What can a Student do to Earn an Edge on College Admission?

Build a good academic record.

- Hands down, the high-school record is the most important element.
- Show the ability to earn high marks in demanding courses.

Pursue competitive courses in high school.

 Colleges/universities expect students to seek out the most challenging curriculum the student can handle and still be successful.

What can a Student do to Earn an Edge on College Admission? (cont'd)

Be a serious student.

 Good grades in demanding courses taken throughout high school can make a vital difference.

Do something that demonstrates leadership, creativity, and initiative.

Get involved.

AP and **Dual Enrollment** both provide opportunities for college credit.

What is an Advanced Placement (AP) Course?



- College level coursework
- Earn college credit through national AP Exams
- Excellent college preparation
- Development of habits of mind necessary for managing the rigors of college
- Taught by teachers with specialized training

 AP Courses are introduction to the rigors of college coursework


College Success

 Students who take AP classes in high school tend to be more successful in college than their counterparts who don't take them.

How do AP Classes Affect HOPE GPA?

- Students in AP Classes have 10 points added to their averages by GCPS (important for class rank & GPA).
- These 10 points are removed for calculation of the HOPE Scholarship average.
- HOPE rewards students for AP classes by adding .5 points to their GPA for the course (based on a 0-4 scale).

What is the Potential Impact of AP Classes on College Success?

How Many AP Courses Can a Student Take Per Year?

- It depends on the student.
- Most AP courses are restricted to juniors and/or seniors depending on the specific course and the prerequisites.
 - Most 9th graders are only eligible to take AP Human Geography.
 - ➤ Most 10th graders are eligible to take only AP World History or AP Seminar. Based on the prerequisites, a few are ready for an AP Science or an AP Math.
- · Some students take two or three per year.
- A few very well-organized and exceptionally motivated students take as many as five per year.

How Do Students Register for AP Classes for 2024-25?

- Students wishing to sign up for AP Courses should speak to their teacher of the content area they are interested in taking AP.
- Students are registering for the full 2024-25 academic year, so choices should be made wisely.

There will be NO schedule changes after the schedule verification process in February.

What Are Some Things to Consider Before Registering for AP Classes?


- We encourage rigor and for students to sign up for classes that allow them to work to their maximum academic potential.
- When registering, consider the whole student, including:
 - overall course load
 - > academic demands
 - extracurricular and athletic participation
 - social life
 - > overall well-being

AP Capstone



"AP Capstone helps students develop key skills that they will use over and over in college: conducting research and communicating their results."

AP Capstone



- Students should be willing to commit to both classes
- AP Seminar will count as the 10th grade LA class as it will be embedded within AP Seminar
- AP Research is a junior or senior LA elective

What is the Process for Signing Up to Take AP Exams?

- AP exam sign-up is NOT automatic.
- Main testing registration takes place during first semester for year-long and first semester AP courses.
- AP exams registrations are done through MyPaymentsPlus.
- Exam cost for this year is \$97 per exam.
- In 2023-2024, ALL GCPS students receive one exam free per year (if enrolled in an AP course), but all students must pay the \$10 test registration fee.

What did Parkview's AP Testing in 2023 Look Like?

29% of Parkview students took one or more AP courses

777 students took a total of 1,544 AP Exams

79.28% scored a 3 or higher on at least one exam

178 exams - 1 (11%)

260 exams - 2 (17%)




AP Credit Policy Search

DUAL ENROLLMENT

What is the goal of the Dual Enrollment Program?



To increase college access and completion and to prepare students to enter the workforce with the skills they need to succeed (GaDOE).

What is the Dual Enrollment Program?

- Dual Enrollment provides high school students with the opportunity to take college courses for both high school and college credit.
- Students enrolling in a participating college or university and taking approved college courses for both high school and college credit, are eligible for funding.

Which students are eligible to participate in the Dual Enrollment Program?

- Students who attend public high school or eligible home study program in Georgia
- Students who meet admissions requirements for the chosen postsecondary institution
- Students who make satisfactory academic progress toward high school graduation

To receive any type of Federal or State Aid male students turning 18 must register for selective service. This includes funding for DE (college) classes.

