

The Oakwood Rotary Club is developing the plan for this annual event scheduled for Saturday, May 18. Details about the event will be posted to the city website once they are available.




### **Gardner Pool Hours**

## **Memorial Day Holiday Closing**

City offices, including the OCC and Public Works Center, will be closed on Monday, May 27. The OCC Office and Health Center will be open from 8 a.m. – 2 p.m. on Saturday, May 25 and from 12 – 5 p.m. on Sunday, May 26.



## **Memorial Day Trash Pick-up**

Trash pick-up for all routes the week of May 27 will occur one day later than usual. Monday's route will be picked up Tuesday; Tuesday's route will be picked up Wednesday; Wednesday's route will be picked up Thursday and Thursday's route will be picked up Friday.



## Do Not Place Yard Debris in the Street or in Center Medians

The city of Oakwood offers several options for disposal of yard debris. The most popular method is via the monthly yard debris pickup. Residents may place piles of yard debris – brush and branches – into the tree lawn area at their property frontage just behind the curb or edge of pavement for pickup by the city. Residents should not place yard debris in front of other properties, nor should they place yard debris in any roadway center medians.

Under no circumstance should residents place anything in the street or roadway gutter (except leaves in the fall during the published leaf collection schedule). Any amount of debris in the street is an obstruction and disrupts the stormwater collection system by diverting water away from the intended storm drains. Debris in the street can be dangerous to vehicles and is hard to see at night. Debris in the street also interferes with on-street parking and is a danger to pedestrians, joggers, and bicyclists.

Placing anything in the street is a violation of Oakwood Codified Ordinance 901.01 (A)(3). As of January 1, 2023, the city's code enforcement officer responds to yard debris piles placed in the gutter or street by leaving a door-hanger notice at the property affording two business days to remove the obstruction from the street. After two days, the city will remove the obstruction and will charge the property owner \$150.

Property owners who routinely use the city's monthly collection program and wish to construct a hard surface pad (e.g., concrete, brick, paver) for debris placement should contact the code enforcement officer at (937) 297-2920 or see the city website for permitting information.

In addition to the monthly pick-up, the city offers other options for disposing of yard debris, such as the 24/7/365 drop-off facility at the J.D. Foell Public Works Center. Also, residents are provided two free special pickups per year, which can be used for yard debris. Additionally, dumpsters are available to be delivered free of charge for large amounts of green waste. ## **Spring Styrofoam Recycling Event**

The city of Oakwood is partnering with Green Oakwood to provide a spring Styrofoam recycling event for the Oakwood community. Styrofoam will be collected (only during the time of this event) at the Yard Waste and Recycling Drop-Off facility located at the front entrance to the J. David Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Boulevard, on Saturday, April 13. Watch the city's website and Green Oakwood's Facebook page for collection hours. Green Oakwood will transport the collected Styrofoam to the Montgomery County Environmental Services Styrofoam recycling event.

Aside from Styrofoam recycling, the Public Works Center will be open that day for mulch pickup consistent with the article on the back page. No other Public Works services will be available that day.

## **Oakwood Sustainability Measures**

Over the past several decades, the city of Oakwood has implemented numerous measures to address matters of the environment and provide for the betterment of Oakwood and the greater community. See the city website for a detailed list of the sustainability measures.

## Recycle Ink Cartridges & Phone Cases at the OCC!

In an effort to offer more recycling opportunities within our community, Green Oakwood has provided a collection box for ink cartridges, cell phone cases and pop sockets at the Oakwood Community Center (OCC). The collection box is located near the front desk window. Ink cartridges will be taken to Target (or another retailer) and cell phone cases will be recycled through TerraCycle. Happy Recycling!



## 2024 Asphalt Roadway Resurfacing

The 2024 asphalt repaving project will take place this summer on Far Hills Avenue (State Route 48) from the south to the north corporation lines. The City Public Works Department is performing some utility work and tree trimming on Far Hills in advance of the repaving. The project will be managed by the Ohio Department of Transportation and the state will provide a majority of the funding for the project.

## **Annual Fire Hydrant Flushing**

The annual fire hydrant flushing will begin the week of April 1 and last approximately five weeks. Please check the city website for the dates of flushing in your neighborhood.

## **2024 Concrete Street Repairs**

Repairs will be made to several concrete streets throughout Oakwood, which may include concrete replacement or asphalt patching. The city will inform impacted property owners prior to the start of work.

