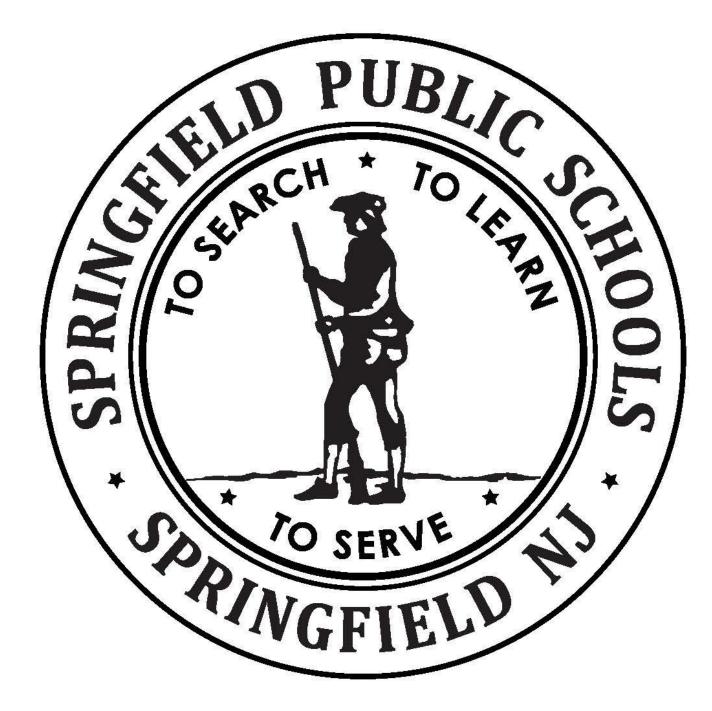

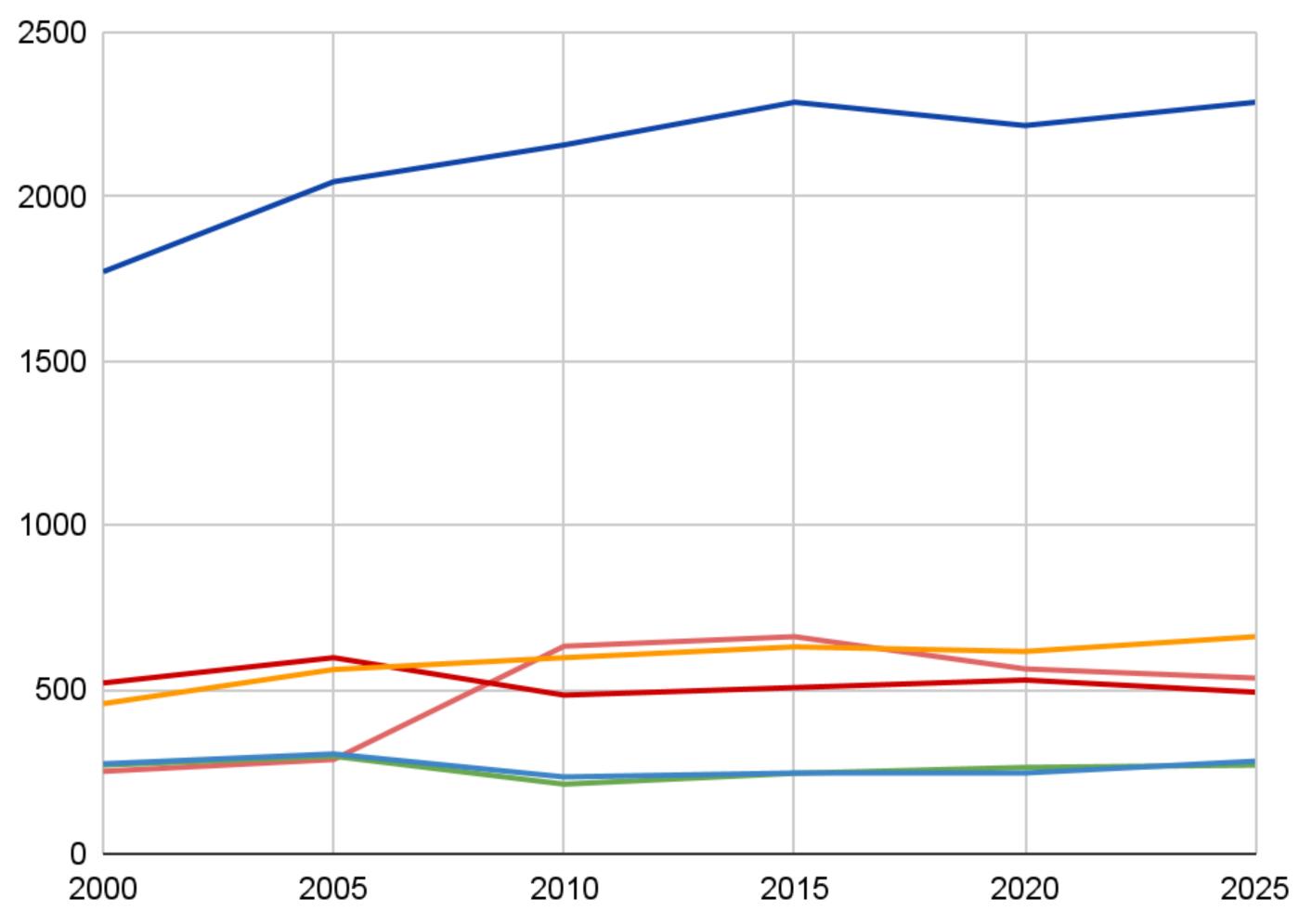
2024-2025 Proposed Budget



