Watkins Memorial graduate and Kirkersville resident Sara Renner Exel was living the big city dream, working in the fashion industry in New York City. She moved there after getting her degree from Columbus College of Art & Design in fashion design and took a job with American Eagle. "It was like the movie, *Sweet Home Alabama* — moving from a small town to the biggest city in the world," Sara said. "I honestly didn't think I was going to come back — I was dreaming about the high life of being in the fashion world." However, she was never far from home.

While living in New York, Sara maintained a relationship with her now husband, Keith. She moved back to Ohio and the couple eventually married. The Exels settled in Kirkersville with their blended family, which includes a three-year-old daughter, and two sons, Parker, a first-grader at Kirkersville, and Chael, a freshman at Watkins Memorial.

Sara continues to work in the fashion industry – currently with Abercrombie. However, she's ready to channel her experience and talent in a new direction. "I'm going back to school to be an art teacher," she said. "I'm not capped out in the fashion world – It's just that I don't want that anymore – my priorities are different."

Sara's creativity and interest in teaching were fostered at home and school. "My greatgrandma was a teacher and my grandma went to CCAD in the sixties — I feel the mentality of teaching and creativity is in my blood," she said. "And now having little kids, I just want to pass down my knowledge and what I've experienced to new generations."



Sara's student experience at Watkins prepared her for both college and career. "I focused on art classes because I was going to CCAD and the teachers prepared me to interview and to think out of the box — that was a big, big deal to me," Sara said. "I still remember all of that and I don't know if I would have been able to go there if they didn't push me."

One of the most significant things Sara has noticed since she returned to the district is the physical changes in the community and the school buildings. "It's crazy to see how much it's grown...it's so beyond what I remember. Parker is in first grade and they're learning fractions and he was learning to read — I don't remember doing that when I was in the first grade — I remember someone reading to me. His teacher, Mrs. Bales is amazing — I love her hands-on approach."

Aiden McGuire Open Doors to Career Readiness

Aiden's mom, Sarah, says, "Aiden is unique and has never quite fit in a box." Part of that uniqueness is related to the challenges caused by autism and attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder. When Aiden was first diagnosed, Sarah read so much about limitations that it was easy to get lost in the deficits. "He needs people working with him to see what he CAN do," she said. "With OOD, he's got that."

The family worked through Aiden's middle school to connect with Tyde Flowers, OOD Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor (VRC). Tyde introduced them to services that could support Aiden when he turned 14, transitioning from high school to college, career, and adulthood.

Since 2021, Aiden has received Pre-Employment Transition Services and has participated in the Summer Youth Work Experience. As part of OOD's job development services, he worked with Michelle Hindel, OOD VRC, to prepare for employment, and he landed a job with Goodwill Johnstown right out of his interview.

Together, they've also explored Aiden's career interests and education goals. Aiden is interested in politics and public policy, particularly in international affairs. He wants to bring a "younger presence to the conservative political landscape" and a willingness to research and understand the history and background of topics important to our country. Michelle coordinated a visit to the Ohio Statehouse for Aiden with Michael Graham, OOD Legislative Liaison, and Jon Hackathorn, Ohio Vocational Apprentice Program Administrator. Michael and Jon gave Aiden and his dad a building tour, including the Rotunda, map room, and chambers. Afterward, the four discussed various education, apprenticeship, and career paths Aiden could take to achieve his goals.

Although he quickly points out that his mom has helped him the most, Aiden shared that OOD has been a major help. "Saying you want to do something is one thing, but having a process that lets you actually go do it is a much better experience," Aiden said.

Sarah appreciates that services are personalized and connected to work, post-secondary planning, and career exploration. "OOD has been a big help to our family. It has really opened doors for him," she explained.

TREASURER UPDATE

Did you know that the Treasurer's Office of the Southwest Licking Local School District functions as a small business office? We employ five staff members that handle various tasks. The office is led by Treasurer, Richard Jones who is in his 25th year with the District. Assisting him is the Director of Financial Operation, Stacy Johnson. Stacy is in her 11th year with the District. Daily activities include ensuring that all state laws are abided by, working with the District administration, and monitoring fiscal procedures. The department is then broken down into three functions, Accounts Payable, Accounts Receivable and Payroll.

Accounts Payable: Pam Conaway is responsible for Accounts Payable. She receives invoices daily and it is her responsibility to make sure that the District is processing payments to our vendors in a timely and accurate manner. Part of Pam's process is to make sure that a purchase order is in place for the purchase and that the correct account code has been entered. She also verifies that all goods and services have been received. On a monthly basis, Pam is issuing on average 400 payments to various suppliers. Pam has worked in various departments for Southwest Licking Schools for close to 17 years.

Accounts Receivable: Amy Vaughan handles the daily pay-ins, receipts and Student Activity accounts. She has been with the District for a little over a year now and she ensures that all funds received by the District are entered into the accounting software system. A monthly average of receipts for Amy to process is close to 100 receipts, totalling millions of dollars. She also assists our staff with Student Activity accounts, enabling the staff to go above and beyond for the students of the District.

