His Excellency, the Most Reverend Bishop Ledvina

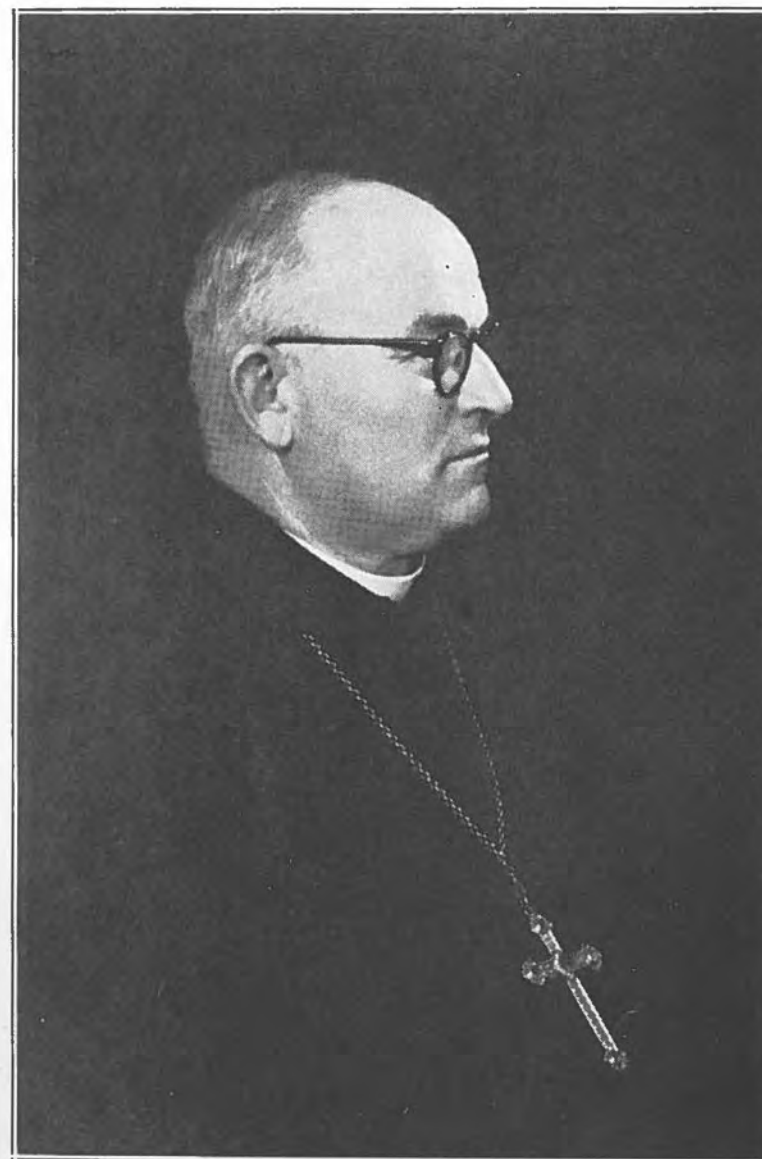

The Senior Branch of the Sodality of the B. V. M. following a plan adopted from the Summer School of Catholic Action, proved of great interest among the Catholic students. Of particular fruitfulness was the "insignia for service" plan, which operated effectively during the year. There were also weekly meetings, social affairs, and religious discussions. Father Augustine, the moderator, added toward the understanding of the sodality and of the Church by activating the projects toward religious ends. The students sponsored such activities as a Communion breakfast, Christmas card sale, monthly Communion at the school on First Fridays, joint parties with the sodality at the Incarnate Word Academy. One of the most talked-about projects was the launching of the "Commandos of Our Lady (C. O. L. S.) a campaign for special prayers and good works. The organization likewise sponsored a special Adoration period for all sodalists on Holy Thursday, as well as periodic Holy Masses for the boys in the service.

