#### A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

#### JOHN MCCARTHY

As I complete my 5th year leading John Paul II Catholic School, I am humbled and amazed both at how fast the time has flown by and by how fast our school has grown. It seemed like only yesterday that I was addressing about 200 students in the gym following Mass and listening to thunderous applause after announcing they could wear their "JPII Hoodies" to school. One small but meaningful gesture ignited a momentum that has not ceased. Next year JPII will enroll over 400 students, and if we reach 418, we will have doubled enrollment in that

time span. The significance of this growth cannot be underestimated. It is a Catholic school success story.

We now have become the academic magnet for students of all ability levels seeking a rigorous curriculum in a safe, faith-based school environment. The recognitions keep coming. The College Board has ranked us as a Platinum Level Honor Roll School for our A.P. Program and college readiness. Only 6% of high schools across

the U.S. and Canada can boast of this highest recognition. On top of that, Project Lead the Way has recognized both our middle school and high school engineering, computer science, and biomedical science programs worthy of being a school of distinction. Only 1% of schools across the U.S. can claim this. These are just two of the many reasons why students enrolled in private and public schools across the Lowcountry and beyond are transferring to JPII in record numbers each year, and why the list of colleges and universities our students are being accepted to continues to grow in number and prestige. JPII has been discovered!

While we may have become elite, we are not

elitist. JPII enrolls students of all academic abilities and family income levels. Through the generosity of donations to our Warrior Fund and vast amount of need-based scholarships, we are able to reach more students than ever before. Our minority population is almost 25%, while close to 20% of our student body has an identified learning disability that is serviced by three special educators in the Marian Center for Learning. Four counselors provide academic, social, and emotional support to students giving us the best counselor-to-student ratio of any

school around by far. Students are being challenged and supported, leading to success.

Providing this education at a cost less than some of our competitors is not easy. Without an alumni base, we must rely on the support of our community to raise the funds to make this all possible. Tuition can only take us so far. The Warrior Fund, made up of annual giving, business sponsorships, and the annual golf tournament, helps to

support our generous tuition assistance fund and the exceptional co-curricular and extra-curricular program we offer. Our goal this year is \$200,000 and we hope to reach that target on March 21 during our 1st JPII Day of Giving. We challenge everyone reading this to support the Warrior Fund in whatever amount you are able to. Likewise, the Where Faith and Innovation Capital Campaign is in full swing as we move closer to breaking ground on the new Innovation Center. As of the end of February, we will have raised just under \$6,000,000. Our goal is to break the \$10,000,000 mark to start construction. If you are fortunate to be able to lead us in this campaign, you will



# WALKING IN BIOMES HEAVEN IN THE LOWCOUNTRY

The AP Environmental Science classes visited the Port Royal Sound Foundation Maritime Center for a nature walk to witness the different biomes we have in the Lowcountry and how those biomes can change within just a few footsteps.

The walk was also another opportunity for JPII students to take information out of their textbooks, see it in real life, and learn more about the amazing area we live in, explained AP Environmental science teacher Andi Shaw. "We started in a salt marsh forest and ended in a salt marsh," she said. "Students learned and touched some of the plants and wildlife that live in this harsh salt environment and how they have adapted to these conditions."

A highlight of the trip was to walk onto the mud flats and look for crabs, animal tracks, and plants. Students sampled pickleweed and learned that our salt marshes are the stopping ground for many migratory birds because of the rich mud flats. Many birds stop here to feast on crabs and worms before continuing their migration.

"Students also learned

about the invasive plant that the Maritime Center is currently battling," continued Ms. Shaw. "The Chinese Yarrow grows very quickly and will regrow from stumps that were cut down."

#### 6TH GRADE HAS BEEN BUSY!

#### **Brainstorming Strategies in History Class**


Usually writing on your desk at school is frowned upon but one JPII teacher is insisting her students do just that!

Middle school social studies teacher, Ms. Sonia Merrick, has been encouraging her students to use a graphic organizer as a brainstorming aid in writing and remembering. "My middle schoolers are developing writers, so I like to employ any fun and interactive pre-writing tool I can find," she said.

