

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Since 2018, DCS has partnered with NASA HUNCH to incorporate unique STEM/STEAM learning opportunities for our students. The students have exceeded expectations. Throughout the last five years, DC students have pioneered new programs and have become a nationwide model for the platform. DCS NASA HUNCH firsts include:

- DMS was the 1st NASA HUNCH school in GA and the 1st middle school across the Nation.
- DMS was the 1st middle school in the Nation to incorporate the Stratasys 450mc, industrial level 3D printer to print parts now utilized on the International Space Station.
- DCS was recognized as the designated 3D printing center for NASA HUNCH.
- DES established the 1st NASA HUNCH Academy for 3rd- 5th-grade students and is now a national model for other districts.
- DCS was recognized as the 1st NASA HUNCH Center of Excellence in the nation.
- DMS Graphic Arts Pathway students designed the Center of Excellence patch used nationwide.
- DCHS established the 1st ever NASA HUNCH biomedical engineering partnership with the Healthcare and Mechatronic CTAE Departments. The students focused on the mental health issues astronauts can experience while in space for an extended time and ways to help reduce those issues. The students created scent-filled capsules to stimulate positive memories (scents like cinnamon, apple, or pumpkin to remind them of the holidays and spending time with loved ones). The pilot has now become a national model.

EXCELLING IN FY23:

- Bio-Health pioneers Alleigh Daniels, Jack Dupree, Tanner Kunkel, and culinary art students Brooklyn Konrad, Gracie Angle, and Brietta Watson had the opportunity to present their work at the Johnson Space Station in Houston, Texas. The Bio-Health students presented their work with scentfilled capsules. The Culinary Art students' work focused on reducing waste while in space by creating edible packaging. Both groups secured spots as the Top 10 National Finalists.
- DMS Digital Media students received 1st place in the Career and Technical Education Month and NASA HUNCH 2022-2023 Student Video Challenge! This year's theme was "What is the Purpose of NASA?"
- DCHS students Heidi Maldonado and Kandicee Black competed in the NASA HUNCH Culinary Arts competition in Huntsville, AL. They researched meals in space and created a dish that met dietary guidelines for astronauts and chronicled their NASA HUNCH experience in a video, which was entered into the Digital Delish FCCLA competition. They scored 13th in the nation in the Culinary competition and 5th in the state of GA in the FCCLA Competition.
- The third-level DCHS Mechatronics students competed in the Green-Power championship race at Talladega Superspeedway and earned 1st place in the Advanced Stock Race Division.

What does PBIS look like at each school?

- All schools are Tier I: DES & DCHS were identified as "Operational" schools; Davis & DMS were identified as "Emerging" schools
- Each school has a point system:
 - » Davis Safe, Organized, Accountable, & Responsible
 - » DES Strive to do your best, Take responsibility, Always be safe, Respect others and their property
 - » DMS Ready, Respectful, & Responsible, & House System (Darters, Panthers, Wildcats & Yellow Jackets) » DCHS - Respectful, On Task, Always Safe, & Responsible
- Students can earn points from staff for demonstrating the principles of the systems (ex., Respectful, On Task, Always Safe, & Responsible) or displaying positive behavior, grades, and attendance.
- Students can exchange their points for special prizes and/or events: » purchase items from PBIS/school spirit store (i.e., candy, drinks, &
 - ice cream)
 - » participate in PBIS reward events (i.e., school dances, movie night, special assemblies, food truck day, restaurant-style lunch, & special field trips)





The Dade County Governance Team recognizes Character Education and Social Emotional Learning (SEL) (SEL) as integral parts of education and development. Both provide a solid foundation to develop core ethical and behaviors morals. values, needed to be functional members of society. Both help students develop and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes needed to manage emotions, empathize with others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, make responsible and caring decisions, and contribute to a more caring, just world. In FY23, DCS adopted the Navigate360 SEL Program and collaborated with the program directors to combine the district's Character Education Plan. Each week, students and staff from

COMMUNITY **MACTION**

DCS stands strong because of the incredible support provided by local businesses, organizations, churches, and individuals with a vested interest in our children's future. These partnerships have and will continue to significantly impact students' educational experiences and overall well-being by providing opportunities to enhance learning environments, offer valuable resources, and create opportunities for growth and success. The following is merely a glimpse of our community in action:

