LEARNING SNAPSHOT

Year 1 have enjoyed learning about village life in Kenya. They watched a video of a child who lives in Kenya and have compared how her life was similar and different to theirs. In Maths, the children have been learning about capacity and volume. They have enjoyed pouring water into cups and describing the volume of water in the cup.

Ask me: What is the difference between capacity and volume?







Year 2 have had a wonderfully exciting week! We visited the technology department at Churchmead school to make a beach hut in groups. We sawed wood and used glue guns (under supervision!) to stick the different components together. We evaluated our designs when we returned to school. We also had a visit from some 6th formers from Eton College and they did a session with us about some former monarchs as preparation for our upcoming 'Magnificent Monarchs' topic.

Ask me: How did you make the beach huts?



Year 3 thoroughly enjoyed playing a game of 'Diamond Cricket' in PE, challenging themselves to score as many points for their team (batting team vs fielding team). Completing an intensive Science investigation about magnets, we ranked the different magnets from strongest to weakest recording this data in a bar chart. Last Friday, we had an amazing opportunity to try on VR headsets viewing different places to travelling back in time!

Ask me: what does volume and capacity mean?



Year 4 filled their marble jar this week and enjoyed a trip to Wagamamas as the class treat. They enjoyed an amazing morning in the Windsor restaurant; weighing out the food, tasting different ingredients and making smoothies. They ended their visit by watching the chefs cook the ingredients that they had weighed out. In the classroom, Year 4 have been learning all about fabric and focussing on William Morris designs. They also enjoyed their final classification Science lesson, focussing on plants with Mr Elliott.

Ask me: What are vascular and non vascular plants?



Reception have started their companion project Signs of Spring this week and we kicked off with a spring walk to see what we could find. We found daffodils, crocuses and blossoms but it was still a bit rainy for the bees and butterflies to come out. We are starting to understand that at the end of each season the weather starts to change and so will the clothes we wear. Now we know that although it is getting a little warmer, it can still rain in spring so we might still need raincoats and wellies sometimes!
