After an extended study, community engagement and design process, plans for undertaking significant improvements to Northam Park's clay tennis courts and park service building - plus the addition of some new park facilities - are now on track to become reality.

In November, City Council gave its stamp of approval to the next phase of work at Northam Park, that will result in:

- Nine state-of-the-art Har-Tru clay tennis courts with an underground irrigation system, to continue and enhance the exceptional legacy of the Northam Tennis facility and programming;
- A service building that will include year-round restrooms that can be accessed by all park users, Northam Tennis support facilities that include kitchen amenities, shifting the tennis entrance to the south side of the courts, and storage for the athletic

fields

- The addition of six new pickleball courts - located between the tennis courts and Temont Pool - that will be the first public-dedicated pickleball courts in UA;
- Expanded greenspace, more trees, enhanced landscaping and improved pathway access from the UA Schools facilities to the immediate north down to Northam Park;
- The addition of several smaller shelter structures, including a shade structure within the Northam Tennis complex.

The project is to be undertaken by Marker Construction, at a total project cost not to exceed \$3.9 million - meeting the City's original project budget, while also expanding the facilities that will ultimately be included within the project scope, such as the addition of the

underground irrigation system for the tennis courts, the kitchen facilities, and the pickleball courts.

Construction Schedule

Construction will commence early in 2024, beginning with demolition of the existing service building and some of the tennis courts. Northam Tennis will open for an abridged 2024 season, running from early May through late July, with demolition of the remaining courts beginning in August. The entire project is expected to be complete by the Winter of 2025.

Thompson Park Playground Design Options

UA Parks & Rec is Seeking Feedback on Three Design Options Now Through January 7, 2024

As part of Parks & Recreation's 2024 Capital Improvement Program, the playground at Thompson Park is scheduled for replacement.

In advance of construction - which is expected to take place early in 2024 - the department has been seeking feedback from residents to help design the new equipment.

In the fall, residents - both adults and children alike - were invited to participate in some surveying activities to identify what type of playground features they wanted to see in a new playground. Using the 190 adult survey responses and 19 worksheets completed by children, the selected playground vendor has developed three design options for the new playground that are now available for community feedback.

City Achieves Top Financial Ratings for Bob Crane Community Center Office Space Bond Issuance

For the 16th consecutive time, the City has achieved exceptional financial ratings from two national agencies for two bond issuances.

For an issuance of special obligation nontax revenue bonds to fund the construction of the leasable office portion of the Bob Crane Community Center, S&P Global assigned its top AAA rating and Moody's Investor Service assigned the second highest rating of Aa1. S&P Global also assigned a AAA rating for the City's other outstanding nontax revenue bonds, while Moody's Investors Service affirmed the City's AAA rating on previously issued General Obligation Bonds.

Both ratings agencies once again opined on the City's strong operating fund balance and its excellent credit profile, highlighted by a strong tax base, above average resident incomes and its ties with the Columbus metropolitan economy.

The Triple A rating is the highest that can be attained and is considered the gold standard for government entities when selling bonds to finance projects. As a result, our efforts to effectively manage the community's assets can now be further enhanced by

our ability to secure the best possible interest rates.

This accomplishment is testament to the City's commitment to responsible and transparent fiscal planning and implementation practices that have helped us maintain a strong financial position during challenging times and afforded us the flexibility to address significant issues like the Community Center and infrastructure needs.

With these ratings, the City was able to issue \$11.67 million in special nontax revenue bonds, at an interest cost of 4.79%. The 33,400 square feet of leasable office space under construction at the Community Center

will be occupied by The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center (OSUWMC). Under this 15-year lease agreement, the City will receive in excess of \$1 million per year in rental fees and more than \$175,000 per year in income tax withholdings generated by the OSUWMC's employees. This partnership will also deepen and expand the health and wellness services available at the Community Center, with OSUWMC's facility featuring The James Cancer Supportive Care Center, orthopedic physical therapy, and an integrative health clinic.

Highlights of City Council & Its Policy Decisions

2024-2025 City Council

The November 7 election brought with it some changes in City Council, effective in the New Year. Council President Brendan King has completed his second term on Council and was therefore not eligible for an additional term, and Michaela Burriss chose not to seek a second term. Heidi Munc and Todd Walter were selected by voters to serve their first terms on City Council.

