


PROUD TO BE KSD!

Safety First: Innovative Officer Program Launches

in Elementary Schools

As the district continues to look to enhance safety, Elementary School Safety Officers (SSOs) were introduced in the 2023-24 academic year, thanks to funding from the local Educational Program & Operations Levy.

With an ongoing recruitment process, the district aims to ensure every elementary school benefits from the presence of SSOs. These officers do more than traditional security; they build meaningful connections within the school community, participate in emergency preparedness, and engage in regular drills, all while being supported by a partnership with the Kennewick Police Department (KPD). This collaboration ensures SSOs receive top-tier training in critical response skills, including de-escalation techniques and active shooter scenarios, and provides them with essential tools like access to police radio channels for emergency communication. This comprehensive approach not only strengthens the physical security of schools but also nurtures a safe and inclusive environment conducive to learning and growth.

Exciting Changes Ahead: Our New K-5 Math Curriculum Review

In the 2023-24 school year, our district initiated a K-5 math curriculum review, aiming to elevate educational standards. The new math curriculum will align with Washington's Learning Standards for Elementary Mathematics, focusing on critical mathematical concepts and ensuring every student has access to quality education and state-of-the-art digital tools. The new math resources will meet varied learning needs, making math both accessible and engaging. A crucial phase of this process involves parent feedback, allowing for a community-informed decision. Recommendations from this collaborative review will be presented to the school board in spring 2024, with the goal of implementing the updated curriculum in the 2024-25 school year. This initiative marks a significant step towards ensuring that students are equipped with the knowledge and skills for future success.

- ▶ 78% of students, 88% of families, and 88% of staff reporting that students have opportunities to learn the digital citizenship, social, life and employment skills within the KSD Learner Profile
- > 74% of students/parents interested in dual language have access to the program

Exploring Financial Literacy as Key Component

of High School Education

At the start of the 2023-24 school year, KSD started exploring the idea of adopting a financial literacy graduation requirement for all high school students. This class would teach important skills like how to budget, save money and make smart choices about spending and investing. Understanding money can make a big difference in being ready for adult life and feeling secure about financial matters. The district plans to study a variety of options, including whether financial literacy should be a new class or if existing classes could be modified to integrate financial literacy. The district plans to make a recommendation to the school board during 2024.

- 86% of high school students completing at least one dual credit, college-level course by the end of grade 12
- > 87% of students graduating in five years (Class of 2021)

It's a step forward in making sure every family feels included and informed about their child's learning journey. Whether it's report cards, parent-teacher conferences, or important announcements, we're committed to breaking down language barriers. This initiative reflects our belief that a strong partnership between school and home is key to student success. We're here to support every family in our diverse community, ensuring all parents have the information they need to be active participants in their child's education.

KSD continues to build Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) that shift the educational focus from teaching to learning, harnessing the power of educator collaboration to ensure student success. PLCs focus on three core principles: ensuring students learn, fostering a culture of collaboration, and focusing on results. These principles guide our schools towards sustained improvement by promoting shared responsibility for student learning, systematic collaboration among teachers, and the use of data to drive instructional decisions. The success of PLCs hinges on commitment to these ideals, implying that a true professional learning community goes beyond mere cooperation, embedding these principles deeply into the school's culture for lasting educational improvement.

A Community Effort: Enhancing Education Through Volunteerism



Community Investment Pays Off: Kennewick Schools Enter a New Era of Excellence

In January 2024, Ridge View Elementary School opened its doors, marking the culmination of the 2019 Capital Projects Bond—an endeavor that has reshaped the educational landscape in Kennewick. This final project joins the ranks of newly developed Kennewick High School and expanded education and athletic facilities at Kamiakin and Southridge High Schools, alongside the significant renovation of Amistad Elementary. Funded by local bond dollars and supplemented by the state's School Construction Assistance Program (SCAP), the bond reinforces our community's commitment to providing state-of-the-art educational environments for students.

The successful passage of a technology levy in 2022 and the local Education Programs & Operations (EP&O) Levy in February 2023 provides student supports in the areas of health and safety, student learning, staffing, and athletics and activities. This support comes at a crucial time, especially after the tax hiatus in 2023 due to the levy failures the previous year.