Payroll: Molly Smith is closing in on her two year anniversary with Southwest Licking and she has the task of paying the employees of the District semi-monthly. Each payroll includes over 600 full time and substitute employees. Many of those employees are hourly employees, and Molly verifies that their contracted time matches up with the actual time recorded by our time clock system. She also assists new staff members with understanding their pay and benefits. Staffing and Benefits makes up the majority of the District spending. Molly verifies before payroll is processed that contracts are issued and the correct expenditure accounts are tied to each employee.


TRANSPORTATION UPDATE Ryan Brown, Director of Logistics



Springtime is here, and with it, more students will be out and about walking and riding their bicycles. We want to remind everyone to be safe around our schools, our local parks, and our school buses. With the size of our growing community, we are always going to have some traffic congestion around each of our schools at arrival and dismissal times. We are very grateful for everyone's patience.

Unfortunately, we continue to have a large number of motorists running our school bus red lights. If a bus has its red lights on and/or flashing, this means it is loading or unloading students. It is illegal to pass a bus when this is happening. Not only is it illegal it is also extremely dangerous for our students. Any motorists that violate this law are turned over to the state highway patrol for investigation. If you have young or new drivers in your household, please have a conversation with them about stopping for school buses when the lights are red. We encourage all motorists to be extra cautious around our school buses because they are transporting our district's most precious cargo...our students.

Spring brings warmer temperatures. With warmer temperatures, we tend to see a rise in misbehavior on the bus. Each building and individual bus driver work hard to remind students that the bus is an extension of the classroom with similar rules and expectations. We ask that you take a few moments to remind your children of your expectations of behavior on the bus. Riding the bus is a privilege that can be taken away if students are not safe behaviors while practicing ridina. Encourage your child to strive to be one of the students recognized by their driver as a positive role model on the bus.

The NSBW campaign theme, "Surfs Up with School Breakfast," reminds the entire school community that school breakfast provides a healthy and energizing start to the day for students. Studies show that students who eat school breakfast are more likely to:

- reach higher levels of achievement in reading and math
- score higher on standardized tests
- have better concentration and memory
- be more alert
- maintain a healthy weight

The SWL Food Service Staff introduced new potential breakfast items and held contests and drawings to help foster excitement in the school breakfast program.

Farm to School


The SWL Food Service Team is excited to partner with the middle and high school agriculture programs. The Ag programs teach students the science, business, and technology of agriculture, food and environmental/natural resource systems. The students will learn about and help grow various produce that will then be used in our school kitchens and served as part of our student meals. They will grow lettuce both from the ground and in the hydroponic towers. Various produce such as radishes, carrots, tomatoes, spinach, cauliflower, and berries may be options that Food Service will be able to sample from the students' harvest.

The food service team is also reaching out to various local farmers in the hopes to collaborate with them and supplement the district's meal program. We intend to purchase a variety of quality local produce that we could serve alongside our current food products to be served in all of our schools. Stay tuned!

- → 7th grade requirement One dose of Tdap and one dose of Meningococcal (MCV4) vaccine
- → 12th grade requirement Second dose of Meningococcal (MCV4) vaccine

It has been a wonderful year so far at the SWL Digital Academy. During the first semester, we had eighty four full-time 6th through 12th grade students enrolled. So far during the second semester, we have one hundred twenty one students enrolled full-time. These students have had the opportunity to learn at their own pace on their own time. Though online learning is not for every student, the SWL Digital Academy has provided our students another opportunity to access curriculum and be successful.

As we look toward the end of the year, all of our current students are encouraged to keep up with their pacing within their courses and continue to submit their guided notes. Students need to make sure they are keeping their current grades up while also increasing the number of hours they are online each week. Parents/guardians should be encouraging their child to create and stick to a daily schedule. This is the easiest way to make sure they stay on track for the semester.

EARLY LEARNING CENTER

Children use language structures as a basis for learning how to read. Incorporating a child's personal use of oral language is a big part of early literacy learning. It is important for the adults in children's lives to facilitate and support the growth of a child's spoken language beginning in infancy.

This simple activity of shared enjoyment, blowing bubbles, provides multiple opportunities for language for every level of development.

- This helps develop:
 - pointing
 - /b/ and /p/ sounds
 - requesting
 - commenting
 - labeling body parts
 - following directions
 - opposites
 - descriptor words
 - action words

Ways to support Oral Language Development

- Speak with your child vs talking to your child
 - Listening is a passive activity. The brain doesn't have to do much work. Using expressive language, perhaps in the form of babbling, utterances, short phrases, etc., allows a child to develop vocabulary and convey a message.
- Dramatization of Stories
 - After reading a story use props to retell the story.
- Wordless Books
 - Tell a story through pictures. The lack of words on a page forces the telling of the story to be an exercise of oral retelling.
- Listening to Stories Read Aloud
 - As a child listens to a story being read to them they form a bond with the adult reading. Utilizing repeated readings of the same story lets children build a bigger understanding of the story.