The 2024-25 City Council is scheduled to convene for the first time beginning at 7 pm on Monday, January 8, at which time candidates will be sworn into office for their 2024-27 terms. Additionally, Council as a Whole will select who from its ranks will serve as President and Vice President. These two positions also serve as Mayor and Vice Mayor for ceremonial duties.

Business will also include Council Member assignments to various entities, including:

- Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission
- Upper Arlington Commission on Aging

- 3 appointments to City Council's Rules Review Subcommittee
- 3 appointments to City Council's Financial Policies Subcommittee

Council meetings resume their typical schedule the following week, and are typically held the first, second and

72% of Community Enrolled in Electric Aggregation Program

In the fall of 2023, City Council approved an Upper Arlington/SOPEC Electric Aggregation Program. Shortly thereafter, SOPEC and the City reviewed market rates and terms from AEP Energy bids and locked in pricing starting in January of 2024 through June of 2025. The three options for eligible households and businesses were:

- Default 100% Renewable Energy at 7.203 cents per kWh
- Brown Energy step down priced at 6.823 cents per kWh
- Opt out of the program altogether

On November 21, 11,318 eligible households and businesses

(representing approximately 75% of the community) were mailed a joint notice from SOPEC and the City, detailing the terms of the program. If they did not wish to participate, these prospective customers had until December 12 (21 days) to opt out of the program. During the opt out window, the City hosted four open houses to provide assistance to residents needing help understanding Electric Aggregation and their options.

A small number of eligible customers - 347 or 3% of the community - chose to opt out of the program.

As a result, approximately 72% of the community is now enrolled in the new Upper Arlington/SOPEC Electric

Aggregation Program.

These enrolled customers were scheduled to receive a communication from AEP Ohio prior to the start of the program in January 2024, notifying them that they are enrolled in the City of Upper Arlington/SOPEC Electric Aggregation Program and informing them of a seven-day window whereby they could contact AEP Ohio if they no longer wished to participate in the program.

Holiday Lights Recycling Program

Available Through January 31

Following the holidays, the City is offering a holiday light recycling program. Bins are available at the Municipal Services Center, 3600 Tremont Road, at the rear of the building, near the food composting containers. This environmentally friendly program offers residents an alternative to sending strands of holiday lights to the landfill. Lights only please, no bags or other material. Light strands should never be placed in the blue recycle containers as they are considered "tanglers" and can cause major issues within the recycling facility.

Christmas Tree Collection

The City's Solid Waste provider, Local Waste, will collect live Christmas trees on your regular collection day as part of the yard waste collection program. Remove all decorations and place trees (do not place in bags) at the curb by 7 am. If the tree is eight feet or taller, please cut it in half.

Snow Removal

Public Works Division614-583-5350

The City provides exceptional snow removal services, with the aim of returning normal driving conditions to all City streets within 24 hours of the end of a snowstorm. Priority is placed in the following order:

- Arterial the City's main roads receive priority treatment during a storm.
- Collector the next level of streets that carry a lot of traffic to main streets -

these streets are plowed and salted once arterial streets are complete.

Residential - all remaining streets. Plowing takes place when snowfall exceeds three inches.

Tri-Village Packers Food Support Program Update

A new community partnership known as the Tri-Village Packers exceeded its goals for supporting children who are experiencing food insecurity in both Upper Arlington and Grandview Heights over the Thanksgiving holiday.

Thanks to the combined efforts of several community service groups, in collaboration with Upper Arlington and Grandview city and schools representatives, the program was able to provide five days of breakfast and lunch items, healthy snacks and grocery gift cards for 93 children.

Hot on the heels of this success, the group is already looking ahead to 2024, with plans to provide a similar program for children over Spring Break, in addition to repeating its Thanksgiving program.

Henderson Road Visioning Study

Lane Avenue and the Kingsdale commercial districts have both undergone or are coming toward the end of major redevelopment. These changes have been guided by past visioning exercises and code amendments focused on realizing the City's goals for re-energized community hubs that fulfill residents' shopping and amenity needs, provide housing alternatives, and help increase income tax revenues for the City through the inclusion of professional/medical office space.

