With respectful consideration, then, and with filial obeisance, the Class of 1940 dedicates the current volume of LA PALOMA to a living ideal, to

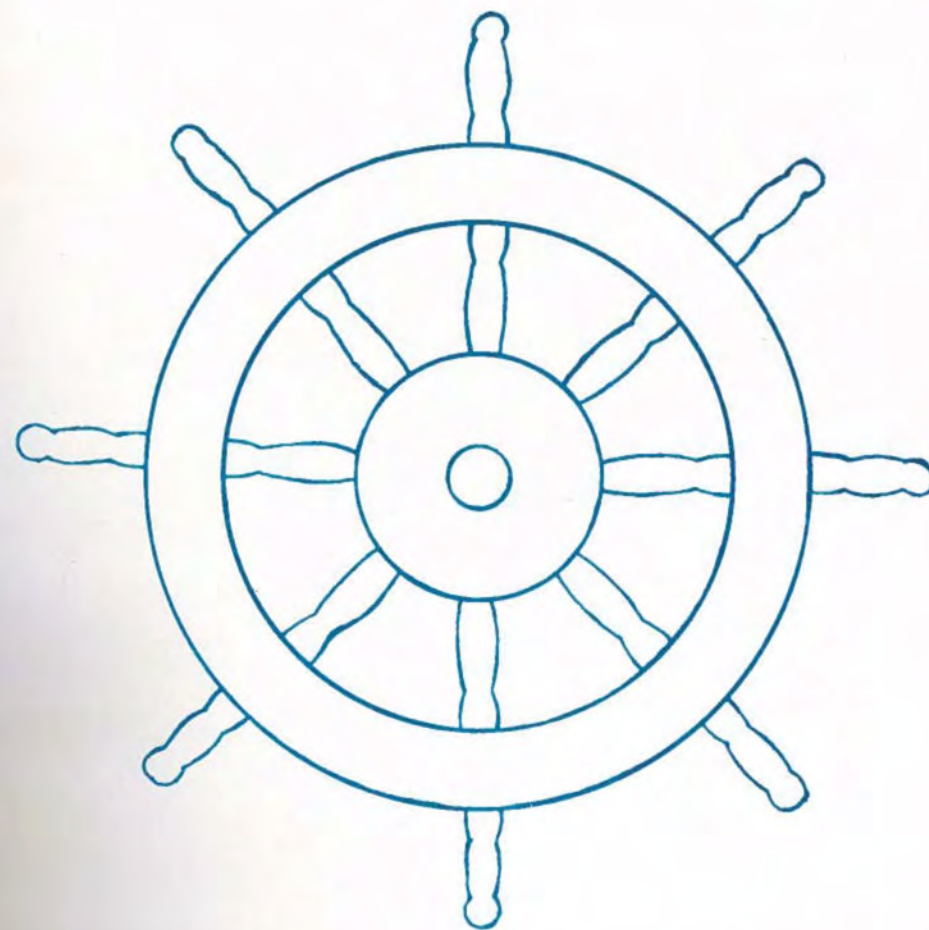

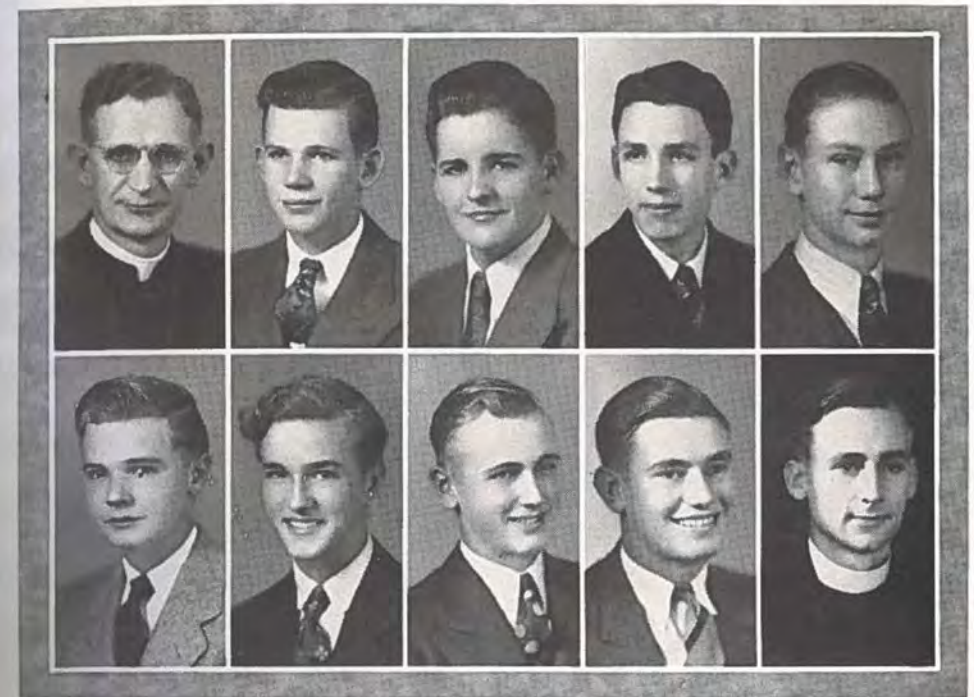
With the determination of a "bigger and better" yearbook, the staff set to work early in the year. The advertising department would not be downed until all preceding yearbook records had been brushed aside.