## **Oakwood Rotary Hazardous Waste Pickup**

There are two ways for residents to properly dispose of household hazardous material. Residents may: 1) drop off the material at the Montgomery County Transfer Station (see www.mcswd.org for more information); or 2) use the quarterly Oakwood Rotary Club Hazardous Waste Collection program. The 2024 collection dates are Saturday, April 20, Saturday, July 20 and Saturday, October 19. Call (937) 296-5155 to sign up for the service. It is provided free of charge, but the Oakwood Rotary Club accepts donations. Donations to the "Oakwood Rotary Club Foundation" can be placed in an envelope and left with the items being disposed, or may be mailed to: Oakwood Rotary Club Foundation, PO Box 512, Dayton, OH 45409. All donations support charitable projects and community events led by your Oakwood Rotary!

### **Leash Law**

Dogs are required to be securely leashed and under the reasonable control of the owner, keeper or agent thereof whenever they are on public sidewalks, streets or any other public rights-of-way. Dogs must also be leashed and controlled in city natural areas such as Elizabeth Gardens and Houk's Stream, and are prohibited altogether in the city's primary parks (Cook, Fairridge, Orchardly and Shafor Parks) and Smith Gardens. These rules apply to all dogs in Oakwood, although there are certain exceptions for service animals and for dogs using the Creager Field Dog Park.

Oakwood is densely populated and we have a very large number of dogs, around 1,000 registered in Oakwood, where we have nearly 4,000 homes. The leash law is designed to mitigate the unpredictability of dogs and to protect both citizens and other animals from unexpected and unwanted encounters. Even the most well-trained dogs, under the right set of circumstances, can be unpredictable. Citizens should be able to move about the public sidewalks and rights-of-way freely and without concern or fear from unleashed dogs.

## **Picking up after your Pets**

Dogipot stations are available throughout the city to help pet owners with an easy and safe clean-up (see city website for location map). There are few things that aggravate neighbors more than a pet owner who does not clean up after their pet. Besides being an unsightly mess, a number of common diseases can be transmitted to pets and people through feces. Failing to clean up after your pet is fineable under the Oakwood General Offenses Code. Please be a responsible pet owner and help keep our Oakwood community clean.

## **Is Your Home Ready for Spring?**

Warm weather is upon us and, with it, a need to look over your property after the winter months. Please consider the following questions to determine if and what exterior repairs are needed in order to remain in compliance with Oakwood's Property Maintenance Code.

#### **YARD**

- Are all weeds and grass less than 8 inches in height?
- Is the yard free from overgrown, uncontrolled vegetation, and fallen tree branches?



- Is the yard free from miscellaneous storage, debris, and refuse?
- · Are sidewalks clear of plant overgrowth?
- Are all vehicles licensed, operable, and parked on a paved surface?

#### **EXTERIOR WALLS & GARAGES**

- Do they have any holes or cracks, or are they in need of paint?
- Is siding in need of cleaning from algae, mildew, or mold?



#### **ACCESSORY BUILDINGS (SHEDS, FENCES, ETC.)**

- Are fences and shed walls, doors, and roofs in good repair?
- Do sheds or fences need to be painted?

#### **DRIVEWAY & WALKWAYS**

- · Are they free of potholes and raveling?
- · Are they free from debris, storage, and refuse?

#### **PORCHES**

- Do the steps, railings, or floorboards need to be repaired or replaced?
- Is it free from debris, storage, and refuse?



#### **GUTTERS & DOWNSPOUTS**

- · Do they need to be painted or repaired?
- Do they direct water away from the primary building?

#### **WINDOWS & DOORS**

- · Are they weather tight and operable?
- Is any glass broken or missing?
- Do the screens need to be repaired or replaced?
- Do the sashes and/or trim need to be repaired or repainted?

## Is Your Garage Sale Sign in the Right Spot?



With spring approaching, it is time for garage sale signs to start appearing, so here are a few reminders.

- Signs advertising for a garage sale are permitted at the garage sale location only.
- No directional or lead-in garage sale signs are permitted in the city's rightof-way or on any property that is not the premises of the garage sale.
- · Signs in violation of this regulation will be removed.

Garage sales are permitted in residential zoning districts from 8:00 a.m. to sundown on weekdays and Saturdays, and from 9:00 a.m. to sundown on Sundays and holidays. Garage sales do not require a permit, but may only be held for three (3) consecutive days, with a limit of two garage sales in a calendar year.

