FINDING THE RIGHT FIT

There are many kinds of colleges that offer different programs and degrees. There are many good college matches for each student that will allow him to be successful, but experiences and opportunities may vary at different institutions.

That will help narrow the field — but it's also important to think about some additional criteria that will alter a student's experience like size and distance from home.

COLLEGE MYTHS (AND REALITIES)

MYTH: Your student should go to the most prestigious college to which he is admitted.

REALITY: Your student should go to the college that "fits" him best. If it happens to be prestigious, that's fine. However, fit has to do with how your student feels when he is on campus, the match with how your student learns and how the professors teach, and the academic pressure your student can handle. If the college and your student are not a good match, he will be unhappy regardless of the prestige.

- ☐ Talk to your student about what he or she is looking for in a school and his or her top college choices. Check out bigfuture.collegeboard.org with your student to search for colleges and make a plan for life after high school. Ask your student about his or her preferences on size, location, activities and more.
- ☐ Visit a college or attend a college fair with your student. Join as a chaperone on a school field trip or attend a local college fair. You can also visit a school virtually by checking out websites, looking at student reviews on websites like unigo.com, and requesting information from colleges.
- □ Help your student prepare for college entrance tests. Juniors will be taking the PSAT in October. Seniors can take or re-take the SAT or ACT this fall. Free test prep is available online or in books that can be checked out from the local or school library. Make sure your student gets a good night's sleep and healthy breakfast on the day of the test.
