The business meeting of the Board of Education of the Borough of New Providence was called to order at 7:30 p.m. on March 14, 2019, at the High/Middle School Media Center, 35 Pioneer Drive, by the Board President, Mr. Smith.

Present on roll call were Rebecca Coniglio, Ira Krauss, Mary Misiukiewicz, Adam Smith and Joseph Walsh. Also present were Dr. David Miceli, Superintendent of Schools; Mr. Scott D. Hough, Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services; James E. Testa, School Business Administrator/Board Secretary; John M. Richter, Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Supervision; and 14 members of the public.

Mr. Smith led in the salute to the flag.

Mr. Smith read the following statement:

This is a public meeting of the Board of Education of the Borough of New Providence. Adequate notice of this meeting has been given in accordance with PL 1975, Chapter 231, in that an annual notice was made in conformance with Section 13 of the Act.

Whenever the business of the Board requires it to convene to Closed session, the session will begin no later than 10:00 p.m. At the conclusion of the need for Closed Session, the Board will reconvene to the public portion of the meeting. At that time the Board will complete any other business that may be before it.

COMMENTS

Mr. Smith welcomed everyone. Mr. Smith commented of the excitement around the high school musical "Chicago". He commented that the production was a Broadway style presentation with 50-60 students in the musical who did an excellent job.

Mr. Smith congratulated the high school basketball team for winning the State Group I championship, beating Burlington City on Sunday. He commented that it was a good game at the Tournament of Champions on Wednesday evening, unfortunately at the end they could not beat East Side Newark. Great Job!

Presentation by New Providence Education Foundation

Mr. Smith introduced Mrs. Jennifer Kowantz, Vice President of New Providence Education Foundation and Suzanne Botvinis, voting member of the New Providence Education Foundation, to present this year's grant check to the District.

Mrs. Kowantz commented that on behalf of the New Providence Education Foundation, she has a check for \$75,265.85, and is very happy to present the check to the New Providence Board of Education. She thanked the community for supporting the foundation through fundraising efforts, so that they will be able to give this grant to the District.

Mrs. Kowantz commented that next year they will hit the one million dollars mark with only

\$77K to go, a cause to celebrate. She encouraged everyone to join the NPEF in hitting that goal. She is very excited for the foundation and the community.

Mr. Smith and Dr. Miceli accepted the check and thanked the NPEF for their very generous donation to the school district.

Superintendent's Report

- 1. Dr. Miceli reported on1st grade and Kindergarten registration: The current registration numbers are: 37 kindergaten, 95 first grade at Salt Brook School; 58 kindergarten, 98 first grade at Allen W. Roberts School. Dr. Miceli commented that we budgeted for a 5th section at one of the elementary schools.
- 2. Dr. Miceli commented that there is an additional Superintendent Forum: District Communications, on 3/21/19 at 7:00 p.m., HS Media Center.
- 3. Dr. Miceli commented on the status of the demographic study. He commented that Dr. Richard Grip of Statistical Forecasting, LLC, is to perform the demographic services. Dr. Grip will provide us a digitized analysis, which we will be able to use in any future changes in the community. Dr. Grip has several districts ahead of us for the study, but once he is done with them, he will be working on our district. The study will take two months and in June, when finalized, Dr. Grip will provide the community and the board of his findings.



Mrs. Shadis thanked the Board for the opportunity to present. She wanted to share some exciting revisions that were done this year.

Mrs. Shadis commented that when she was hired she advocated to change the title from Guidance Counselor to School Counselor. In July, she commented that she started to get a sense on what was being done with the program. What she found was a document from 2014 that said one thing and a group of counselors who shared something a little bit different, enough to show that their attitude has already moved from the guidance counselor perspective to the school counseling whole child perspective. What she did not find in the statement was a mission or a vision statement. She commented that it is crucial to understand where you are and where you want to go so that you can assess positive change.



Mrs. Shadis commented the comprehensive school counseling program strives to eliminate the social, emotional and physical barriers to success that students may experience and is designed to be both preventative and responsive. It promotes equity, access and success for all students and engages them to pursue academic rigor and resiliency by identifying and addressing barriers allowing students to become lifelong learners. The program encompasses the use of many modalities, including one-on-one interactions, small-group activities, large group discussions,

class lessons, and consultations with teachers, families, and communities. It is implemented in separate units--elementary, middle, and high school--that are sequential and developmentally appropriate. In partenership with administrators, teachers, parents, and community members, school counselors advocate to provide a safe environment that inspires a culture of acceptance and cultural sensitivity. At the elementary level they start at individual and group counseling and parent connections.









Topics in the middle school is like the elementary school, but are done at a higher level. Middle school is all about transition. Into 7th grade and out of 8th grade. We help them with changes with their bodies, friendships and all that crazy adolescent period. Middle school counselors continues to give support in their academic, social and emotional needs and are active liaisons and sometimes a mediator between the students, teachers and parents.

Toward the end of the 8th grade, we are starting to transition more into the guidance counselor role. Helping them with their academic choices, preparing them for high school.

High school services are more structured because of the number of students we need to reach and the fact that it is focused around academics and future planning. While counselors do deliver all of this academic information, they do so in a very tailored way to get to know the student and their own specific needs. This is why students are kept with the same counselor for four years, so there's that same key person in their lives each school year. The focus is on helping students plan for life after high school, which really means helping them find the right fit.

Because the SAC works with identified students and not the school at large, Mr. Chango is able to provide more in-depth mental health or D&A support to students. Our program is confidential, but is designed to collaborate with parents in an effort to determine strategies for support, both short and long-term.

Mrs. Shadis asked for the board's "blessing" to post on the counseling websites, so that the public at large has a better understanding of the department and its services. She believes it is important that they know we do have a comprehensive, well-thought out program with goals and tasks.

Mrs. Shadis has also been speaking with Mr. Hough about revising the job descriptions just to match and keep them parallel-- no major changes.

Working with the mental health committee, Mrs. Shadis said that she and the counselors are looking toward facilitating workshops and other professional development to better help integrate New Jersey's SEL competencies and standards into the everyday classroom.

Finally, the counseling department looks forward to continuing their work with the mental health committee to promote SEL across the district to all stakeholders.

Mrs. Shadis thanked the NPSD Counseling Department members for tackling the revisions with enthusiasm an insight, indicating this was really a product of their hard work.

Dr. Miceli thanked Mrs. Shadis for her presentation.

Mr. Smith asked if the college application process has lessened since it's become digital.

Mrs. Shadis commented that it has not changed at all. What the electronic platform has done is allowed students to apply to more schools. She commented that application time is still the busiest season but its "organized chaos."

Mr. Smith asked since we limited the amount of application to eight schools before paying a fee, has it made a difference?

Mrs. Shadis commented that it has not prevented students from applying to more than eight schools.