## Lawn Treatment on City-Owned Public Lawn Areas

Well-kept lawns and green spaces within the city are an important part of the health of these areas and maintaining Oakwood's ambiance. The city has used Integrated Pest Management (IPM) practices for a number of years on the city-owned public lawn areas which include parks, boulevards, athletic fields, and around public buildings, IPM is an ecosystem-based strategy that focuses on long-term prevention of pests or their damage through a combination of techniques such as biological control, habitat manipulation, modification of cultural practices, and use of resistant varieties. Pesticides are used only after monitoring indicates they are needed according to established guidelines, and treatments are made with the goal of removing only the target organism. Pest control materials are selected and applied in a manner that minimizes risks to human health, beneficial and nontarget organisms, and the environment. Our practices include adherence to proper mowing heights and the use of sharp blades on mowers which helps reduce the amount of chemicals used in all of the public areas. The city requires that all lawn care contractors, whether treating for pests or weeds, are properly licensed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, and follow all applicable laws and rules promulgated by the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

In our parks, lawn care treatments require the posting of temporary signage in conspicuous locations at least two days prior to treatment. The day of treatment, the city Horticulturist and/or Recreation Supervisor meet the contractor on-site prior to the application of any treatment. They ensure that children are not present in the area to be treated and that the area is otherwise clear for the application, before allowing the contractor to proceed with lawn treatment. Immediately following treatment, the city verifies that all signs are properly placed, and are then promptly removed 24 hours thereafter. Only areas with weeds and pests are spot sprayed, not always the entire green space as this is a part of the IPM practice to limit chemical use yet still keep the community greenspace as healthy as possible. ## **Door-To-Door Soliciting and Canvassing** -"No Solicitation" Designation

The city of Oakwood provides residential property owners with a means to prohibit certain types of door-to-door solicitation and canvassing. This is addressed in Chapter 733 of the Oakwood Codified Ordinances and can be accomplished by residents requesting that their property be included on the city's "Do Not Solicit" list.

## Wright at Home - 2024

The Oakwood Historical Society and Dayton History are pleased to announce the return of a special Oakwood event—Wright at Home. This immersive tour will be held on Sunday, April 28, from noon-5:00 PM.

How many times have you driven by Hawthorn Hill and said to yourself, "Someday, I should visit Oakwood's iconic landmark?" Well April 28 is the day! The Wright at Home event features an open-house style experience in which knowledgeable docents are positioned throughout the home where Orville, Katharine and their father, Bishop Milton Wright, lived. The docents will share stories about the Wright family and about some of the illustrious visitors to Hawthorn Hill such as Henry Ford, Thomas Edison, and even Charles Lindbergh. This year the tour will feature a 150th anniversary celebration of Katharine Wright's birth in 1874. Pictures, artifacts and anecdotes will tell Katharine's story and her critical role in the success of the Wright family.

In addition to the house tour, docents will be available to take you on a short neighborhood walking tour where you will hear about Orville's famous neighbors. Learn about the founder of Cheez-It© Crackers, a well-known Dayton architect who designed many of the prominent homes and buildings in Oakwood, the rags-toriches story of a German immigrant who earned the title "Maker of Machines," and more. After the tours, relax with some light refreshments including Orville's favorite cookies, meet Stephen Wright, great grandnephew of Wilbur and Orville Wright, and peruse the gifts and books for sale about Oakwood and the Wright brothers.

Proceeds from this event directly benefit Dayton History and The Oakwood Historical Society. two nonprofit organizations dedicated to preserving and celebrating the history of our community. ## **Spring Crime Prevention Tips**

The Oakwood Public Safety Department offers a few tips to keep yourself and your home safe during the spring and summer months.



- With the arrival of warmer temperatures, many people open windows or sliding glass doors while they are at home. Always remember to close and lock your windows and doors before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Remember to lock any shed, storage unit, or garage you have on your property.
- Be aware of home improvement scams. If you did not solicit the contractor or salesman, investigate the company before making the decision to do business with that person.
- If a utility representative comes to your house, request identification. True representatives will carry their identification and they will gladly show it to you.
- If necessary, contact the company or Oakwood Public Safety Department for verification.
- Historically, during the warmer weather months, personal property crimes increase. Residents tend to leave items such as bicycles, gardening tools, lawnmowers, and other yard tools out in the open. Make sure you lock up your personal property when unattended. It does not take long for someone to quickly take your property that has been left in the yard.
- Always remember to roll up your car windows and remove valuables, even if your vehicle is parked in your driveway.
- Being a good neighbor can be one of the best crime prevention tools. If you observe any unusual or suspicious activity, please contact the Oakwood Public Safety Department at (937) 298-2122.

## **Refuse Program**

Oakwood has one of the most comprehensive refuse collection, disposal and recycling programs in the Dayton region. Our services include:

- · Backdoor pickup of weekly household trash.
- Backdoor pickup of co-mingled recyclables including paper, newspaper, glass, plastic, cardboard, and metal cans.
- · Monthly yard debris (green waste) pickup.
- Special pickups for disposal of larger household items.
- Fall leaf pickup and conversion of leaves to mulch, with free "do-it-yourself" pickup or delivery back to residents for a fee.



