CSDA Happenings

Grade 4: Fourth graders will continue to work on equivalent fractions, reducing fractions, and adding/subtracting fractions with like denominators. In writing, all classes are working on rough drafts of their Opinion Writing. **Grade 5:** Fifth graders are learning about multiplying fractions with algorithms and visual models. Fifth graders have started drafting their opinion research essay about the pros and cons of zoos.

Grade 6: Sixth graders have wrapped their forces and motion unit with the Egg Dash, Crash, and Smash this week. We had a blast customizing and reconstructing our K'Nex racers based on the knowledge we have learned through the unit and competing against one another this week. **CSDA Unified Arts:** In the art room, all classes are starting their weaving unit. RMMS Happenings

Pre-K: Preschoolers will continue learning about pond life next week. They will measure sticks, practice counting ducks and frogs, and sort animals by animals found in the pond and not in the pond.

Grade K: Kindergarteners will be continuing on with their persuasive writing unit. They will be noticing things in their classroom and school that could be improved. They will decide who they need to address the problem to and what they need to write to cause change.

Grade 1: First graders will learn about vowel-consonant-e syllables in Fundations. They will explore light in science.

Grade 2: Second graders will finish up their nonfiction unit in reading and writing and will delve into the world of poetry. They will also continue their study of geometry in math and begin to learn about vowel teams in Fundations.

Grade 3: Third graders are continuing non-fiction reading and research through group projects. They are working on equivalent fractions in math and finishing up forces in motion in science.


Preparing for the Solar Eclipse Monday, April 8, 2024 NASA Eclipse Safety



When watching a partial or annular solar eclipse directly with your eyes, you must look through safe solar viewing glasses ("eclipse glasses") or a safe handheld solar viewer at all times. Eclipse glasses are NOT regular sunglasses; regular sunglasses, no matter how dark, are not safe for viewing the Sun. <u>Safe solar viewers</u> are thousands of times darker and ought to comply with the <u>ISO 12312-2</u> international standard.

Always supervise children using solar viewers. Do NOT look at the Sun through a camera lens, telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device while wearing eclipse glasses or using a handheld solar viewer — the concentrated solar rays will burn through the filter and cause serious eye injury.

Before you go outdoors:

- Know where to expect ticks
- Treat clothing and gear before going outside

• Used inspect repellents (read the labels) for age limits/recommendations

• Avoid contact with ticks and avoid when possible

After you come indoors:

Check our clothing for ticks

• Examine gear and pets

- Shower soon after being outdoors
- Check your body for ticks after being outdoors

ILLNESS CIRCULATING

Strep Throat If your child has a sore throat this can be diagnosed with a rapid strep test or throat culture. If diagnosed with strep throat, your child must be fever free and on antibiotics for a minimum of 12 -24 hours before returning to school. Throw out your toothbrush after 24 hours of antibiotics and sanitize your water bottle each day while being treated.

<u>Pink Eye (Conjunctivitis)</u> If your child has red eyes with drainage, please have them seen by the doctor to determine treatment needed. 24 hours of treatment required before returning to school. Wash hands frequently.

Stomach Illness Nausea and Vomiting. Stay home until there is no vomiting for 24 hours and be able to keep food down.

COVID UPDATES: EFFECTIVE 3/1/24

Isolation is no longer required

• Positive Covid person should stay at home and away from others until they are at least 24 hours with symptoms getting better

• Fever free for at least 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medications

• After this 24 hours, it is recommended to wear a well fitting mask for 5 days when around others





I understand that I am submitting my fairy house creation to be judged and displayed at the 2024 Fairy House Festival on Saturday, May 11th from 2-4pm. It is my responsibility to remove my house at the end of the event on Saturday. If I fail to remove my house by 6 pm on Saturday, May 11th, I understand that my house will be disposed of by the event staff. I also understand that my fairy house will be installed outdoors and that the public will have access to the house. Over the course of the event, I understand that my house may be damaged or disturbed by weather or event participants and that staff may need to modify or remove elements that have been damaged.





Rules for Submission and Builder Guidelines

- Houses may be any size and the theme of the house may be anything you wish we're creating a
 village, and we are delighted by fairy schools, fairy cafes, fairy discos, and simple and elaborate
 fairy homes.
- Please use only natural materials feathers, dry grasses, leaves, sticks, pebbles, shells, bark from a fallen tree, milkweed, moss, nuts, pods, acorns, berries, gourds, miniature pumpkins, and pinecones. Birch bark is an excellent building material.
- All fairy houses must appear to be made entirely of natural components.
- Hot glue, acrylic spray, natural twine, and other man-made items can be used but should be concealed by natural elements.
- Platforms or man-made support materials can be used for easier delivery and transport but must be concealed.
- Avoid using any reproductive materials (such as roots or seed pods) from invasive plant species that could spread the unwanted invasive plant.
- · Please do not use any items of value in the houses.
- Edible materials (such as nuts or seeds) will attract woodland creatures other than fairies, something to keep in mind.
- Houses will be displayed outdoors and should be able to withstand normal weather conditions over 48 hours.
- No political commentary or themes inappropriate for young children will be accepted.

 Let your imagination shine! We will use your creations to adorn our fairy stroll where you can vote for your favorite piece.

Prizes will be awarded to the first, second, and third-place winners with honorable mention.
