Sick Day Guidelines

Making the Right Call When Your Child is Sick:

Should I keep my child home or send him/her to school?

School policy (based on CDC recommendations) requires that a child stay home if he or she:

A child should stay home if:

- Has a fever of 100.0 degrees or higher
- Has been vomiting or has diarrhea (within 24 hours)
- Has drainage from an ear or eye (may indicate infection)
- Has a rash (until cleared by a physician)
- Is coughing or sneezing often because this spreads the sickness to others Has symptoms that keep him/her from participating in school, such as: Very tired or lack of appetite
 - o Cough that he/she cannot control, sneezing often o Headache, body aches, earache o Sore throat a little sore is OK, but a bad sore throat could be strep throat, even if there is no fever. Other signs of strep throat in children are headache and upset stomach or rash. Call your doctor if your child has these signs. A special test is needed to know if it is strep throat.
- · Other contagious diseases including pertussis, ringworm, impetigo, lice, or conjunctivitis

COVID DIAGNOSIS:

- Students may return to school on Day 6 if symptoms have resolved. (The day symptoms appear is day 0)
- Students must wear a mask for days 6 -10.

24 Hour Rule:

- Fever: Keep your child home until his/her FEVER has been gone without medicine for 24 hours. Colds can be contagious for at least 48 hours. Returning to school too soon may slow recovery and make others sick.
- VOMITING or DIARRHEA: Keep your child home for 24 hours after the LAST time he/she vomited or had diarrhea.
- Antibiotics: Keep your child home until 24 hours after **the FIRST dose** of antibiotics for anything like an ear infections, strep throat, or pneumonia.

We often have many children and adults with colds who come to school, and they pass their sickness to others. Remember to wash hands and cover coughs and sneezes. Please help others from becoming sick by keeping your child home if he/she is sick.



History of Lent and Almsgiving

What do you think about when you think of Lent? Do you think about the fasting or the joyous preparation for Easter and the Lord's Resurrection? The three primary points of the forty-day season are prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. In Western countries, the Lent season begins on Ash

Wednesday, six and a half weeks before Easter, ends on Holy Saturday, the day before Eastern Easter. In countries, Lent starts on Monday of the seventh week before Easter and ends on the Friday nine days before Easter. Moreover, since apostolic times, it is recognized that the

period of preparation and fasting has likely been observed before the Easter celebration.

The First Council of Nicaea (a council made up of bishops) acknowledged the practice in 325 CE. Furthermore, the history of sacrificing or giving something backtracks

many years. Christians or Catholics often decide give up specific pleasures or habits during the season of Lent. This is a sign of sacrifice and to test a Christian or Catholic's self-discipline. While Jesus was fasting in the wilderness, Satan appeared to Him and tempted Him to turn away from God and worship him instead, but Jesus refused. When we

are giving something up, that story is our prime example to look to. Modern examples of sacrifice can include sweets, technology, or social media.

Further, in the words of Pope Francis, "Fast from hurting words and say kind words. Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude. Fast from anger and be filled with patience. Fast from pessimism and be filled

with hope. Fast from worries and have trust in God. Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity. Fast from pressures and be prayerful. Fast from bitterness and fill your hearts with joy. Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others. Fast from grudges and be reconciled. Fast from words and be silent so vou can listen."