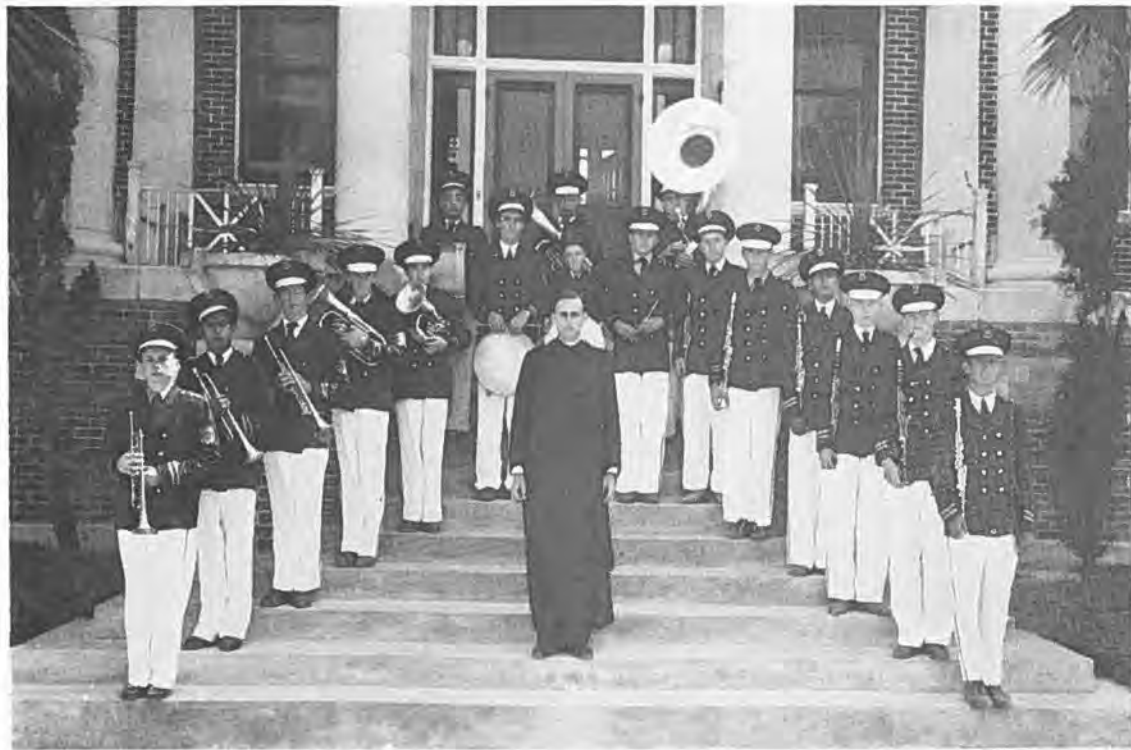

The Year

The 1942-43 year was more or less one of those jinx seasons. Almost everything happened. First of all, the new uniforms that had been worn for the first time on the occasion of the 1942 commencement were destroyed in a fire during the summer. They had been returned after the commencement exercises to be altered and otherwise completed. A fire in a downtown establishment put an end to them. It was a long time before priorities and the like returned them to the school.

Then, due to the fact that so many of the members were more or less beginners, advancement was tardy in arriving. In addition to all that, one or the other member had to withdraw from school or transferred to some other school out of town, and another vacancy was created that had to be filled. But the band did give a good performance on the occasion of the visit of Abbot Paul in March. And it must be said to the full credit of the organization and of Father Alfred Hoenig, O. S. B., the director, that consistent work was done, and unusual activities are assured for the future.

The Choir

The choir was organized in late fall. It was composed of boys from the seventh and eighth grades. Rehearsals were held on an average of twice a week and sometimes substituted for the class in religion. The group mastered fairly two complete sets of Benediction hymns. The choir was regularly at work during the Friday Benediction services.