The Henderson Road corridor at the north end of Upper Arlington, is the last of the City's significant commercial districts that is yet to redevelop.

It's been more than 20 years since the City underwent a major Master Plan update that, in turn, triggered the creation of Planned Mixed-Use Districts for the City's commercial areas, and market conditions have changed substantially. As a result, we recognize that the current vision for prospective reinvestment along Henderson Road is outdated and we need to put a fresh set of eyes on how to encourage and guide change that will benefit us all.

To that end, the City has contracted with the planning and ubarn design firm of MKSK to undertake a Henderson Road Visioning Study in 2024.

The primary goals for this study are to facilitate a consistent, safe and attractive corridor that maximizes economic development opportunities, enhances the district's vibrancy and walkability, and explores housing opportunities that will make north Arlington even better.

MKSK's work will include an extensive traffic study, and detailed reviews of existing visioning documents, zoning and design standards.

As they work to create a new zoning overlay and commercial streetscape concepts for the district, they will embark on an extensive community engagement process that will enable residents, existing businesses within the district and our Columbus neighors on the north side of Henderson Road to learn about and provide input throughout the study process.

The Henderson Road Visioning Study will likely take most of 2024 to complete. The resulting report and recommendations will be shared with City Council, for its review and consideration. Should Council accept the study, we anticipate a second phase of work will follow that will translate the vision for the corridor into zoning code amendments, setting the course for the desired outcomes.

The study is an important next step for one of our largest commercial districts, and I sincerely hope you will follow along and become involved as opportunities present themselves.

UA Parks & Rec Receive OPRA Award

UA Parks & Rec has received first place in the Ohio Parks & Recreation annual Awards of Excellence Program for capital projects up to \$1 million, for the 3132 Family Sport Court at Sunny 95 Park. This was a unique project involving a partnership with the UA Lacrosse Association, which provided more than \$420,000 in funding support. Named in honor of two former lacrosse captains who developed the same type of breast cancer, the court can be used for basketball, box lacrosse and hockey.

2024 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The City completed year 10 of its expanded 10-Year Capital Improvement Program in 2023. This massive investment in our streets, waterlines, stormwater and sewer lines, and community parks is evident throughout much of the community. But there's more work to be done, and the 2024 construction season will be another busy one. Read on for some highlights.

Fishinger Road Phase 2

Long awaited improvements to Fishinger Road began in 2022, and are greatly enhancing this major thoroughfare. With Phase 1 complete (Mountview Rd. east to Five Points) attention is turning to Phase 2 in 2024, with the section from Mountview to Riverside Drive scheduled to receive a new waterline, sidewalks and shared-use paths, improved LED streetlights and new street trees. The project cost of \$8.3 million will be offset by up to \$5.5 million in grant monies from MORPC's attributable funds program.

Street Reconstruction Program

Street reconstruction projects comprise full pavement replacement, new curb and gutter, and driveway approaches. The following streets will be improved, at an estimated cost of \$2 million:

- Brittany Lane from Marlyn Drive to the cul-de-sac
- Chartwell Road From Haymarket Court to Stonehaven Drive
- Hartsook Lane from Patricia Drive to Lyon Drive
- Kingston Court from Chartwell Road to the cul-de-sac
- Lynnhaven Drive from Somerford Road to Millwood Drive
- Millwood Drive from Lynnhaven Drive to Ardleigh Road
- Sandringham Drive from Longeaton Drive to the cul-de-sac
- Vassar Place From Lane Avenue to College Hill Drive
- Carriage Hill Lane from Windham Road to Longeaton Drive - will be included if bids fall within estimates



Street Maintenance Program

Sections of 17 streets are scheduled for street maintenance work, which comprises street resurfacing and spot curb and gutter repairs, per the following list, at an estimated cost of \$1 million:

Brandon Road, Braunton Road, Cardiff Road, Clearbrook Court, Nottingham Road, Pleasant Valley Drive, Stonehenge Court, Stoneygate Lane. Camborne Road and Mannboro Drive will also be included if bids fall within estimates.

