

WHAT IS MEASURE G?

What is Measure G?

Measure G is a \$195 million general obligation bond program that was approved by Folsom voters in November 2014. Measure G will address the following needs:

- ◆ Complete needed repairs to provide safe, well-maintained classrooms
- ◆ Upgrade and provide additional classroom computers and instructional technology
- ◆ Upgrade aging and inefficient electrical, heating and air conditioning systems, redirecting hundreds of thousands of dollars back to the classrooms.
- ◆ Provide classrooms and facilities to prepare students for college and success
- ◆ Provide facilities for after-school programs

How much does Measure G cost?

- ◆ The maximum tax rate per property owner is averaged over the life of the bond to be \$60.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation, which is different from the market value of your home.

Measure G Master Plan

- ◆ The Measure G Facilities Master Plan was approved by the Board of Education on November 14, 2015. A copy can be obtained from the Folsom Cordova Unified School District website at: <http://www.fcusd.org/Page/16658>
- ◆ The Board of Education approved an initial priority list which includes Sutter Middle School modernization/new construction, Vista del Lago bleacher/stadium project, Folsom High School auxiliary gymnasium, Oak Chan Elementary modernization/new construction and the Carl Sundahl Elementary School modernization/new construction. As the initial priority list concludes, additional Measure G Master Plan projects are being completed.

MEASURE G OVERVIEW & PROJECTS

In November 2014, Folsom voters passed Measure G, a \$195 million general obligation bond for renovation, maintenance, and new construction at existing Folsom schools. Proceeds from the sale of Measure G bonds will be used to complete upgrades and repairs in the Folsom schools. Funds can only be used for Folsom schools, and cannot be used for administrative salaries or school supplies.

Measure G calls for a Citizens Bond Oversight Committee (CBOC), which has a broad-based membership, to review expenditures and the construction progress. All expenditures authorized by Measure G are reviewed by the CBOC to ensure the money is spent only on school facility improvements, as defined by the bond text approved by the voters. The CBOC reviews an annual performance and financial audit report prepared by an independent Certified Public Accounting firm.

The Committee meets approximately every three months and its meetings are open to the public. Parents and community members are encouraged to attend.

Members of the Measure G Citizens Bond Oversight Committee are: Jennifer Lane, Laura Ruby, Ginger Sackmann, Elvia Triki, Veronica Voldseth and Nichole Willenborg. The Committee currently has three vacancies. Applicants need to reside in the Measure G area (Folsom), be an active community member at large, parent/guardian of an FCUSD student, or a member active in a business organization representing the business community located in the District.

PROJECTS IN PLANNING STAGE

Blanche Sprentz Modernization

- ◆ New multipurpose building, expand parking lot to include two pick-up lanes, accessible path of travel improvements, new trash enclosures, restroom at Transitional Kindergarten, new playground equipment, site improvements, and digital marquee sign installation.

Folsom Middle School Upgrades

- ◆ Reorganize main parking lot and drop-off/pick-up area, repurpose existing snack bar area into physical education classroom, locker room improvements, remodel portion of multipurpose lobby into music classroom, interior finishes in the multipurpose and two story buildings, and work with City of Folsom to improve pedestrian crossing.

Natoma Station Upgrades

- ◆ Refurbish/modernize portable buildings, refresh classrooms and support spaces, upgrade intrusion alarm, relocate the existing marquee, refresh/refurbish landscaping and replace multipurpose flooring.

COMPLETED PROJECTS

Folsom High School—Career Technical Education (CTE) Building, Portable Classroom Installation and related Sitework

- ◆ Construction of a new CTE building to house the Manufacturing and Product Development, and Engineering and Architect pathways, and installation of portable classroom buildings.



Sutter Middle School—Phase 3

- ◆ Construction of a classroom building, library and multi-use building.

Theodore Judah Elementary School—Modernization

- ◆ Removed existing portable media center and classroom buildings and replaced with permanent modular buildings, updated restrooms, expanded and reorganized parking lot and drop-off/pick-up area, replaced/rekeyed to safe classroom door locks, added lunch drop-off/pick-up court with shade structure, added ornamental fencing, new landscaping, added digital marquee, and added disabled accessible path of travel improvements to Measure G improvement area.



Folsom Hills Elementary School—Modernization

- ◆ Removed existing portable classroom buildings and replaced with permanent modular buildings, expanded and modernized administration building and multipurpose room, modernized permanent classroom buildings, replaced playground apparatus, replaced shade structure, added digital marquee, added fencing/gate control at campus boundary, modernized restrooms, improved parking lot and drop-off/pick-up area and replaced/rekeyed to safe classroom door locks.

COMPLETED PROJECTS (CONT.)

Carl Sundahl Elementary School—Increment 1

- ◆ Installation of interim portable buildings for administration and classrooms, construction of new classroom buildings, expansion of the multipurpose and administration buildings, new hard courts, new landscaping and modified irrigation for water efficiency, and upgraded campus to 21st century technology standards.

Carl Sundahl Elementary School—Increment 2

- ◆ Construction of a Kindergarten building, replaced Kindergarten and Student Care play apparatus, new library/media center, constructed new classroom buildings, provided new furniture and equipment, replaced shade structure and removed all portable classrooms, new landscaping and modified irrigation for water efficiency, and upgraded campus to 21st century technology standards.



Folsom High School

- ◆ Completion of an auxiliary gymnasium.



Oak Chan Elementary School

- ◆ Installed interim portable buildings for administration and classrooms, constructed new classroom buildings, new library/media center, new Student Care building, replaced shade structure, expansion and modernization of multipurpose and administration buildings, new landscaping and modified irrigation for water efficiency, upgraded campus to 21st century technology standards, and provided new furniture and equipment.



Sutter Middle School

- ◆ **Phase 1A**—Bleacher demolition, installation of utilities and related site work for portable classroom buildings, restroom building, new fire hydrant line and ADA site upgrades.
- ◆ **Phase 1B & 1C**—Construction of a 13,255 sq. ft. classroom building, an 11,000 sq. ft. classroom/media center/library building and a 6,000 sq. ft. administration building. Exterior covered breezeways serving both classroom buildings, site demolition, grading, paving, and new utility connections.
- ◆ **Phase 2**—Construction of a new 17,836 sq. ft. multi-use building, construction of a new 5,477 sq. ft. lunch shelter, site demolition, grading, paving, new utility connections, and landscape and irrigation.
- ◆ **Phase 3**—Additional modernization to classroom buildings F, M2, S, E and J and Project Lead the Way classrooms, which includes mechanical, electrical and interior finish improvements, minor modernization to classroom building B, new roofing, and upgrade to fire and intrusion alarm system.



Vista del Lago High School

- ◆ New stadium bleachers, field house, restrooms, and snack bar.

Folsom Middle School

- ◆ Installed a digital marquee in partnership with the Folsom Middle School Parent Teacher Organization.

Technology

- ◆ **21st Century Classroom Technology** Included in the classroom technology are items such as smart televisions or projectors and screens, Apple TV, sound, mounts, controls, wiring and installation. All Folsom schools have received this technology upgrade. Furniture and Equipment is being installed as projects are completed.