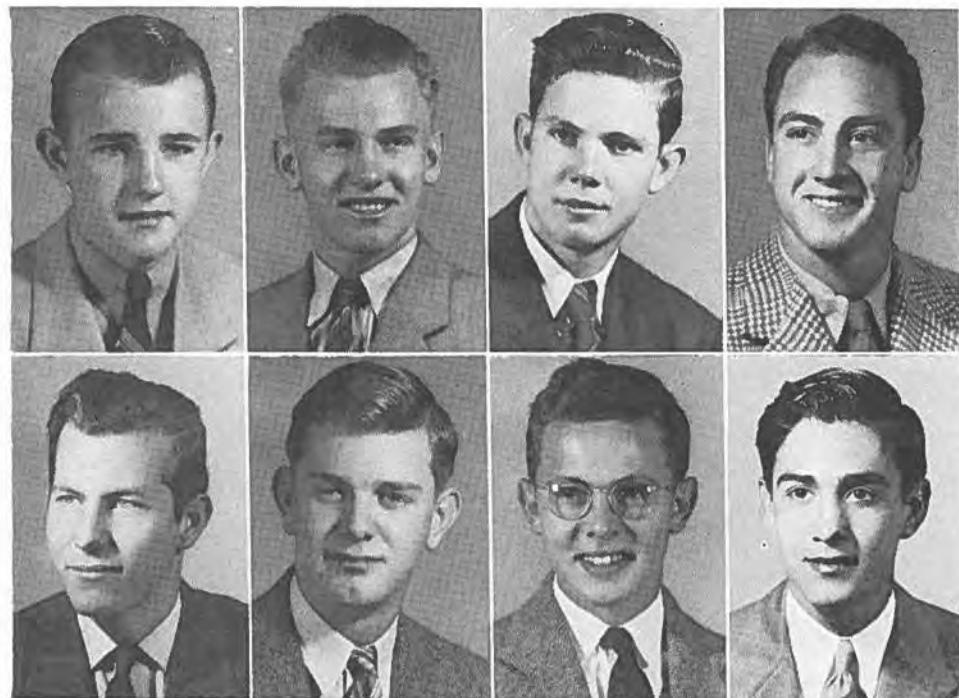

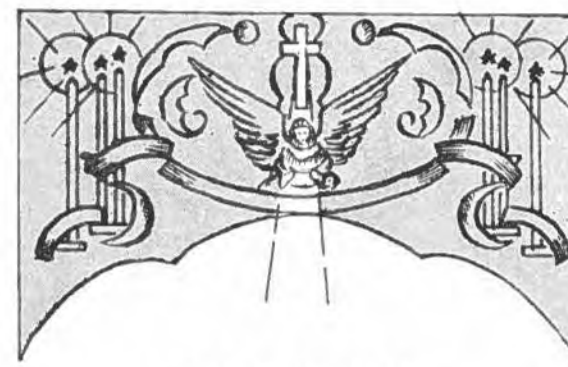

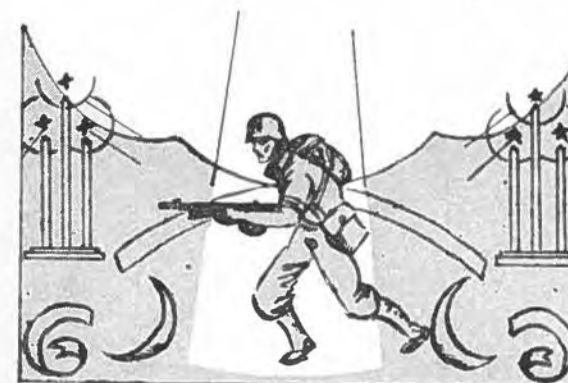

FOOTBALL

Cavaliers . . . vs. . . . Taft

After three weeks of practice, the Cavaliers opened their 1942 season by defeating the Taft Greyhounds 12-0 on the Greyhound field, Friday, September 18.

