Foundations of Instruction Coaching

The Ohio ESC Association (OESCA) is working to complete its Foundations of Instructional Coaching training – a comprehensive training program that will soon be made available to districts. All four members of the Teaching & Learning Department are trainers for the program, which is currently in its final stages of revision. Once finalized, this program will allow us to adjust the learning based upon the needs of our individual districts.

Some of our proposed contexts include: administrator coaching modules (either completed in-person in a retreat setting or online modules), a coaching network (regularly scheduled in-person sessions with coaches across multiple districts), and teacher leader coaching (online modules that cover the foundational components of coaching).

ODEW Math Specialist

Our Math Curriculum Specialist, Melissa Scoville, has expanded her learning and commitments this school year as an ODEW Math Specialist. Much of the first semester was spent attending professional development, receiving coaching, and participating in learning walks - all organized and presented by BetterLesson and the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce (ODEW). This learning has in-turn been used to assist districts in improving math instruction through discourse and selection and use of rich tasks.

Local Preschool Programs Achieve a 5-Star Step Up To Quality Rating: A Milestone in Early Childhood Education Services

Step Up to Quality is a rating system for Early Childhood Education programs that ensure preschool programs meet rigorous standards in the different areas of child development. Achieving a 5-star rating is an exceptional achievement that demonstrates the dedication preschool staff have to providing quality education and care for our community's preschool-aged children. All four Madison-Champaign Educational Service Center Programs located at Dohron Wilson Elementary School (Mechanicsburg EVSD), Norwood Elementary (Jefferson Local Schools) West Liberty-Salem Elementary School, and Urbana Elementary School were once again awarded a 5-star rating through Step Up To Quality (SUTQ).

The Step Up To Quality (SUTQ) rating system is a comprehensive evaluation tool for early learning and development programs, focusing on five key standards: learning and development, administrative and leadership practices, staff qualifications and professional development, family and community partnerships, and health and safety.

Achieving a 5-star rating recognizes that a preschool program excels in each of these areas, providing a developmentally appropriate preschool education to students ages 3 – 5. This accomplishment not only reflects the preschool staff's ability to meet and exceed the standards set by the SUTQ rating system but also demonstrates their dedication and experience providing the highest quality early childhood education possible.

All Madison-Champaign ESC Preschool Programs are currently completing spring screenings for the 2024-2025 school year. ESC Works to Support Literacy Mandates

With the state's recent mandates for professional development in teaching students with dyslexia and now the Science of Reading, as well as requirements for districts to adopt approved curriculum that aligns with The Science of Reading, the Teaching & Learning Department has been busy.

The work started last school year with providing training to a couple of our districts' teachers in the state's dyslexia modules and in courses such as LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling). It has continued this year with LETRS and very recently coordinating discussions with the districts we serve to provide them time to collaborate and discuss their curriculum prospects to meet the new requirements.

Additionally, though, a couple of our HQIM (High Quality Instructional Materials) Specialists have coordinated a series of HQIM Literacy Curriculum Workshops where small groups of district teachers will come together to hear vendor presentations and use HQIM resources adopted by the state to review different prospective K-5 reading curriculums.

However, this effort is not just for district teachers. We are also required to provide training in dyslexia as well as The Science of Reading for ESC teachers, as well!

We are currently working to schedule follow-up meetings with everyone to discuss our proposed support offerings to meet their needs and move forward with planning for the next school year.


As always, we are excited at the prospects of another school year - getting the opportunity to work with and support the fantastic work being done by the wonderful educators in each of our districts and career tech buildings.