Dual Enrollment Program Options

- Traditional (formerly Option A)
 - All following slides refer to this option

- Accelerated Careers (formerly Option B)
 - Students can graduate with their high school diploma while being exempted from specific academic course requirements.
 - Students must complete specific courses during their 9th and 10th grade year. Students choose to simultaneously earn a high school diploma and a college Associate Degree, Technical Diploma, or two (2) Technical Certificates of Credit (TCCs) in a specific career pathway. Only certain college degrees, diplomas or certificates qualify. Students must work closely with their counselor and post-secondary staff to ensure they meet both the high school and college graduation requirements.
 - If interested Student MUST meet with their assigned Counselor to pursue this path

Which students are eligible to participate in the Dual Enrollment Program? (traditional)

- **9**th **Grade students** Students in the 9th grade are **not** eligible to participate in the dual enrollment program. (may self-pay)
- <u>10th Grade students</u> Students in the 10th grade who have a minimum SAT score of 1200 or a minimum ACT composite sore of 26 in a single test administration may enroll in any approved courses listed on the Course Directory at a TCSG (Technical College), USG (public college/university) or private college/university. *(may self-pay)*
- **OR** eligible 10th graders may enroll in approved Career, Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) courses listed on the GAFutures course directory at a Technical college only.
- 11th and 12th Grade students Eligible students may take any approved Dual Enrollment courses listed on the GAFutures course directory at an eligible participating postsecondary institution.

Special Note:

Students are only allowed to take a <u>maximum</u> of 30 credit hours total to be funded

Students are only allowed to take a maximum of 15 credit hours per semester (Fall/Spring)

(*this is a change from previous years*)

Which Courses are Available?

Classes must be selected from the Dual Enrollment course directory found on gafutures.org

- English
- Math
- Science
- Social studies
- World Languages
- Fine Arts
- Career, Technical, & Agricultural Education

*Not all classes are available at all institutions.

Note: Students are only allowed max. 30 credit hours total to be funded (*change from prev. yrs*)

How does grading work?

Grades from college will be transcribed as:

$$A = 95$$
 $B = 85$ $C = 75$ $D = 72$ or 70 (depends on college grading scale) $F = 55$

- 3-5 hours = 1.0 credit on the high school transcript.
 1-2 hours = .50 credit on the high school transcript.
- Additional points are <u>NOT</u> added to the college grade on the high school transcript.
- Students receive a .5 GPA boost for DE courses on their HOPE GPA (not to exceed 4.0).
- All courses will be included on the high school transcript.

Grading continued....

- Science labs will receive a grade on the high school transcript but not any credits.
- All dual enrollment classes are included on the high school transcript.
- If the student fails a class, it could jeopardize graduation.
- Students must make adequate academic progress each semester to be allowed to continue in the dual enrollment program.

What is the cost of the Dual Enrollment Program?

- Tuition- FREE
- Mandatory fees FREE
- Books-FREE
- Other course related materials and fees, such as labs and other non-mandatory fees- student must pay

Benefits of Dual Enrollment

- Save hundreds of dollars in college tuition
- Earn college credits while in high school
- Potential to graduate high school or college early
- Better adjustment to certain aspects of the college experience
- More likely to enroll in college after high school and graduate with their class
- The opportunity to attend full time (4/5 college classes 12-15 semester hours) or part time (total/max. of 6 classes between Parkview and college a 5 combo may be available for time constraints)
- Take classes that are not available at the high school

Benefits of Dual Enrollment

- Flexible schedule
- Grades are calculated in the HOPE GPA
- Earn additional .5 pts towards HOPE GPA (not to exceed 4.0)
- No residency/citizenshiprequirement
- Courses will not count against hourly caps for HOPE scholarships or HOPE grants
- Courses with grades of C and above should transfer to other colleges (check with each college)
- Attendance during the fall, spring, and summer is possible. (subject to change)
- Students may still remain connected to Parkview through extra-curricular and other social activities

Traits of Successful Students Who Participate in Dual Enrollment:

- Understands that good communication is paramount
- Can work independently and follows directions
- Understands that parents and the high school counselor cannot communicate with the dual enrollment professors
- Checks emails <u>regularly</u> (both high school and college) and responds promptly
- Submits all related documents and follows deadlines

Policies & Procedures – Checklist for Participation

- Attend the January Dual Enrollment meeting.
- Check the Counseling web page for all the required Dual Enrollment info/forms.
- Contact your assigned counselor to discuss graduation requirements possible classes to take at college.
- Read all instructions and complete the Parkview Dual Enrollment forms.