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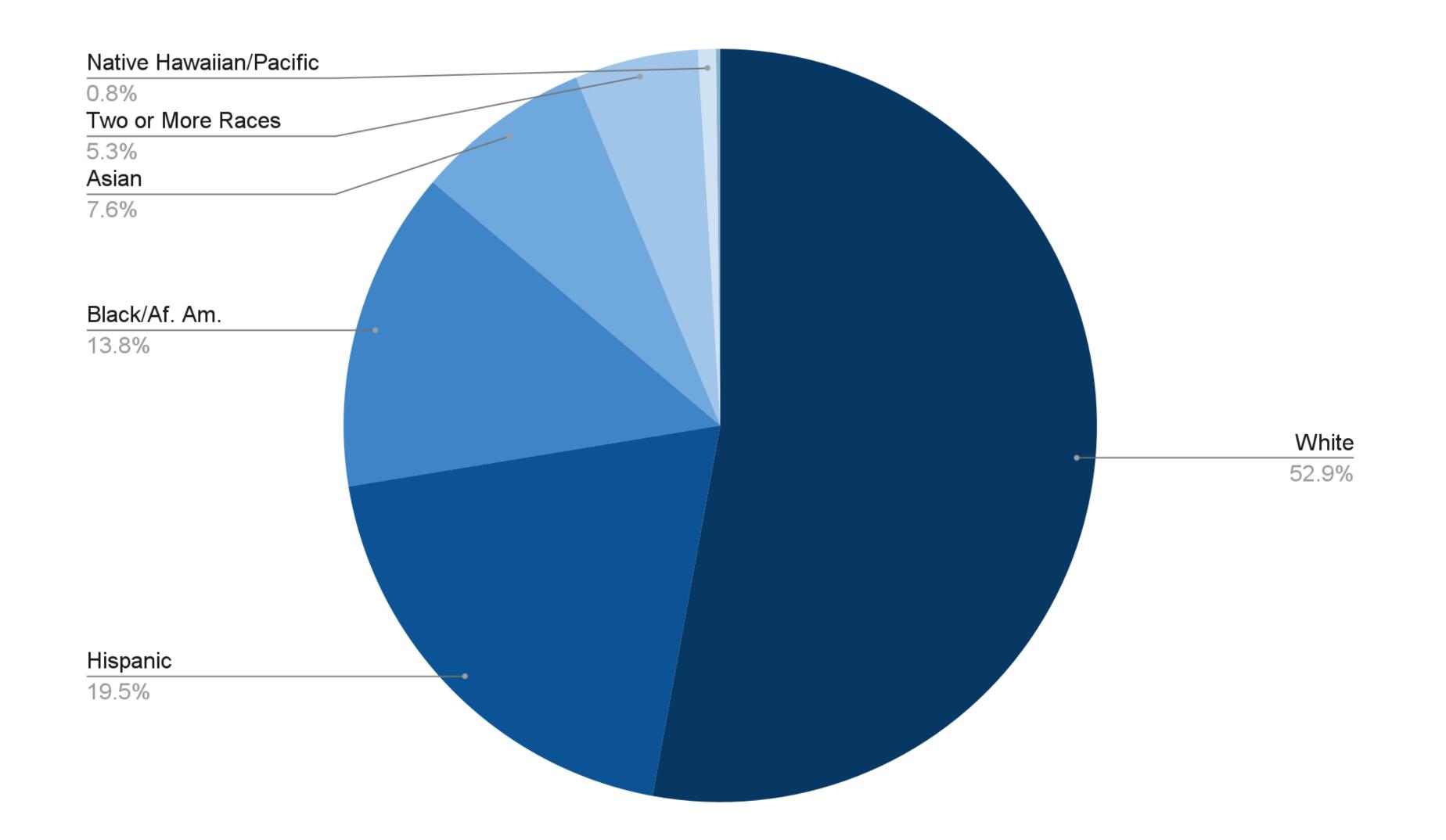
Projected Total Enrollment & Trends