- Alliance for Dade in partnership with the DCHS CTAE students, TriTex, and Top of Georgia, DCHS hosted the 2nd annual Career Fair. Over 35 businesses were onsite and available to speak with the juniors and seniors. Guest speaker Dale Alexander, a certified financial planner, attended the event, spoke to seniors about finance, and provided helpful tips on smart financial decision-making. His presentation was based on the key principles highlighted in his book, "The Talk." Each student received a copy of the book compliments of GA State Superintendent Richard Woods.
- Bridge Health APEX Program active partnership: 1 full-time therapist and 2 skill builders. Upon parental consent/request, students are referred and, if eligible, receive mental health services directly at school - 104 referrals in FY23.
- Jake Marshall Service, Inc donated a brand new HVAC package unit to the DCHS Construction program to provide students with hands-on electrical and mechanical opportunities to better understand the operation of the HVAC unit.
- Bottom Dollar Tools donated multiple tools to the DCHS Construction program to be utilized for hands-on learning activities and projects.
- Helping Hands Ending Hunger Program (HHEH) 8,653 meals were distributed to 20 families in insulated food bags packed and distributed every Friday from January to May. Bags contained items ranging from fresh fruits and vegetables, frozen chicken, and bread to staple goods like rice and beans. Meals are sponsored by the United Way of Greater Chattanooga and delivered to DCHS by the Chattanooga Area Food Bank. Distribution was made possible thanks to the effort of the DCHS Healthcare students, various DCHS and central office staff, DC bus drivers, and community partners (Dade First Family Connection, Hunter's Salvage, Teleflex, River Run Logistics, Bridge Health APEX therapist]. This program sponsored/facilitated two Mobile Pantry distributions over the summer - approximately 17,500 pounds of food was packed and distributed. Packers/ distributors include DCHS student volunteers, Dade First Family Connection, New Salem Baptist Church, Teleflex, Bridge Health APEX therapist, Shaw (Dalton), students from Mercer University, Representative Mike Cameron, and DCHS/central office staff.

– Dade First Family Connection - facilitated DCS partnership with HHEH; sponsored guest speaker Kevin McNeil to speak to 6th-12th grade students about child abuse and neglect; serves on the DC Truancy Treatment Team; promotes and regularly supports the Care Closets; provides economic aid to families through benevolence funds, resource connection, and/or the ESTHER Projects; and so much more!





DCS **StarKids** are students with exceptional abilities who receive services through the functional curriculum program. They are uniquely exceptional and require instruction tailored to their needs. DCS effectively meets those needs while actively engaging students through the support of community partners!

STARKIDS CAFE:

The StarKids Cafe is open to all DC teachers and staff each month for staff appreciation. This serves as a creative way of learning social and independent living skills. All students are involved in the behind-the-scenes tasks like preparing the menu, prepping and cooking the food, decorating, and advertising. When the cafe opens, students can be seen taking orders, accepting cash payments and making change, or delivering orders to the staff throughout the building. All earnings are utilized to purchase items for the cafe supplies and to fund field trips, classroom learning activities, and other special activities for the students.

BEST BUDDIES:

In FY23, the StarKids started the first Best Buddies International Chapter in DC. Best Buddies is the world's largest organization dedicated to ending the social, physical, and economic isolation of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Each functional student is "matched" with a buddy for a year. The program aims to empower these exceptional children and help them form meaningful friendships with their peers, strengthen self-advocacy and communication skills, and feel valued by society. The DCHS chapter meets twice a month, with other activities planned throughout the year in which the designated buddies can participate (Dade Games, classroom celebrations, and special field trips).

COMMUNITY-BASED INSTRUCTION & LEARNING:

Each month, the StarKids visit a local business to learn about and observe the available jobs and resources within the community. The DCHS StarKids have established work-study partnerships with T&T Golf Carts, the Dade County Public Library, and Teleflex. Through T&T and the library, students participate in community-based work studies working alongside the employees. Some students are learning and assisting in adequately preparing the golf carts for rental and maintenance at T&T. Other students are learning about and assisting in maintaining sanitation requirements and other clerical activities at the library. With Teleflex, the students gain hands-on, real-life work experience within the classroom and are even paid to do so. Teleflex produces medical wires that are wrapped around small spools to be packaged for distribution. The StarKids are a part of the production team as they are responsible for preparing the spools for packaging. Teleflex delivers the spools to the school for the students to count, inspect, clean, and rinse each spool. Teleflex pays them for every spool returned. All earnings go to the StarKids program as a whole and are utilized to purchase cafe supplies and fund field trips for additional community-based learning opportunities and other special activities. These community work studies allow students to learn and develop soft job and independent living skills through hands-on, real-life work experiences.

PROJECT SEARCH:

Project SEARCH is unique because it is a business-led, high school-to-work transition program serving students with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). It takes place entirely at the workplace, and each participant's goal is competitive employment. The program provides real-life work experience combined with employability and independent-living skills training to help young people with significant disabilities make successful transitions to productive adult life. Employment is in an integrated setting, with students working 16 hours or more a week and earning minimum wage or higher.



DADE GAMES:

The New Salem Community Center hosts the Dade Games for our students served in the functional classrooms each year. The students spend the day participating in various competitive games. They are provided lunch sponsored by New Salem Baptist Church and served by New Salem Community members. Each athlete is a winner on this special day and is recognized on stage to receive a medal of honor.