- Dumpsters for efficient disposal of remodeling debris from "do-it-yourself" projects, or other household or yard items.
- The recycling facility located at the entrance of the public works yard, 210 Shafor Boulevard, accommodates the 24/7/365 drop-off of green waste (yard debris), cardboard, and co-mingled recyclables such as glass, plastics and metal cans.
- Opportunities for residents to dispose of large household items and other debris through the monthly drop-off at the Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Boulevard. This is open from 8 a.m. until 12 noon on the first Saturday of each month.





## **April/May City Council Meetings**

City Council will meet in regular public sessions at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, April 1 and Monday, May 6. Both meetings will take place at the city building, 30 Park Avenue. The regular sessions are preceded by an open work session beginning at 6:30 p.m. The regular sessions are televised live on the City website at www.oakwoodohio.gov, and on cable TV (Spectrum Ch. 6, TV Tuner Ch. 5.203 and AT&T U-verse Ch. 99). The meetings are also accessible via the Zoom remote meeting platform. Links to the meeting will be posted to the City website at 4 p.m. on the meeting date. Meeting videos will be rebroadcast on television for a week or so afterward. Please check your cable guide or www.mvcc.net for broadcast times. Meeting videos can also be viewed on the City website at any time.

2023 Oakwood Income Tax Returns Due April 15

The city of Oakwood has a mandatory filing requirement for all residents. Every individual, 18 years of age or older, who resides in Oakwood, or maintains Oakwood as their city of residency, must file an Oakwood City income tax return, whether or not there is any taxable income to report. Retired residents who have income derived exclusively from non-taxable sources (interest, dividend, social security and/or pension income, etc.) must first file a final return in order to be exempt from the filing requirement.

If you have filed for an extension of time to file your federal return, you will automatically receive an Oakwood extension. You should attach a copy of your federal extension to your return when filing so that you will not be charged a late filing penalty. Your extended return is due the same date as your extended federal return — October 15, 2024. If you do not have a federal extension, you may still obtain an Oakwood extension. Simply complete an extension request form, located on the city's website, and submit your request by April 15, 2024. As always, an extension of time to file your returns does not extend the time to pay your taxes. All taxes paid after April 15, 2024 will be subject to a 15% late payment penalty and interest.

The 2023 Oakwood income tax return is available on the city's website at www.oakwoodohio.gov. If you do not have internet access, forms will be made available at the City administrative offices, Wright Memorial Public Library and the Oakwood Community Center. Full-year residents with W-2 wage income only will be able to file their 2023 City of Oakwood income tax return online. Visit the city's website for additional information.

If you need assistance with the preparation of your Oakwood return, please contact the Tax Department at (937) 298-0531. Normal business hours for the tax office are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Extended hours will be provided April 12 and 15, when the office will be open until 6:00 p.m.

The Income Tax Department contracts with Fifth Third Bank to process tax payments and image tax documents. This allows tax payments to be processed efficiently and provides added security, eliminating most of our storage needs for paper records.

### **Winter Grants**

The Oakwood Schools Foundation continues to fulfill its mission to support and enhance the education of Oakwood students. On February 12, 2024, Emma Butler, OSF Trustee and Chair of the Grants and Programs Committee, presented School Board President John Wilson with an award of over \$12,000 to support new teacher-led initiatives in Oakwood schools. 



## **Leaf Mulch Program**

Citizens have two options again this year for obtaining leaf mulch. For those who want mulch delivered, we offer 3 cubic yards for \$100 and 6 cubic yards for \$150. Please call (937) 298-0777 to place an order. Mulch deliveries will take place on five Saturdays from April 13 to May 11. On the same five Saturdays, residents can obtain free mulch from the Foell Public Works Center at 210 Shafor Blvd. between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., but must haul the material themselves and must provide proof of residency. The free mulch is for Oakwood residents only and no commercial vehicles are permitted.



## **Spring Yard and Garden Cleanup**

The city collects yard debris from property frontages monthly from January through September, and bi-weekly from October through December. Refer to the enclosed map for your scheduled pickup days and please plan your work accordingly. Here are a few things to remember:

- Place larger piles of yard debris including brush and branches in the tree lawn area just behind the curb. Branches should be no longer than 6 feet and should be placed in manageable piles. Do not place these piles around trees, fire hydrants, cable TV boxes or posts/poles.
- Do not place any yard debris in the street or gutter line, except leaves during the published fall leaf collection season.
- Under no circumstance should you place anything except yard debris for pick-up in the tree lawn area.
- The city will not pick up contractor-generated vard debris.

- If you have a large amount of yard debris, please call for a free dumpster, but remember that this dumpster must only include yard debris.
- Do not stack loose yard debris around or on top of your garbage cans.
- Please remember the 35-gallon and 60-pound limits on trash cans and that all cans must have lids.
- Grass clippings are not accepted, either with regular trash or curbside yard debris collection or at the recycling and yard waste drop-off site. Please use a mulching mower or home composting.