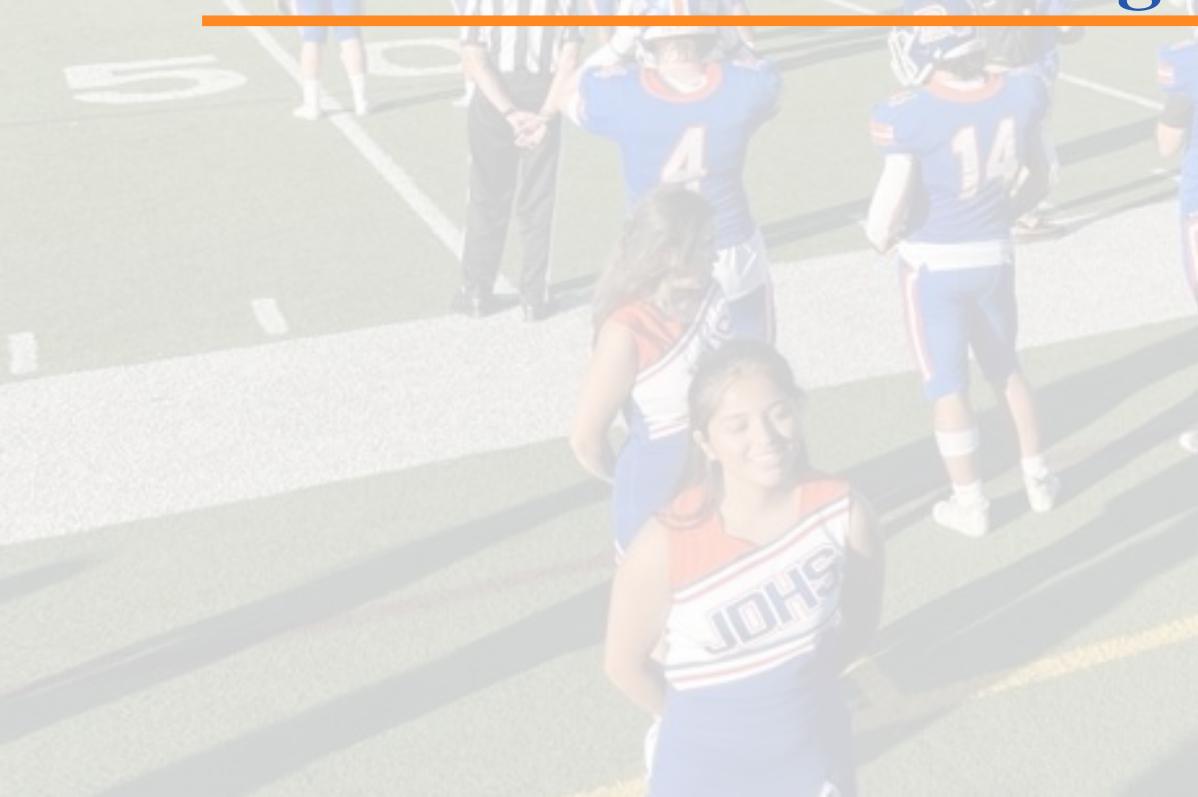

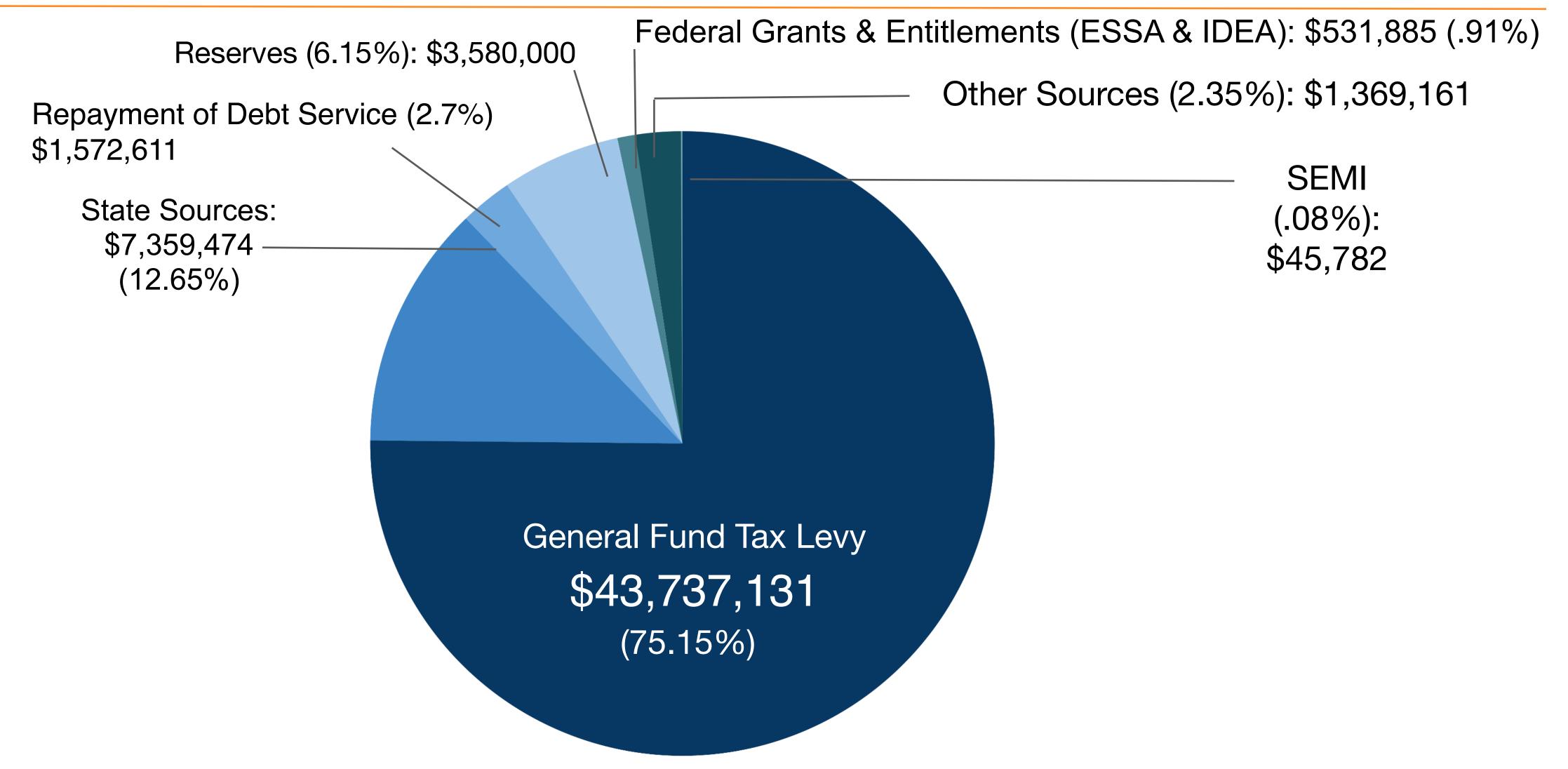

Redesigning Schools for a Bright Future

A ROADMAP FOR THE FUTURE OF OUR SCHOOLS







Our schools our future

The school realignment process will take place over two years, allowing us to take a measured approach to changing the school configuration. At the end of the process, our students will have fewer transitions in the elementary years and we will be providing a more thoughtful approach to using our school buildings and learning spaces.

Overview of Proposal

PHASE I: 2024-2025

2 PreK, 2 Kinder, 2 Grade 3 with grades 4 & 5 continuing

Walton will shift to include the following classrooms: 4 Prek (Inclusion), 3 Kinder, 7 Grade 1, 7 Grade 2, 3 Grade 3

No changes at FMG or JDHS

PHASE II: 2025-2026

Caldwell and Sandmeier will serve grades PreK-4

Walton will serve grades PreK-4, and will provide specialized learning for English language learners, and self-contained students with disabilities

FMG: Grades 5-7, with a separate 5th Grade Academy, and a grade-level lunches

JDHS: Grades 8-12, with a designated 8th Grade Academy with specific learning areas, bathrooms, and a separate lunch schedule



Why the Change is Needed

BETTER UTILIZATION OF SPACES

Jonathan Dayton High School was designed as a regional high school, with space for over 1,000 students. De-regionalized over twenty years ago, JDHS supports approximately 650 students annually. Florence M. Gaudineer Middle School served students in grades 5-8 for many years and has space for over 800 students. In both buildings, there is a significant amount of space that is under utilized.