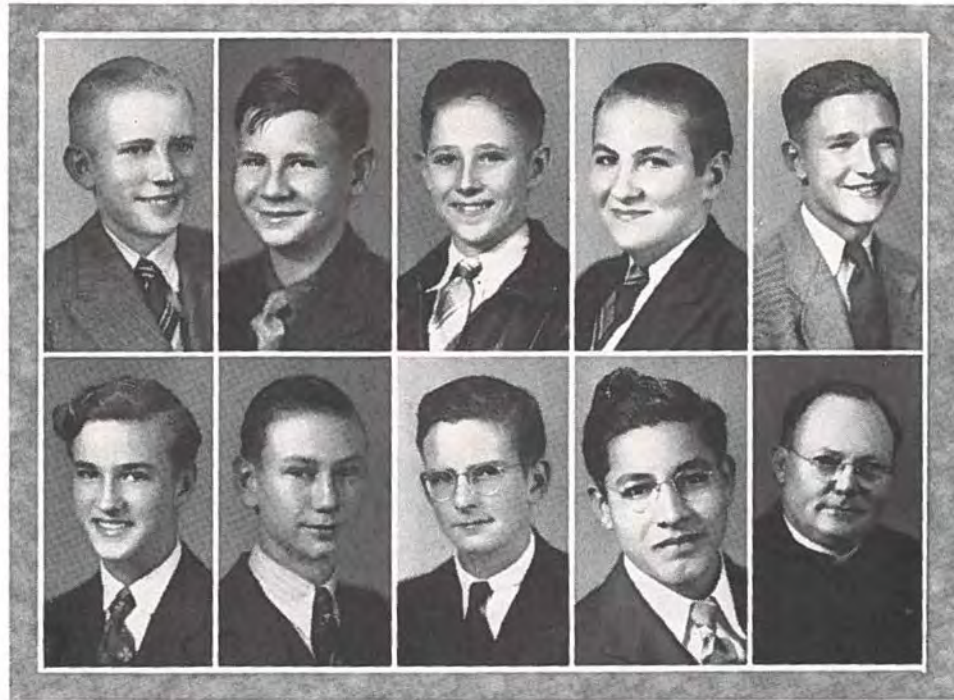

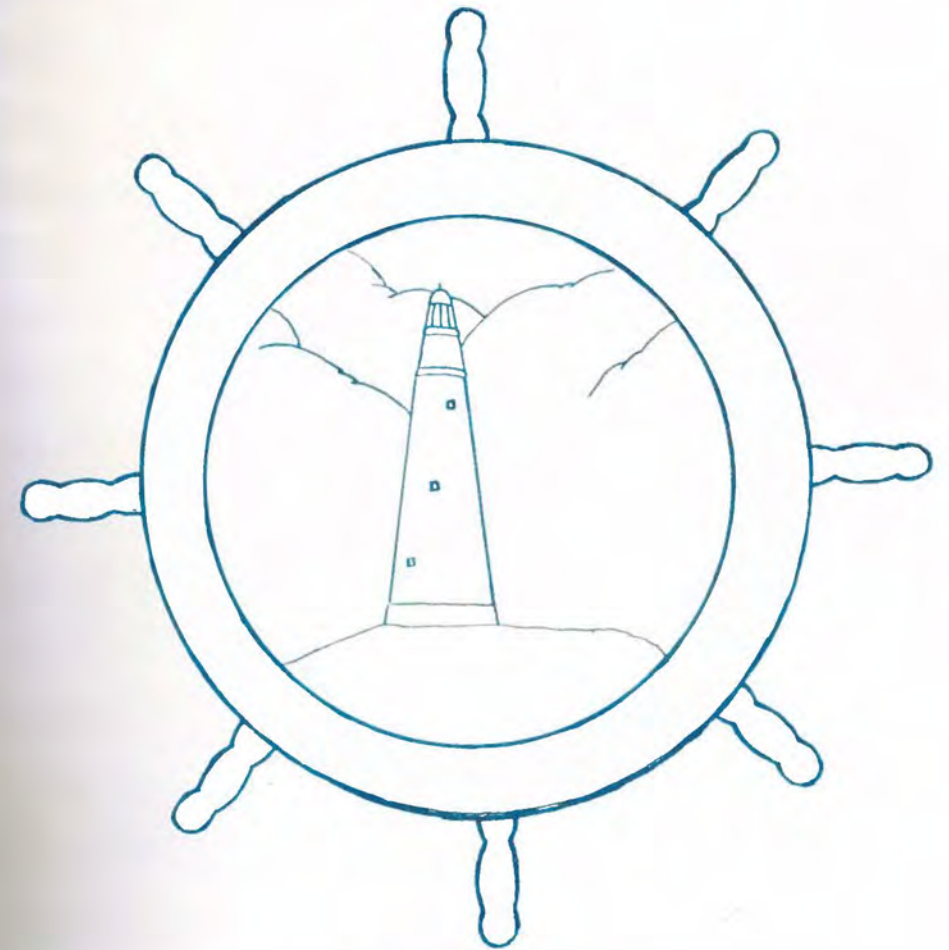

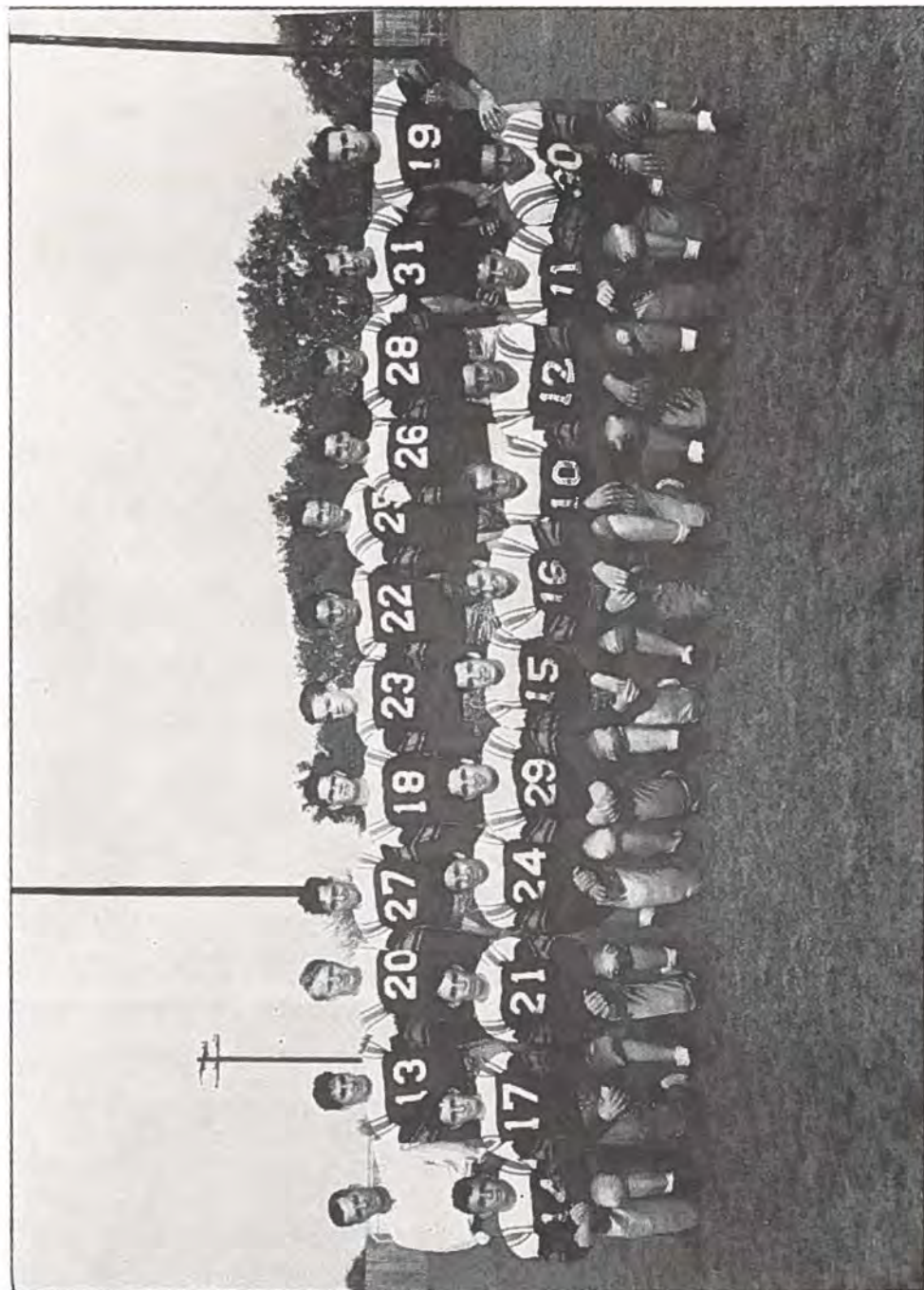

### The Season In General

The thirty-nine season still failed to bring relief from an oppressive schedule, and the difficulty of arranging one. These two bug-bears have pursued the teams for some years. Consequently, whatever the composite season's scores might indicate, they do not give a true picture of the actual facts in the case. With purely high school material, Coach Quigley had to face opposition that was drawn from outstanding junior college and first-ranking high school aggregations. And this, coupled with the usual lack of reserve power, brought a strenuous schedule, from which the Cavaliers could scarcely be expected to recover from week to week, as the season progressed.

But in spite of this, a careful scrutiny of the games will reveal that even in the more brazen assignments the Maroon and Old Gold held on tenaciously until the iron-manned resistance had to give way to fresher and surplus material thrown into the fracas by opposing coaches. In brief, game accounts will reveal that the Cavaliers put up a stubborn resistance until the closing periods of the game, which speaks well for their careful training and their game stamina.

## The Season In Detail

### *Cavaliers vs. Aransas Pass Golden Panthers*

Friday, September 23, with scarcely two weeks of coordinated practice to their credit, the Cavaliers met an age-old foe in the Aransas Pass Golden Panthers in their own lair at Aransas Pass and evened a traditional grudge with a trouncing of 12-0.

The Cavaliers paced the Panthers during the entire game, making 12 first downs to one for Aransas Pass, and it was only the lack of scoring punch of the locals and the effective goal line resistance that saved a top-heavy score.

The College-Academy's running attack was effective against the Panther line, with 50 running plays netting a total gain of 277 yards. Aransas Pass ran six times for a total of 13 yards.

The first score came early in the opening quarter. Aransas Pass elected to receive the kick-off, and after two plays, punted to the Corpus Christi 39-yard line, where Dolan, left halfback, ran around right end for a touchdown. Jesus Garza failed to convert.