Waterline Replacements

Sections of three streets are scheduled to receive new, larger waterlines, at an estimated cost of \$1.5 million:

- Bramford Road from Woodbridge Road to Lytham Road
- Overdale Drive from Johnston Road to Donna Drive
- Walhaven Road from Glenmere Road to Surrey Hill Place

Kingsdale Parking Deck

A new, single-story parking deck will be installed above existing surface parking at the north end of the Giant Eagle parking lot at Kingsdale, to serve the Bob Crane Community Center and surrounding businesses. At an approximate cost of \$7.7 million, this project will expand public parking at the site by 130 spaces.

Other Highlights

 Following detailed inspections of crosswalks, school zone markings

- and curb ramps adjacent to UA Schools locations, a number of improvements will be undertaken in 2024, at an approximate cost of \$141,000.
- The access road to the Ohio Mulch facility at the Public Service Center on Roberts Road will undergo improvements that also address a flooding issue at the City's facility, at a cost of approximately \$200,000.
- Approximately 60 fire hydrants that are obsolete and can no longer be maintained, will be replaced, at an approximate cost of \$450,000.
- A shared-use path will be installed on the west side of Riverside Drive, from Lane Avenue south to Trabue Road, at an approximately cost of \$1.7 million. This project is being coordinated with a shared-use path on Trabue Road, to be installed by the Franklin County Engineer's Office, completing a connection to the Quarry Trails Metro Park.
- Continuation of the City's sidewalk maintenance program, annual bridge inspections and repairs; and sanitary sewer rehabilitation in the area of Sunset Drive, Riverside Drive and Nottingham Road.

Even though his UAdventure has officially come to an end, Superintendent Robert Hunt, Ph.D., would say that it is really just the beginning.

Launched in the fall to coincide with his first six months as superintendent, the listening series took him to every school within the district and included opportunities to foster connections with students, staff, parents/guardians, and community members.

"This journey has been incredibly enlightening and inspiring," he said. "It is clear to me that the Upper Arlington community is deeply invested in the education of the children in this district and the success of our schools."

With every conversation along the way, Dr. Hunt has gathered invaluable feedback to inform the upcoming strategic planning process and the priorities for the district going forward.

"I am moved by the openness and honesty of everyone I have spoken with and genuinely appreciate the time they took to share their ideas, perspectives and experiences with our schools," he said.

At a community town hall in late November, he shared an initial summary of the feedback from students, staff and parents / community members on the strengths of the district and areas of opportunity. Overall, he shared five key themes that have emerged across all stakeholders: educational options and pathways; facilities, specifically the middle schools and Burbank Early Childhood School; the structure of time for students and staff; a continued focus on consistency and

continuity; and student and staff wellbeing, which he noted would likely be carried forward from the district's current strategic plan.

He will present a formal report to the Board of Education in February that fully analyzes and synthesizes all of the data. That report will be a launching pad for the district's strategic planning process, which will begin soon after.

Although his UAdventure has come to an end, it too will become a launching pad for continued conversations with all stakeholders.

"Our pursuit of excellence in education is an ongoing journey," he said. "I am dedicated to continuously listening, learning, and working together to make our schools even better."

Treasurer's Notes

In November. I presented to the Board of Education a five-year financial forecast for the district covering three years of actual data and

information.



five years of anticipated revenues and expenditures. This is a legally required document that is presented to the board for approval and then filed with the state of Ohio.

This document is updated every May and November, providing our district with an important check-in point so that we can keep a clear view on future impacts and needs.

The five year forecast reflects key changes from the May 2023 update, including an increase in investment income and an approximate \$2 million annual increase in state aid for the 2023-2024 fiscal year and beyond. The latter is a result of changes made in the Fair School Funding Plan during the state's

biennium budget process.

Even though the Fair School Funding Plan is a very small portion of our overall district budget, this still represents an increase by approximately 58 percent in our state foundation and additional state aid. Any amount of additional state funding is a positive for our school district and community.

In light of the increase in state funding, the Board of Education took action at their November meeting to replenish the budget reserve to the pre-COVID level of 25 percent, or 90 days' worth of annual expenditures. Maintaining a budget reserve of 90 days or 25 percent of annual expenditures is a long-standing, fiscally responsible practice in our district, and replenishing our reserves ultimately benefits our community by helping us protect against any unforeseen budgetary constraints or shifts in revenue in the future.