At the same time, our elementary schools are bursting at the seams, and we anticipate having to make ongoing shifts of district lines and staffing shifts to accommodate the anticipated needs. Now is the time to rethink how we use our spaces in a way that will benefit our students for the years ahead.

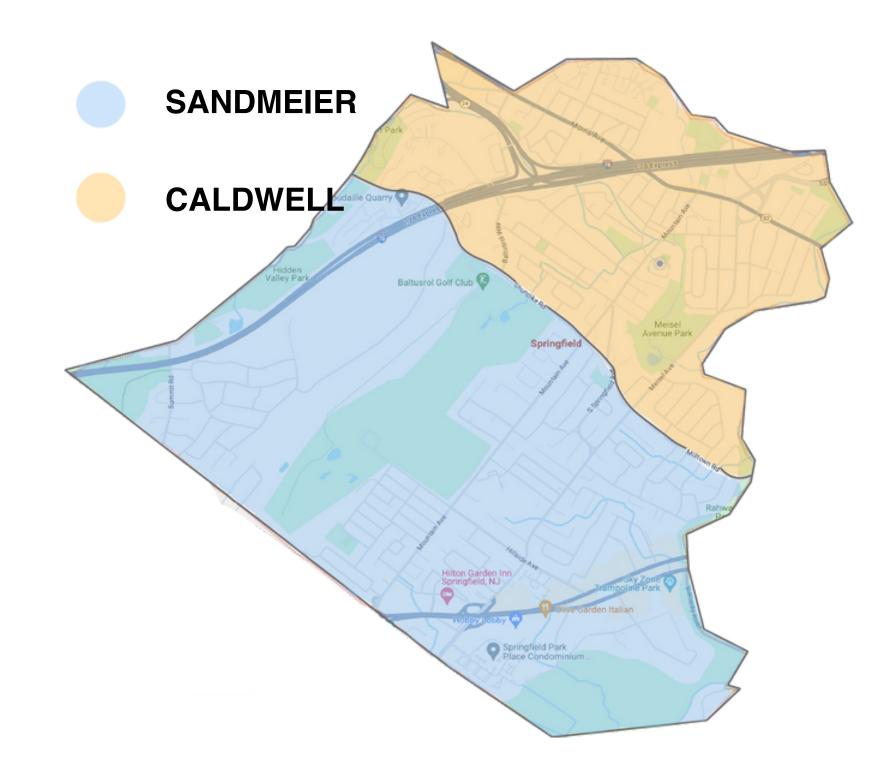
We have beautiful spaces to support student learning, we need to use them more effectively across the district.