A punt was blocked by Carl Allen, in the first quarter, on the Greyhound 20-yard line. Zimmatore carried the ball in three plays across the counter through three large holes opened by the line. An attempted end sweep failed to net the extra point.

King intercepted a pass on the thirty-yard line and reached pay dirt with the aid of strong interference. Again the try for point failed.

The remainder of the game was hard fought. Both sides were depending on punts. The game ended as a victory for the Cavaliers.

Cavaliers . . . vs. . . . Sinton

The Cavaliers met their first defeat of the season at Sinton after a very hard fought game.

A Cavalier pass was intercepted by Bill Edwards who ran thirty-yards to score. The place kick was blocked. Less than two minutes later the game ended with a score of 6-0 in favor of the Pirates.

Cavaliers . . . vs. . . . Alice

The Cavaliers invaded and defeated the Alice Coyotes 15-6 at Alice, Friday, October 2. A punt was blocked and was good for a safety for the Cavaliers during the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the Coyotes fought back harder but Gomez, after cutting back into his interference, raced across the goal. The try for extra point was low.

Carl Allen blocked a punt in the third quarter and covered it, thus chalking up another six points. The place kick by Trammell was good.

The Coyotes took advantage of a Cavalier fumble on the eight-yard line in the last quarter. They drove across the counter in two plays. The try for extra point failed.

Thus the game ended with a score of 15-6 in favor of the Cavaliers.

Cavaliers . . . vs. . . . San Diego

The Cavaliers turned what seemed as a defeat into a victory over the San Diego Vaqueros.

The first quarter of the game looked very bad for the Cavaliers. The Vaqueros had very much pep and drive. But the Cavalier spirit rose and then drove the Vaqueros back.

A pass from Gomez to Trammell chalked up six points for the Cavaliers. The try for point failed. Then Gomez intercepted a pass, and ran 25 yards behind a strong interference. The place kick was good for an extra point.

After an 80-yard drive, the Cavaliers drove to paydirt with Zimmatore carrying the ball.

The Vaqueros tallied in the last quarter after a series of line plays and passes with Delgad carrying the ball.

Thus the game ended as another victory for the Cavaliers. The score was 19-6.

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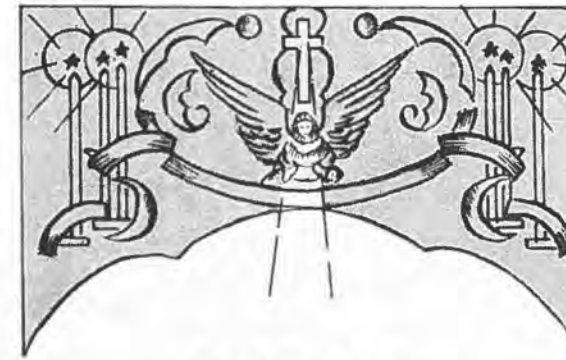

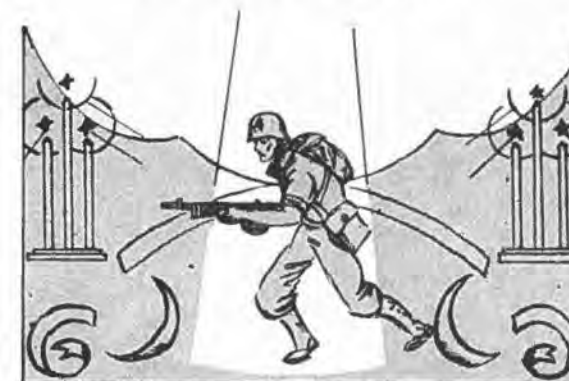
As the season advanced and the home stretch came into view, the teams turned on the power.