The second and final score of the game came in the third quarter. The Quigleymen took the ball on their own 40-yard line, and in two plays gained only one yard as a result of a five-yard penalty. Evans, left end for Corpus Christi, then took the ball on a double reverse for 21 yards to the Panther 39-yard line. In three first downs the Cavaliers took the ball to the Panther one-yard line, where Evans, again on a double reverse around right end, scored. Garza again failed to convert.

### *Cavaliers vs. St. Joseph's Rams (Laredo)*

At home for their first time in the season, the Cavaliers showed a small but interested group of spectators their wares on Friday, September 29, when they entertained the St. Joseph's Rams of Laredo on Clark Field and handily defeated the latter 41-7.

By mixing stampedes through the lighter line and a deceptive end-around play, the locals rolled down the field for six touchdowns.

Quarterback Valdez of Laredo, a 140-pound breezy midget, ripped, at the husky Cavalier line throughout the game but was only intermittently successful. His crowning achievement was a 60-yard gallop down the sidelines with a punt for the only St. Joseph's touchdown. He outran all opposing Cavaliers on the jaunt.

Losing little time in beginning their rampage, the Cavaliers scored twice in the opening period, the first one going to the credit of T. J. Pereira, and the second to Sam Sovey. Garza kicked the first extra, and Salyers the second.

In the second frame came another score as the Quigleymen took a St. Joseph's punt on the visitors' 30-yard stripe, and in three plays drove to the two-yard marker, from where Pereira hauled it over. Garza converted.

The Cavaliers scored once more in the third and it was Evans on an end-around that netted sixty yards and pay dirt. In the final stanza Garza ripped off 45 yards with an intercepted pass, and Frank Rossi plunged over from the five for the touchdown.

### *Cavaliers vs. Temple Wild Cats*

Temple's unbeaten Wildcats turned on the heat on November 3 against a stubborn Cavalier aggregation, and in hectic second and fourth quarter spurts thumped a scrapping but outmanned opposition at Temple 26-6.

The Wildcats were ragged during the first quarter. They drove over once but it came back on an offside penalty. After having been pushed back by the Cavaliers they kicked out of danger, but came right back when the Quigleymen failed to hold their onrush. Carlile of the Wildcats plowed over, and kicked the extra point.

The Temple center set up the second counter a few minutes later when he intercepted Garza's pass on the Cavalier 30 and ran it to the five. From here it was maneuvered across the stripe.

The Cavaliers came back hot in the third quarter and made a ball game of it. They swept up the field from their own 34, Garza and Sovey running and passing, with Evans on the receiving end and chipping in an end around for good measure. Garza socked it over from the one, but Salyers missed the point.

Then calling on his best talent, the Temple coach inserted a team that gradually tired the reserveless Cavaliers and the game ended after the Temple outfit had scored twice more.

Garza was the Cavalier stand-out on offense and defense and was a constant threat with his crisp passes. Rossi and Sovey looked good in the backfield, and Salyers led the linemen by a wide margin.

### *Cavaliers vs. St. Thomas Eagles (Houston)*

Tradition was turned on its head on October 22, when the St. Thomas Eagles of Houston, boasting one of the greatest pigskin aggregations in state Catholic football history, took a stubbornly fought game from the Cavaliers at Houston and marked up their first win from the Cavaliers in the history of football rivalry between the two schools. The final score of 18-6 little indicates the mettle of the game.

It was the Eagles' fifteenth consecutive win without a defeat, and their fifth of the season. The game also provided the strong Houston team with their most severe opposition of the season.

The Cavaliers bottled up the shifty Eagle Tom Skelton, running back, forcing him to take to the air, which he did with sufficient effectiveness to pass for two touchdowns.

The Toms, unscored upon in their first four games, saw their goal line crossed for the first time with five minutes left to play in the fourth quarter. Left End Bob Evans blocked a Tom punt on the Toms' 10 and Quarterback Pereira covered just one foot from the pay-off stripe. On the second down, Pereira sneaked through for a touchdown.