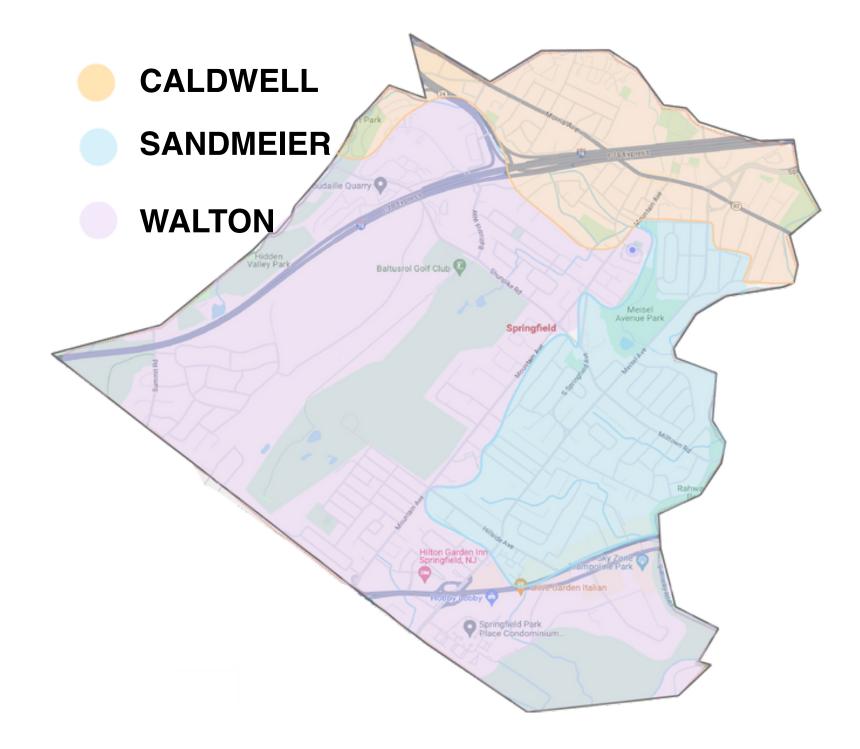

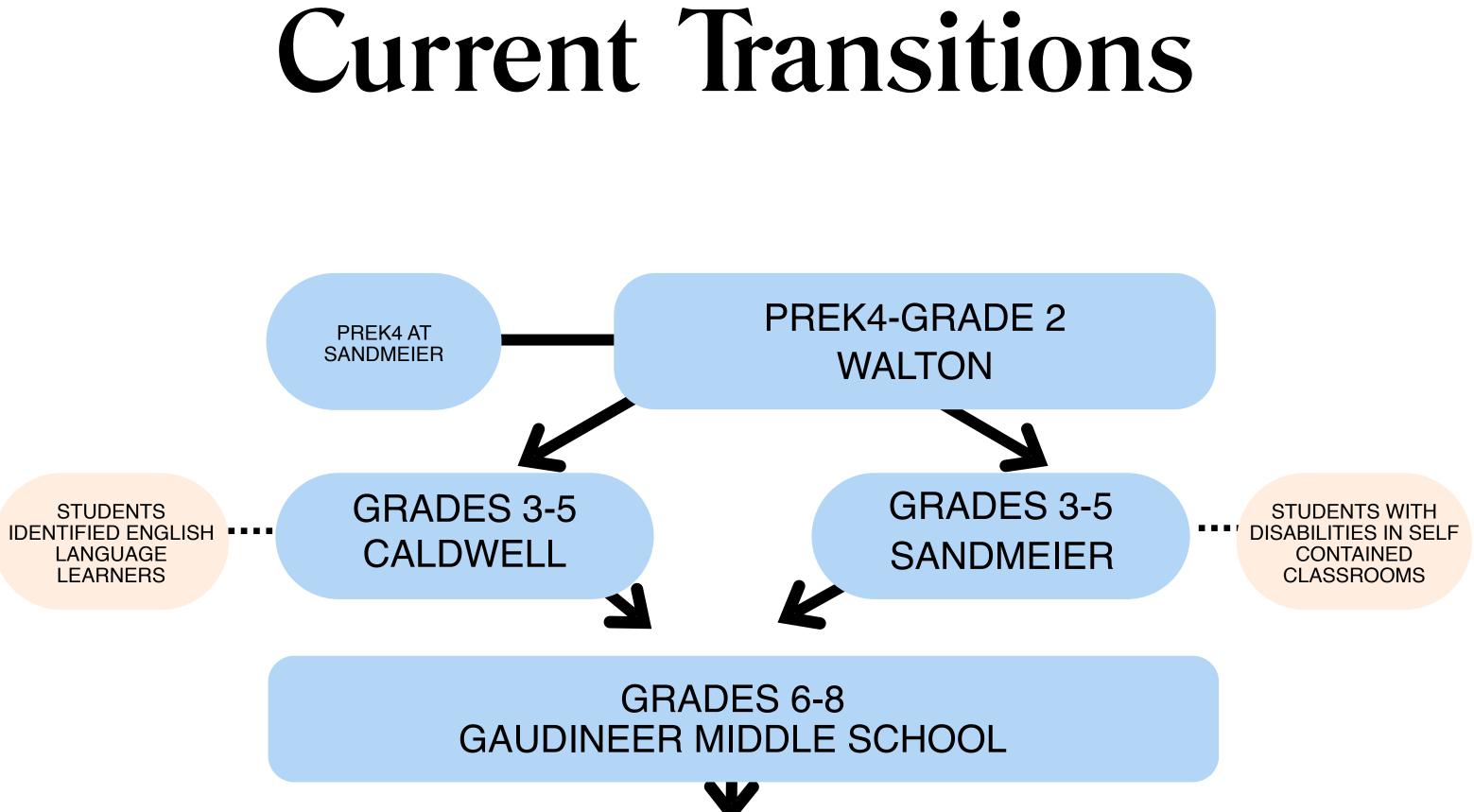
Current Zones



Proposed Zones



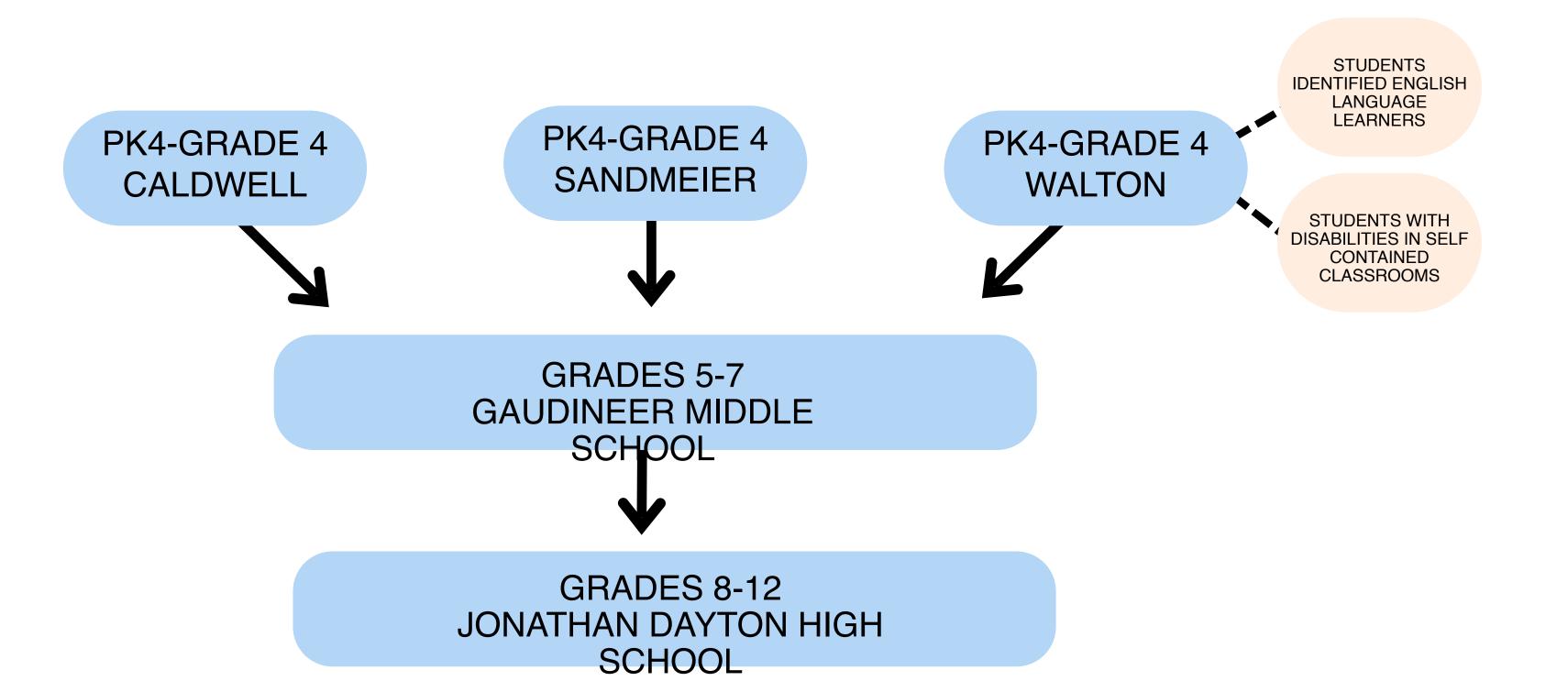




GRADES 9-12 JONATHAN DAYTON HIGH SCHOOL

What Other Impacts Can We Expect?

SCHOOL START TIMES

Start times will be adjusted across the district to ensure families and busses have sufficient time to navigate across town. We expect to have this announced before June, based on a review of all transportation needs across the district.

In 2024-2025 Middle School and High School start times will remain the same. We have an opportunity to study start times in secondary grades, however current transportation requirements mean the current times will be in effect in the 24-25 school year.

TRANSPORTATION

Eligibility for transport will change for families in all of the zones, with the most significant changes occurring for families in the Sandmeier and Caldwell zones in the 25-26 school year. Students eligible for transportation due to their IEP will not be impacted.

This shift will allow the district to better utilize our busses, resulting in significant cost savings, allowing our funds to go to our classrooms.

BEFORE & AFTER CARE

We will continue to provide before and after care at our elementary schools. We will review the options and community interest in supporting fifth graders next year.

