There are over 3 billion women in the world, and this is the time to celebrate them! Your mothers, sisters, aunts, grandmothers, all face hardships that not many people recognize. National Women's History Month is an opportunity to show all the women in your life some appreciation. This holiday is based on International Women's Day on March 8th, which was established in support of the efforts made for women's rights.



There is a theme year every for Women's Month, and year's this is "Women Who Advocate for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion".


Countless women

have fought for things like equality in the workplace, to be paid just as much if not more than men in their career field, and the privilege to exist in male dominated spaces. In 2004, a woman named Wangari Maathai from Kenya was the first African woman to receive a Nobel Peace Prize. She was also the first woman to receive her Ph.D in East and Central Africa. Professor Wangari founded the Green Belt Movement in 1977 to promote environmental conservation and to build up climate resilience. Her goal was also to empower young women and girls by creating a space where these communities can

create a better and more sustainable life. The official GreenBeltMovement.org website states that the organization has planted over 51 million trees in Kenya. Another woman named Laudelina de Campos Melo from Brazil dedicated her career to being an advocate for women's



rights. She created the first association of domestic workers in Brazil in 1936. The Association of Campinas' Domestic Laborers was established in 1961, and allowed women to unite as domestic workers and learn literacy skills. Eventually in 1972, according to an article written on ITC.org, these domestic workers earned the right to social security and yearly paid holidays. We also have women in our own backyard that have made amazing strides for women in the US, and that is Ruth Bader Ginsburg. She served as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States from 1933 until she took her last



breath in 2020. Ginsburg was the first Jewish woman to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court, and the second woman to serve. She believed that the only way to ensure equality was for men and women to work together to teach the new generation. She spent her career advocating for gender equality and women's rights, and is known to have inspired the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. This Act makes it much easier for

employees to win pay in discrimination claims. All of these women dedicated their lives to paving a way for the young girls following behind them to have a better way of life.




Weather