All required paperwork must be turned in to Mrs. Salo/Mr. Walker by the deadline of March 29th. College deadlines will be later, however, the deadline to submit PHS paperwork to participate in dual enrollment for Fall/Summer semester is **March 29th**.

Checklist for Participation....

- Turn in all required paperwork to the dual enrollment coordinators
- Take the SAT, ACT, Accuplacer before the college admission deadline and have scores sent to the college. Check each college's website to confirm.
- Complete the Dual Enrollment Application (includes the Funding Application) on gafutures.org.
 - Parent/Guardian must electronically approve & sign
- Apply and gain acceptance to the college/university. Students are responsible for following the college's application procedures and meeting all deadlines.

Procedures Cont.

- Part time students will need to plan all college classes around their Parkview schedule. Classes are not guaranteed. Be flexible.
- Students will need to be able to provide their own transportation to college.
- Remember Parkview's Deadline ALL paperwork <u>MUST</u> be turned into Mrs. Salo or Mr. Walker by <u>March 29th</u> even if the college deadline is later. (must meet Parkview's deadline to participate). Student may continue to complete college application, take SAT/ACT, etc.
- Attend summer meeting (date to be announced via mailed summer letter)

What do I do after being accepted to college?

- Inform Mrs. Salo/Mr. Walker what classes you want to take at college via the Parkview Advisement Form. Include college course name and course number. You <u>must</u> do this each semester.
- Register for college classes follow college procedures for registration.
- Turn in a copy of your college schedule to the Dual Enrollment coordinators. You <u>must</u> do this each semester.
- Complete the Parkview Schedule Adjustment Form provided by the Curriculum office.
- Stay in touch with the high school & provide college grades each semester. Check your emails!

Next Steps Cont.


- Provide an official copy of your college transcript to Mrs.
 Salo and/or Mr. Walker at the end of the college semester.
 This is before the end of Parkview's semester.
- Dual Enrollment students are responsible for completing all high school graduation requirements, including any standardized testing requirements, in order to participate in the graduation ceremony.

***Remember if the student plans on transferring their dual enrollment credit to another college it is the student's responsibility to verify with colleges regarding their policies on accepting transfer (dual enrollment) credit and how the credit will be used.

Students who are looking to attend private or out of state colleges/universities need to speak to those colleges to determine what courses are accepted.

Course Directory

The Qual Enrollment Course Director is a list of the approved courses at eligible participating postsecondary institutor Dual Enrollment funding, beginning with the Summer term.

Approved Course Categories

The approved eligible course categories include:

Core academic areas: English, math, science, social sciences and world (foreign) languages (the same categories u the high school HOPE Scholarship calculation for academic eligibility).

CTAE (Career, Technical and Agricultural Education) courses that align to a GaDOE Career Cluster and Pathway.

Eligible courses per category are determined by the first two digits of the high school course number.

Approved Course Categories for Dual Enrollment Program funding

Course Directory shows College Courses covered by Dual Enrollment Funds- only courses listed will be funded (paid for by state)

Can a student retake or withdraw from a Dual Enrollment course?

- A student may <u>not</u> receive funding for the same course twice.
- Students are encouraged <u>not</u> to drop courses after the drop/add period. If a student is considering dropping a college course they must notify the DE coordinators.
- Students become ineligible to continue to receive Dual Enrollment funding after their 2nd course withdrawal.
- If a student withdraws from a college class they will receive a "Z" grade on their high school transcript.

Required Dual Enrollment Information Sessions

•Students must attend a Dual Enrollment Advisement information session prior to turning in all paperwork.

Registration for PHS

 When preparing for the 2024-2025 school year students should select PHS classes as if they are not participating in Dual Enrollment.

- Important to choose classes wisely
- Once you have been accepted into the college for Dual Enrollment, students will submit their college schedule and then the Parkview schedule will be adjusted.