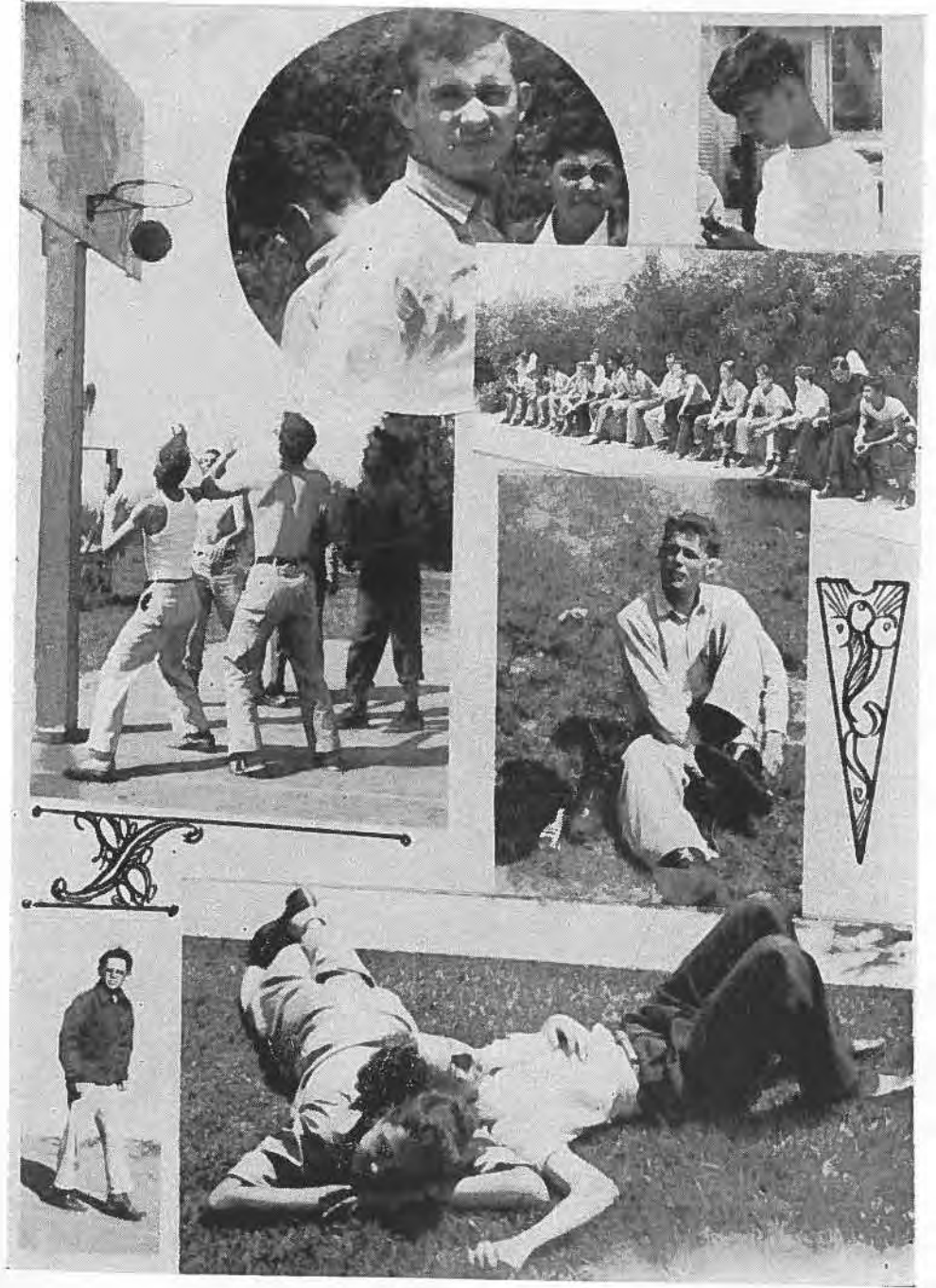

