The Agreement has a 60 day due diligence clause (paragraph 3.3 on page 2) which will expire on July 7, 2015. The Closing Date is scheduled for ten (10) business days following July 7.

Based on Due Diligence findings, it is recommended that the Governing Board proceed with the purchase of 7575 E. Main Street from the City of Scottsdale.