It's important to note that the new forecast reflects the typical levy cycle of a suburban school district like Upper Arlington. Due to school funding laws

in the state of Ohio, generally speaking, suburban school districts like Upper Arlington return to voters every three to four years in order to keep up with inflation and maintain the current level of school operations.



Girls Water Polo Wins 5th Consecutive State Title



Upper Arlington High School girls and boys water polo teams ended their seasons first and second in the state, respectively, with the girls team repeating as state champions for the fifth consecutive year.

In the state final matches on October 29 in their home pool, the Upper Arlington High School girls claimed a 12-6 victory over Cincinnati Sycamore. The boys team fell short of a state championship, with a 9-8 loss against Toledo St. Francis.

It is the girls' 21st state championship – a state record. Overall, the UAHS water polo program has an impressive 30 state championships all together.



Hour of Code Expands Learning for Students

This fall, every elementary classroom engaged in the sixth annual Hour of Code Across UA, led by Upper Arlington High School students in partnership with the Elementary Explorations teachers.

Elementary Explorations is a district-wide program that gives K-5 students a window of time every two weeks to extend their learning through hands-on, project-based experiences involving STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics). Building on those experiences, approximately 100 UAHS computer science students led foundational computer science activities for Hour of Code in each elementary classroom over the course of two weeks.

This gave elementary students the opportunity to learn skills for their future and allowed high school students to gain experience as teachers and leaders in computer science. And it was a whole lot of fun!



If a student is in need of an item that is not available in the store, such as a winter jacket, Smith-Lockwood's team will ensure that the student gets what they need, even taking into consideration their preferred color.

Upper Arlington Education Foundation Executive Director Alice Finley expressed her excitement about the positive impact Beartique will have on the student community. He was a recipient of a MacArthur Fellowship that same year.

As a journalist with a career spanning over two decades, he's written for *The Washington City Paper*, *The Village Voice, The New Yorker* and *The New York Times*. During his time reporting for *The Atlantic* between 2008-2018, he penned numerous articles and essays, including the National Magazine Award-winning 2012 essay "Fear of a Black President" and the influential June 2014 essay "The Case For Reparations."

Ta-Nehisi also enjoyed a successful run writing Marvel's *Black Panther* (2016-2021) and *Captain America* (2018-2021) comics series. Ta-Nehisi is currently writing the screenplays for the upcoming films *Wrong Answer, Superman* and the film adaptation of his first fiction novel, *The Water Dancer*. In fall 2022, he joined Howard University's faculty as a writer-inresidence and the Sterling Brown Chair in the Department of English.

2023 was the first year of the collection of funds from our 2022 local levy, and we immediately put the money to good use.

We hired HBM Architects and Interior Designers to lead us through a full year of a Master Facilities Plan process that included an assessment of all three of our buildings. The plan has cost estimates for repairs and renovations with a recommended timeline based on urgency and impact.

A NOTE FROM OUR DIRECTOR

HBM led community members, staff, and partners in engagement sessions and consolidated results of our online survey.

The Library will begin renovations and major building repairs that had been deferred prior to the new levy: a new HVAC system at Lane Road and a new roof on the Tremont Branch. We're working on updating some of our outdated staff work areas, such as our facilities and technical services workrooms, and the Adult Department, which will receive a new service desk due to damage to the current one, which has been in use for decades.

While the facilities and technical services workspace is being renovated, those staff will use the vacated space that previously held the Media Department. In 2024, the Library will work with the

Board, staff and community on future projects as proposed in the facilities plan.

Another significant investment the Library has made is in our Libby eBook and audiobook collection. We're part of the Digital Downloads partnership, and anyone with a library card gets first-come, first-served access to titles purchased by Columbus Metropolitan Library. However, the UAPL now has an enhanced account and has invested a significant amount for our own collection. This means we'll purchase titles that will be available for UAPL cardholders first, just as with our physical collection.

We're so grateful to our community for trusting us with the funds needed to complete these improvements.



despite the many attempts to undermine it, and reminds us that the outcome rests in our hands.






