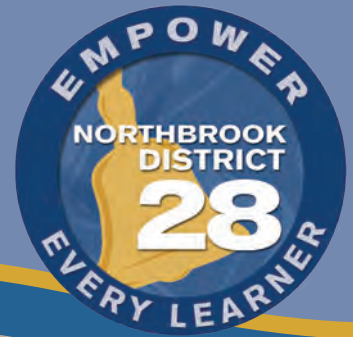

Young Explorers Blaze Trail to Kindergarten Readiness

Young Explorers, District 28's Early Childhood Program, celebrated its 7th class of students rising to kindergarten this year.

Young Explorers is available to District 28 typical, at-risk and special education students ages 3 through 5, who are not age-eligible for Kindergarten. The program encourages exploration and skill development through child-centered experiences that build self-confidence and connections between learning and natural environments.

A staff of early childhood and special education teachers, speech-language pathologists, social workers, physical and occupational therapists, and a school psychologist provide support to all students with an integrated and inclusive instructional approach.

'Adventure Awaits' NBJH Graduates

Northbrook Junior High's Class of 2023 began their middle school experience in the midst of the pandemic. As the 192 graduates stood onstage in front of family members dressed in royal blue gowns, they reflected the resiliency and optimism that have helped prepare them for high school.

Student speaker Erin Clarke recalled what it was like to enter middle school during COVID when it was difficult to get to know each other wearing face masks and staying 6 feet apart.

"While trying to adapt to the new normal, we learned patience, flexibility, and resilience. We gave each other elbow high fives, and we had virtual assemblies, but most importantly, we learned the true meaning of gratitude," she said.

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Strong Community Spirit Is The Foundation Of District 28

When I arrived in Northbrook 28 a little less than a year ago, I knew this was a special place. The district's reputation was of dedicated educators, involved parents and a community invested in education. I have observed, listened, visited classrooms and met with parent groups. Time and again I have heard from parents who attended our schools and return to raise their children here. Teachers and other staff members are often parents in the district as well. This community loyalty provides us with a solid foundation from which the district can continue to grow and improve.



In this edition of Update 28, information about the Master Facilities Planning process with DLA Architects is highlighted. This

collaborative work with a variety of stakeholders will help us identify current needs and plan for the future. You'll also learn about some of our accomplishments, including two awards the district received this spring, one for the district's music program and the other for the junior high health education program. In addition, our Independent Science Research students continue to earn medals at the state science fair. We introduce two new members who were elected to the Board of Education, new board officers, and a new principal for Westmoor School.

After attending my first District 28 junior high graduation, I was impressed with the wisdom our student speakers shared with classmates as well as those students recognized with citizenship awards. The following week we invited our former D28 students graduating from high school to return to their elementary schools to recognize their accomplishments. Dressed in their caps and gowns – and a t-shirt representing their post-graduate plans – they inspired our students and sparked joy in our educators to see them all grown up as they walked the halls 'Where It All Began.' It helped demonstrate how important our schools are to our community and the lasting impact and legacy of District 28 that empowers every learner not just for today, but for their future.

MASTER FACILITIES PLANNING, SCIENCE AWARDS

Students, Parents, Staff Help Map Future Building Plan

A Long-Range Facilities Master Plan is being developed for District 28 by DLA Architects. All parents and staff were invited to complete a survey in May. Then workshops for were held with students, parents and staff at each school to identify priorities and review examples of learning spaces.

The Long-Range Facilities Master Plan will include:

- Review of all four existing buildings;
- Evaluation and analysis of roofs, mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems;
- Safety and security assessment;
- Capacity studies of all schools, including room utilization, programs and services;
- Demographic study to forecast student enrollment;
- Short-term and long-term priorities;
- Project cost estimates for recommended improvements and maintenance items; and
- Overview diagrams and preliminary cost estimates for possible remodeling or additions.

DLA will utilize various engineers, a demographer and a school safety and security specialist to provide their expertise. The report is due in December.

NBJH Brings Home 3rd at State Science Fair

NBJH student scientists made their mark at the Illinois Junior Academy of Science State Fair at SIU-Carbondale, bringing home a third-place team trophy along with 12 gold, four silver and one bronze individual award.

Students developed their projects during a semester-long Independent Science Research class mentored by teachers Lauren Johnson, Amber Paull or Fredrick Yoon. Special awards included:

Board Seats New Members, Elects Officers

There are two new faces on the District 28 Board of Education following the March general election. Christine Beeftink and Adam Weinstock were sworn into office along with incumbent Mara Silver-Schack for four-year terms at the board's April 24th meeting. Beth Bazer was elected to the unexpired 2-year term. She was appointed to fill a seat vacated by Shweta Jinkala in 2022 and was elected to finish out that term.

The board elected officers for two-year terms: President: Jennifer Gallinson, who has been a member since 2017; Vice President: Mara Silver-Schack, a member since 2019; and Secretary: Beth Bazer, a member since 2022.

Incumbents Board President Tracy Katz Muhl and Vice President Michelle Kohler, did not seek re-election after serving eight years on the board.

New Westmoor Principal Has Wealth of Experience

Maria Eck, an educational leader who has 12 years of experience as a principal of elementary, middle and high schools, will be the new principal of Westmoor School beginning July 1.

HONORS AND RECOGNITION

NBJH Receives Health Education Blue Ribbon

Northbrook Junior High received a state Blue Ribbon Award for Excellence in Health Education for its curriculum and school programs that support student health and well-being.

The Illinois School Health Association and Illinois Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance made the award after a detailed application and interviews with teachers, administration, students and parents. Wendy Concklin is the health teacher who has designed and continually updates the health curriculum for all students in grades 6-8. Every student participates in nine weeks of health education each year.

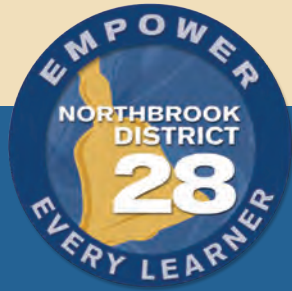
