Look Inside the Classroom

Social Studies

During the 2022-2023 school year, our middle school social studies curriculum was under review. This year, noticeable changes have been made in 6th - 8th grade. As an example, all classrooms are now incorporating Document-Based Questions (DBQs). A DBQ is an essay prompt that requires students to analyze historical documents, find intersections

between the documents, and make a claim using evidence. The DBQ process challenges students to use higher-level thinking skills, engage

with historical content, and create informed arguments. It also prepares students for high school coursework.





In an Ancient Greece Unit, Caruso 6th graders traveled around their room participating in a variety of learning activities including analyzing documents together!



As Caruso students traveled around their room, one of the learning activities was reading from a Greek play and then answering thought-provoking questions.

Cooperative Learning

In January and August 2023, all District 109 teachers and administrators participated in the first two (of five) trainings to support the implementation of cooperative learning structures in all elementary and middle school classrooms. Cooperative learning structures are intentionally designed

to engage all students in simultaneous interactions to learn academic content and practice social skills. Using the structures improves student engagement, builds positive classroom relationships, and enhances academic achievement.



Quiz-Quiz-Trade! South Park kindergartners learn what each letter of the alphabet sounds like by taking their cards around the room and quizzing one another.



Mix-Pair-Share! Kipling first graders go around the room and the kiddo with the biggest hand gives their answer first.



Rally Coaching! Caruso 7th graders pair up to work through math problems, each explaining how they got to the correct answer.

Wilmot 5th Graders spent a week in their science unit learning about the water filtration process. They began by learning where and how clean water gets distributed in their community and how to build a water pump. By the end of their unit, they displayed their newfound knowledge by receiving a real-life scenario with imag-

inary stakeholders with various water needs. They got into teams where they had to build their water filtration system, test their contaminated water, and run the polluted water through their treatment systems, and see if they could produce enough clean water to serve different groups of stakeholders.





Taking Our Schools To The Next Level

Over the last 18 months, DPS 109 has been undergoing a master facility planning process to determine the short and long-term needs to make our schools the best educational environments possible for our community. It's exciting to see the work we have accomplished and the collaboration underway! This past spring, the Board of Education reviewed strategies and recommendations from the master facility planning steering committee as they work to vet long-range plans.

The board advised the administration to further develop Strategy C, which would involve the replacement of all four elementary schools. It would also examine if any additional renovations need to take place at our middle schools on top of all of the work that has been done over the past decade, including:



2015-2016: New science labs



2018: Renovated libraries





2019: New cafeterias

2022: Caruso auditorium

Our district has been awarded the Meritorious Budget Award from the **Association of School Business** Officials for 14 consecutive years!




DID YOU KNOW? In the last two years, DPS 109 reduced its districtwide monthly electric bills by approximately 10-15% by installing LED lighting in every facility. The district also only had to pay a portion of the installation, thanks to a grant from the ComEd small facilities energy efficiency program.