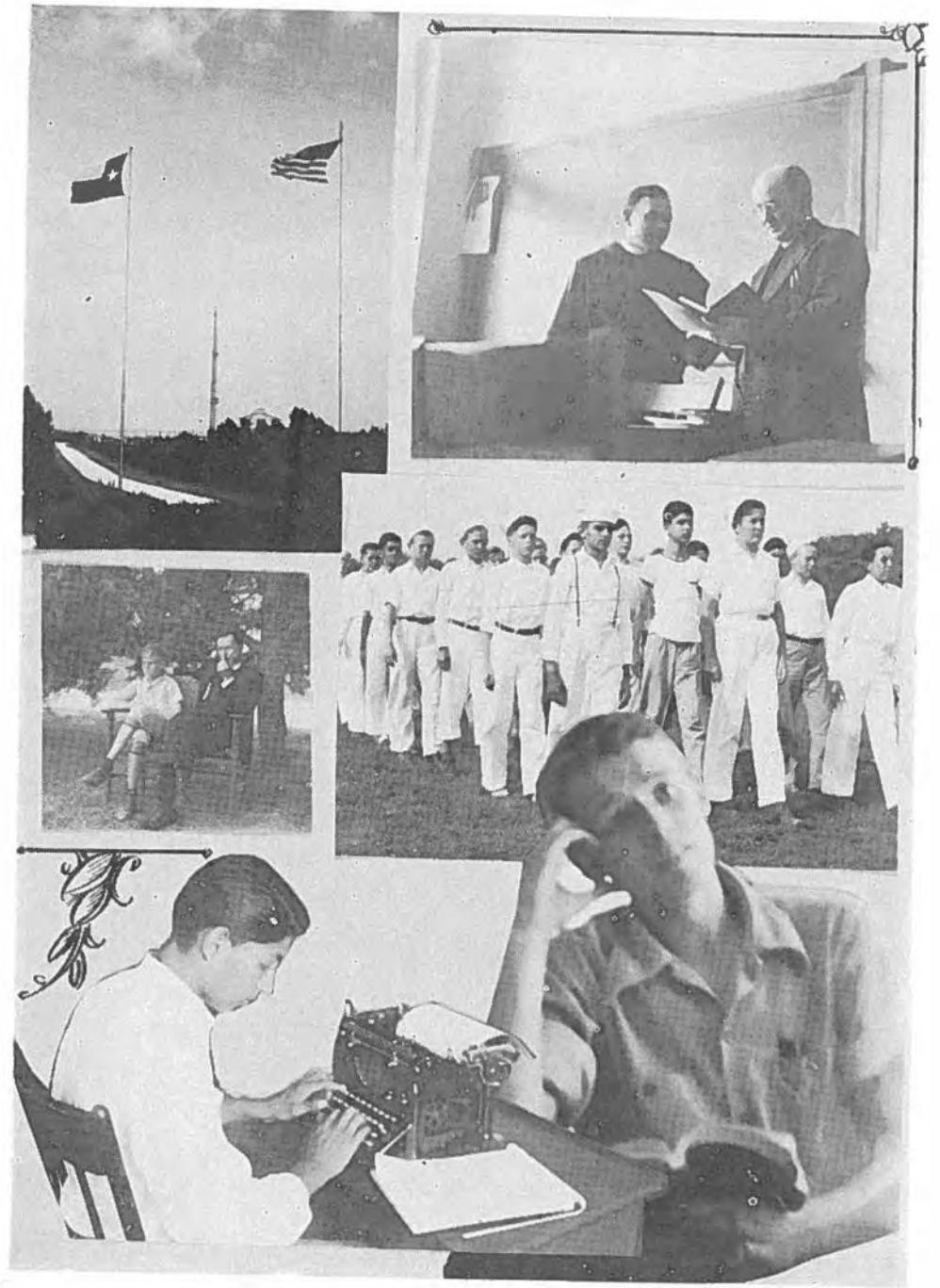

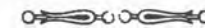
