE LEAD

Perhaps Oakland Catholic's strength comes from an inherent sense that something of incredible worth typically stems from success in overcoming difficulties. Challenges abounded in the early days of Oakland Catholic High School—doubts about the whole endeavor; concerns about locating the campus on the former site of St. Paul Cathedral High School; organizational issues with regard to administrators, faculty, the union, and the diocese; outrage and disappointment from alumnae of the recently closed Cathedral and Sacred Heart high schools (N.B. These schools were fierce competitors in all areas and even fiercer rivals; now, they were classmates and members of a shared alumnae network.); and wariness of prospective parents as to whether the school would prove successful.

The dozens of roses carried by OC graduates at each commencement, provided since the school's start by a gracious benefactor, did not line the school's initial path at the time of its founding.

And yet, Oakland Catholic did succeed. That first decade proved that mission, vision, competence, leadership, faith, hope, and love always prevail. As stated in 1 Corinthians 13:13, "...and the greatest of these is love." Oakland Catholic exuded love. Students from rival schools quickly immersed themselves in the unifying experience of being a student at this incredibly new and exciting endeavor designed specifically for their benefit.

They fell in love with the school where they excelled at academics and athletics. *College acceptance rates grew year over year from the start. The basketball team claimed their first of several state championships in 1993.* They vied for positions on Student Council and formed new clubs and sports—from the Human Rights Club, to a crew team, to Student Ambassadors. Parents joined committees and promoted the school to naysayers.



They loved the difference being made by a dedicated and expert staff of educators who expanded curriculum, volunteered to moderate numerous extracurriculars, and raised the school quickly to a level of excellence.

Together, old traditions were given new life and new traditions were quickly established in activities like the picnic, talent show, and senior privileges—building community, friendship, and memories. Students developed into leaders who would one day serve their industries, communities, and alma mater with competence, care, vision, and love. Love for the school, its purpose, and its mission was palpable and contagious.

OC Alumnae continue to give back as leaders in multiple ways, such as participating on the Board of Directors, presenting at the OC Career Symposium, and conveying testimonials about the power of this OC educational experience.



FACILITIES AS IMPRESSIVE AS THE PROGRAM

By the early 2000s, Oakland Catholic had established itself as a powerhouse in the educational landscape of Pittsburgh. Parents chose the school for its excellence across spirituality, scholarship, and service, even though that tagline wouldn't be coined until 2009.

With a mission-driven philosophy, the stability of a President/Principal governance model spearheaded by the leadership of Katherine D. Freyvogel as the school's first president, academic rigor, faith formation, a robust extracurricular program, and championship sports teams, Oakland Catholic's overall program was impressive! Serving a diverse population of students who hailed from both the city and the surrounding suburbs, new challenges presented themselves. Once again, the believers in Oakland Catholic, now numbering in the thousands, stepped up with a solution. It was time to ensure OC's future by bringing the campus and facilities up to par with the strength of the school's program.

The Board of Directors, President Freyvogel, and the newly-created Advancement Office undertook a massive campaign to upgrade, renovate, and build. Technology demanded new infrastructure. Athletics required more competitive facilities. Students needed improved services. Families needed financial support. For the next decade or more, the Oakland Catholic campus underwent a massive overhaul.

While renovations took place, faculty, staff, and students never stopped praying, learning, growing, improving... and building the legacy of Oakland Catholic. Trailers that housed classes and the bookstore sprouted in the parking lot while classrooms were rebuilt; the cafeteria moved temporarily to the basement of the J-Building while the ground floor of the main building was equipped with a new dining hall, fitness center, multiple science labs, and more.

The Class of 2005 made yellow their color for Spirit Week and decorated their floor with a construction theme. Teachers shared classrooms and taught in odd spaces. Advanced Placement (A.P.) and College Equivalent (C.E.) French took place in a science lab. JOA Scholars met with the director in a second-floor closet converted to a temporary bookstore/office. Guidance (now called School Counseling) shifted downstairs until the new wing was built, and every Mass, every prayer service, every spiritual event took place in either the Aux gym or the Cathedral since the chapel was only a sketch in the architect's notebook.

