#### NOTES FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

Spring is here, and for some, so is allergy season. If your child suffers from environmental allergies and allergy meds are used for management of symptoms, now is a good time to start the regimen. I also recommend reinforcing the habit of washing their hands and face and blowing their nose after being outside, and

therefore exposed to allergens. This same vigilance applies to possible exposure to poison ivy, which is spread by urushiol oil; wearing gloves to help out in the yard, washing hands thoroughly when they come inside, and changing clothes decreases the potential that exposure to poison ivy will become a problem.

Be sure to keep an eye open for ticks! Make a point to brush off clothing and examine their extremities, back, and back of the neck when coming inside from play. Some extra attention to the scalp is a good idea too. Early detection goes a long way when fending off tick-borne illness, and teaching children how to examine their skin is a good self-care habit to last a lifetime.

Outdoor recess will be more frequent, weather permitting. The playground area is sometimes wet, the blacktop often sandy, and slips and falls can occur. Slides and flip-flops are not allowed per school policy. Sneakers or other closed-toe shoes provide the best traction for outdoor play, and it is advisable to pack a change of pants or leggings should your child get wet during recess time.

Please continue to report the reason for absence to the main office or to me. If your child sees a physician for assessment, please obtain a note excusing their absence. Thank you for your cooperation.

Children are practicing how to say and frame a social problem without using "blaming" words like "always" or "never"

in order to be able to state a problem in a way that is not offensive or inflammatory. They are learning that we are able to do our best thinking when we are calm and practicing what to say and do when faced with a common social problem. We have even begun using "STEP" out at recess by referencing these skills when children encounter a problem! This unit will take us through the remainder of the school year. As always, it is a pleasure to work with our amazing students!

Our preschool classes have been enjoying the occasional warmer temperature days and are eagerly awaiting the days of not needing our jackets outside! Last month our focus was around The 3 R's -> Reduce, Reuse, Recycle! We learned all about the importance of recycling and how to reuse some of those materials. Students had a lot of fun being

creative and imaginative, turning our recyclables into new treasures! In math we have continued exploring numerals 0-20 and have demonstrated various ways to show a number. Kindergarten students and teachers are gearing up for a busy April! During our Heggerty and Fundations lessons, we will continue to improve our decoding skills by studying short and long vowel sounds in words. We will also start

the next Wit & Wisdom unit called "America, Then and Now" and look closely at how life in America has changed over time. In math, we will begin our Unit 6 work with addition and subtraction to 10. During science lessons, kindergartners will notice the weather changes we see in spring and begin a unit on pushes and pulls, examining the ways these forces impact our daily life.

For social emotional learning, we will continue to learn strategies to problem solve as well as building strategies for feelings regulation.

Our second graders continue to grow as we welcome the month of April!

In math, we are still working on our measurement unit. We started this unit by talking about measuring in inches and centimeters. We have progressed into measurement in feet and meters. As

we dive deeper into the unit, students will learn to add and subtract lengths, as well as how to plot measurement data on a line plot.

In our Wit & Wisdom curriculum, we will be moving into module 3, entitled Civil Rights Heroes. This module will study several well-known civil rights heroes who responded to the injustice they saw and experienced. Two of those important heroes we will study are Ruby Bridges and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The essential question that we will answer by the end of the module is, 'How can people respond to injustice?' #### **Chores for Kids Can Help Them Find Math Around the House**

With young children at home, there's always cleaning to be done. So why not include them in completing the chores? If we give children purposeful work that helps them feel responsible, involved, and important, they often are eager to pitch in.

There are different ways we can do this depending on the age of our children. And there are so many ways to support their mathematical thinking while we're at it. Chores for kids can engage everyone in the household in a little "math all around us" problem-solving.

Children are ready to take on simple chores such as helping set or clear the table or clean up their toys and belongings. Deepen their understanding by asking questions that invite them use spatial language themselves, such as:

- Which drawer has the silverware in it?
- Where do we put containers that can be recycled?
- Can you get the window-spray from the cupboard under the sink?

When children help you map out the places in the room where things go, they build their sense of responsibility as well as increase their awareness of space and location. Ask children to describe where things are in relation to each other.

Not interested in making maps? No problem! Just make a list. Depending on what room you're cleaning, have children look around and think about what tasks need to be done. Then you can talk about the order of jobs and problem-solve a fair way to divide them up.

"If we have six things, who will do what?" Do you want to divide things up equally? If so, how many tasks does that mean we will each have to complete? But are some jobs bigger than others? Could more than one person work on the same chore?"

If you have sticky notes (or use small squares of paper and tape), children can help write each chore on a separate note and post them up on a blank wall or door. As more notes go up, the amount of work that needs to be done can be seen. As the discussion about who does what begins, move the notes around accordingly and the finished product will be a clear list of tasks for each person. Then, as the work is completed, notes can be removed, and everyone can watch with satisfaction as the work disappears one task at a time.

Find math in everyday chores for kids and find yourself with a cleaner house at the same time. Win-win!

# **Coping Skills Corner**

Happy April KES families and welcome to another month of coping skills! With spring upon us, I thought this month would be an ideal time to focus on being mindful and present in the moment; but what exactly does that mean? There are essentially two types of mindfulness: one is the ability to be fully aware of your present feelings, thoughts, and environment without judgement, and the other is to be bogged down by constant thoughts and chaos in your head; hence, mindful versus mind-full. When we talk about being mindful, we focus more on being present in the moment, aware of our thoughts and feelings, and more importantly, not judging how we feel or putting a label to it. When we are able to be more mindful we become better able to name our emotions and identify triggers, more attentive to the outside world, and overall we have an increased quality of life as we are no longer mind-full with anxious thoughts or worries.

So how do we become more mindful? That's a great question! First, we can make small changes to start by putting down our phones, tablets, or electronics when we are with family or friends and being more present in the conversation or situation. We can use "I" statements and express how we feel in the moment; "I feel (emotion words) right now/when..." Once we take those small steps, we can then begin to incorporate more techniques into our daily routines. Some other ways we can be mindful are being outside; with the weather beginning to warm up a little, getting outside is such a great way to practice mindfulness. Use all of your senses to notice the sounds, colors, and smells of areas you may have explored before, but try to find something new. You can be mindful when you are in your home by reading a book and looking at the pictures, the colors, and feel the book in your hands. Mindfulness can look like smelling the smells, seeing the colors, and tasting your food when cooking and eating, it can look like doing some yoga or coloring, and it can look like whole body listening when others are talking or sharing. Being mindful is just another great way we can learn more about ourselves and the world around us.

Some mindfulness techniques we can do whenever and wherever!


#### FOCUS FLOWER