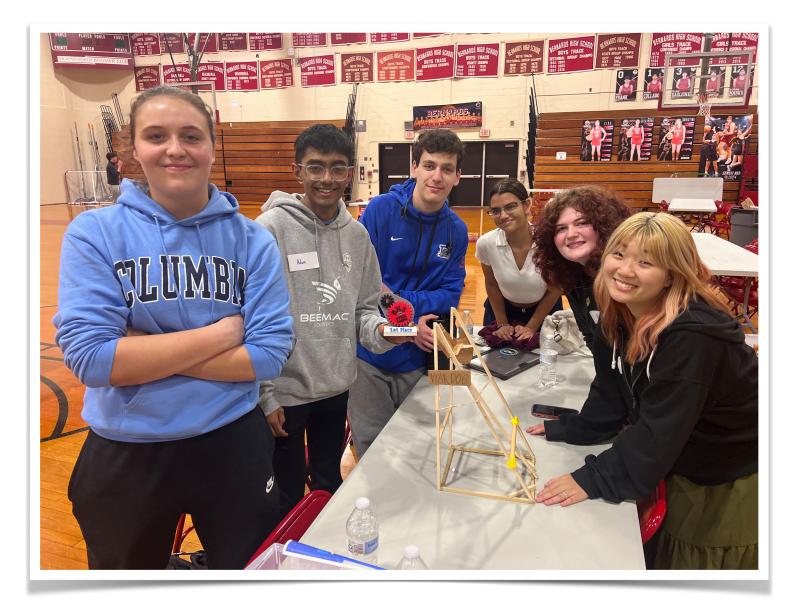

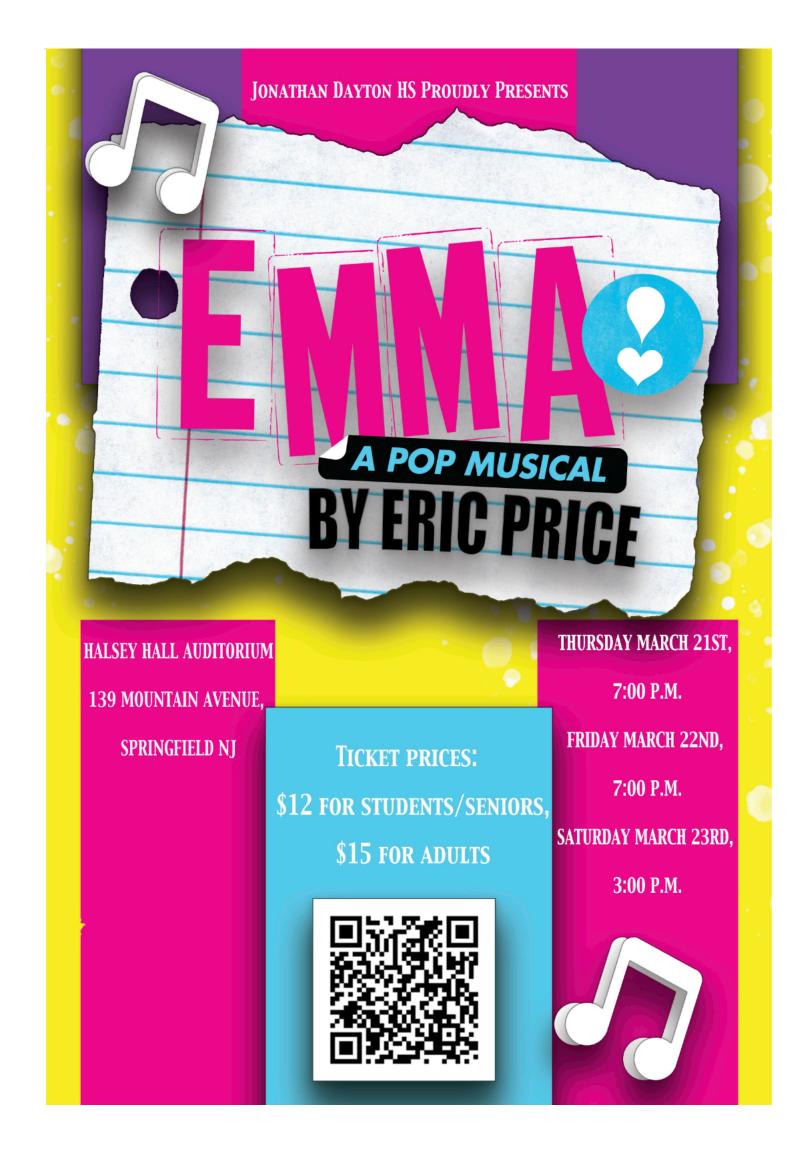