The Eagle scores came in the second, third and fourth frames. Skelton rifled a 20-yard pass to Clark in the end zone, and early in the third period pitched a ten-yard toss to Glauser, who squirmed for thirty through a broken field for the second. Their last came late in the game when Clark intercepted a pass on the Corpus Christi 30 and ran to the 18. Skelton to Glauser did the work.

### *Cavaliers vs. Texas Lutheran College Bulldogs (Seguin)*

The Cavaliers forced the Texas Lutherans of Seguin to use all available power in the last half before the former bowed in defeat on the Lutherans' field at Seguin in a thrill-packed Armistice Day game. The score was 19-6.

Quigley's fighting "iron men" scored their lone touchdown the first time they gained possession of the ball, in the opening minutes of the game. It came as a result of a pass from Garza to Evans.

Then the Old Gold and Maroon clung to a slender thread of life until the third period when Gipps of Seguin passed to Taylor for the first touchdown without the extra point. A blocked punt later led to the second counter, and Gipps again plowed through still later to add the final tally, late in the fourth quarter.

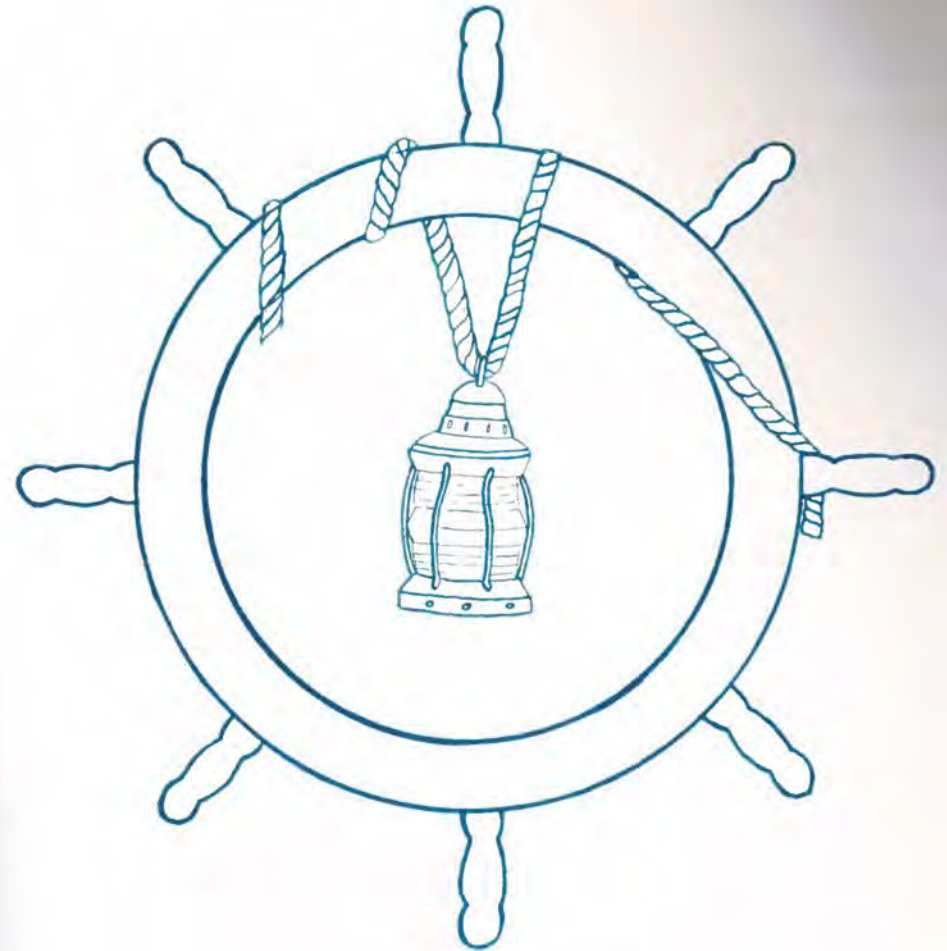
#### SOFTBALL—VOLLEYBALL—TENNIS—HANDBALL