Sure, there was plenty of dirt. And yes, some snubbed their nose at a school under construction. But the believers? The OC Students, Parents, Faculty, Administrators, Board Directors, and Alumnae? We knew we were answering a call to put Oakland Catholic on the map and to elevate this all-girls Catholic educational experience for as many young women in the region as possible.

Throughout the school's 35 years of growing, thriving, and serving, Oakland Catholic has been true to its mission. Every strategic plan, every board decision, every new program, every request for support from fellow believers has been the outcome of an authentic response to our mission and identity. Mission, coupled with a shared vision, and supplemented by competent leadership, has come to define Oakland Catholic High School.



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

THERESE ROCCO CHS'43

Leadership, confidence, the ability to identify problems facing our world, and the sense that you have a responsibility to give back to the greater good, have always been and remain hallmarks of an all-girls Catholic education. Therese Rocco CHS'43, took that responsibility to heart and she worked tirelessly to resolve problems in her community and our nation through her work on the Pittsburgh police force. Because of her competence, vision, and leadership, she was named the first female Assistant Chief of Police in Pittsburgh, and the in the nation.



Therese passed away at the age of 97 on December 11. She began her 40-year career in 1949 as a clerk for the bureau's Missing Persons Unit. She later took charge of that unit and helped to find thousands of missing persons and reunite them with family. Known as "The Rock," she was highlighted by Newsweek Magazine in 1987. Therese always remembered her roots and returned in 2018 to speak to the young women at Oakland Catholic. MARIE LOUISE MURRAY VAUGHN OUR LADY OF MERCY ACADEMY, CLASS OF 1964

My parents respected the Sisters of Mercy, so they chose Our Lady of Mercy Academy for me at the Oakland Campus. I was fortunate to be in the first graduating class of 1964 from the Monroeville Campus. My first memory as a freshman, which has stayed with me all my life, was in homeroom, there were old paper letters above the chalkboard that read, "The woman you will be, you are now becoming." Pretty strong words for a 14-year old. However, these words have stayed with me forever, and I have shared them with my daughters.

I loved both Mt. Mercy campuses and the fabulous personalities of the Sisters of Mercy and all of my fellow students. My favorite life quotes and lessons from the Sisters are from **Sister Patricia**McCann: "Keep going, keep doing" and Sister Hilda's favorite: "Enjoy Life." I heed their advice every day.

"Quiet leader." Those were the words that Oakland Catholic High School teacher, and later President, Mary Claire Kasunic wrote in a letter of recommendation for college on my behalf. I remember the words vividly because, although I had often felt like I had influence among my peers and within the halls of OC, I did not serve in official leadership positions. I was not the basketball or track star under "Mr. George's" (Track coach George Rudolph) coaching. I was in AP classes but not the top academically-performing student. (Mrs. Kasunic's daughter and my friend, Raquel, was!)

And I sang in the choir but was one of many young women with beautiful voices that "Mrs. Fish" (Music teacher Mrs. Ruth Gentile) would blend harmoniously together in song.

I was simply me. And this was the first time I felt myself seen as a leader, as well as the first time I received an acknowledgment that it was okay to be a quiet one.

In the years since, there have been research reports, books, and commentary about how leadership comes in different forms. You can lead with humility. You can speak without being outspoken. You can be out front but serve from behind. But at that time around 1999-2000, this was a transformative idea to me, and it followed me throughout college, as I earned a Master of Arts degree from the New York University (NYU) Steinhardt School of Media, Culture and Communication and a Bachelor of Science degree in Organizational Communication from the Ohio University College of Communication, and well into my personal life and professional career.

Today, I am vice president of partner communication and engagement at 2U, Inc., a global leader in education technology. A writer at heart, I am also an independent communications consultant, specializing in executive communications, corporate messaging and communications strategy. For more than 15 years, I have had the privilege of helping executives and organizations communicate for impact and elevate their brands. Previously, I led the corporate communications function at the Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM), the world's largest HR professional association. A seasoned and award-winning speechwriter, I joined SHRM as executive communication manager and speechwriter.

Prior to SHRM, I held speechwriting, communications and public affairs positions with the U.S. federal government, including a political appointee role in the Obama Administration's Corporation for National and Community Service, and at the U.S. Department of Agriculture. I have held additional communications and administrative posts in the private and nonprofit sectors.
