Elementary Students Explore World Languages and Cultures

This year, elementary students are gaining exposure to world languages and cultures with their new teacher, Ms. Nowak. Since the New Year, Ms. Satterlee's class has been globetrotting in World Language Exploratory. Every week, students learn about a French or Spanish-speaking place in the world and get a glimpse of their unique culture. Recent highlights have included learning the basic steps to salsa dance, exploring French masterpieces from the Musée d'Orsay, and singing the folk song, El Coquí, in Spanish. Ms. Windel's class had World Language in the fall and Ms. Moeller's class will start in April.

Fourth graders' World Language class gives students the opportunity to explore their interdisciplinary themes through a different cultural and linguistic lens. Last month, to go along with their natural disasters unit, students learned about the climates of Latin America and practiced forecasting the weather in different countries in Spanish.











Fifth graders capped off their Japanese unit by folding over 2000 origami cranes! During the unit, students practiced reading and writing the hiragana syllabary, learned to have basic conversations in Japanese, and read Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes to study the annual traditions in Japanese life. Students are now planning to send 1000 of their cranes to the Children's Peace Monument in Hiroshima, and hang another 1000 around our school.

Now, fifth grade has moved on to their French unit and are seeing how French is used as a global language. Right before February break, we had Ms. Llewellyn as a guest speaker to share her experiences as a Peace Corps volunteer in francophone West Africa. Students were thrilled to handle some of the cultural artifacts she brought in, including jewelry made from West African Francs, millet, and traditional textiles.

What would you say contributed to your academic success at Haldane?

I am also thankful to my teachers for answering my questions during tenth period, giving me interesting and engaging material, and generally supporting me in my academic pursuits.



Best part of senior year so far?

My favorite day of senior year so far has been an Ethics Bowl Tournament at the end of January. The debate team and I tried out Ethics Bowl for the first time, a new format of argumentation, adjacent to debate. We explored sixteen cases: recent news stories that raise ethical questions, such as what copyright laws for Algenerated media should be, how ethical true crime shows are, and more. Seven of us attended Manhattanville College's annual Ethics Bowl tournament.

I was impressed by my team's argumentation skills and teamwork, and had a great time meeting students from other schools and debating with them about relevant and interesting topics. As a school, Haldane continued through elimination rounds to the final round, which we lost by a slim margin.

What activities were you involved in at Haldane?

I have been the president and captain of the high school Debate Club since my sophomore year, and I highly recommend it to younger high school students. Additionally, I am the president of the International Club and Math Club, both of which have been a fun experience. Some other clubs I have taken part in include the "Blue Notes" a cappella group, Literary Magazine, and the "Blues Devils" rock band.

New Haldane High School Chemistry Teacher, Leah Alper, is a fellow with the Early Career Leadership Institute (ECLI) at the Hudson Valley Writing Project. The program is designed to help teachers in their first five years of teaching "develop new teaching and leadership skills as they learn powerful literacy strategies that put writing, deep reading, and critical thinking at the center of their practice."

As part of the program, at a Hudson Valley Writing Project regional conference, Ms. Alper led a workshop of 20+ attendees titled. "Writing Catalyst for Learning: as а Opportunities for Reflection and Growth." The workshop focused on a project she's been cultivating in her chemistry classes this year. where students use reflective practices to deepen their understanding of bridge in course concepts. gaps understanding, and build community.

Love for Tolve






