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Grade 1: Weekly Phonics Focus Lesson 13

In our classroom this week, we are learning to read and spell **closed syllable** words with the **consonant digraph** *th***,** *wh***, or** *ck*. Here are the letters and patterns to practice this week:

Consonants	b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x, z y at the beginning of a word	
Vowels	a, e, i, o, u y at the end of a word	
Consonant Digraphs	A consonant digraph has 1 sound spelled with 2 consonants side by side.	
Closed Syllables	Closed syllable words have 1 vowel letter followed by 1 o more consonants, and the vowel sound is short.	

Here are some examples of closed syllable words with the consonant digraph th, wh, or ck:

Initial Digraph th-	Final Digraph -th	Initial Digraph wh-	Final Digraph -ck
<u>th</u> at	clo <u>th</u>	<u>wh</u> am	ba <u>ck</u>
<u>th</u> en	ma <u>th</u>	<u>wh</u> en	chi <u>ck</u>
<u>th</u> in	mo <u>th</u>	<u>wh</u> ip	de <u>ck</u>
<u>th</u> is	pa <u>th</u>	<u>wh</u> isk	pa <u>ck</u>
<u>th</u> ud	wi <u>th</u>	<u>wh</u> iz	sto <u>ck</u>