The ultimate purpose of a graphic organizer is to prepare students for writing through brainstorming that can assist in their thinking development. "The students really seem to enjoy using their desks as whiteboards as opposed to paper," said Ms. Merrick. "It makes them more engaged with the process."

A graphic organizer is a visual display or chart that shows the relationship

between ideas, facts, and information. "There are many different types of graphic organizers the kids can use," explained Ms. Merrick, who gives her students various ideas and lets them choose the one that speaks to them. "One example might be using the circle web where the main concept is in the middle and details are expanded upon around the outside of it. It can also be used as a mind map to brainstorm ideas and outcomes."



#### A Visit to the Coastal Discovery Museum

The 6th graders also took a field trip to the Coastal Discovery Museum on Hilton Head Island. The class had been studying horseshoe crabs and were able to see firsthand the local marine and brackish water arthropods. "This field trip was an ideal experience," commented Ms. Merrick, "because the students have been learning about horseshoe crabs, their geological locations (very common in the Lowcountry), and how to protect them."

According to Ms. Merrick, horseshoe crabs are not true crabs or crustaceans. "They are actually chelicerates, most closely related to spiders, ticks, and scorpions and live mainly in and around shallow coastal waters on sandy or muddy bottoms." The horseshoe crab, which dates back approximately 250 million years ago, is generally found in the intertidal zone at spring high tides but their population is declining due to coastal habitat destruction and overharvesting.



#### Mitchelville Beach Clean Up

With a servant's heart at the forefront of all we do at JPII, our 6th graders hopped on a bus and traveled to Mitchelville Beach on Hilton Head Island outfitted with gloves and trash bags. The students and a few faculty members scoured a mile or so of beach and picked up random plastic bags and trash that were found littering the area.

"The kids also found horseshoe crab shells, and other various shells on the beach," commented Ms. Merrick. "We finished up the morning with a little friendly competition to see who collected the most trash. The winners were Eddie Merrick and Ryan Fox. We returned to the school feeling satisfied that we did a little something to serve our community."

# **Exploding Experiment Equals Exceptional Education**

The 8th grade physical science class and the sophomores in Pre-AP and standard chemistry classes were treated to a special kind of lesson when experiments exploded right before their eyes and ears.

Mr. Micah Heinz, a JPII science teacher who was recently called to duty in the US Army, made a definite impact on his students when he took them outside for class. "We were reacting sodium metal with water," he explained. "This is a fast, violent reaction that produces hydrogen gas, which is flammable and explosive. We are studying the periodic table and reactivity in 8th grade and in 10th grade we are looking at calorimetry and heat transfer. This experiment fit well into both arenas."

Leaning into the educational nature of the questions posed in class, "I think that science should be fun when appropriate, and what is more fun than an explosion?" said Mr. Heinz, enthusiastically. "There were a couple of explosions that were bigger than expected that produced some reactions of surprise. I think everyone was just excited to get out of the classroom and blow things up!"





#### History of Rice Cultivation in the Lowcountry

The 8th-grade SC/US History students at JPII had the privilege of listening to and gaining insights from Rollen Chalmers, a local expert on rice cultivation in South Carolina. The class had been learning about the state's origins as an English colony

and the significant role that rice played, particularly in the Lowcountry, long before cotton rose to prominence as the primary cash crop.

Mr. Chalmers spoke about the origins of rice in SC, how it became a major cash crop, and how its production has changed and modernized throughout the years. Unfortunately, the rice crop died off after a time of being less than profitable and the crop was almost completely gone until the 1980s when it started to be revitalized.

"Students came prepared with





questions and engaged in a very meaningful conversation with our presenter," noted Kim McNab, JPII social studies teacher. "It is through learning about farmers and growing small, local businesses like Rollen's Raw Grains that heirloom crops like

Carolina Gold rice have been saved and are thriving. We all enjoyed hearing about his experiences and generationslong education. We even got to hull our own rice and look at a few samples of his products! We are so grateful Rollen could come and share his talents with us."


#### Fr. Rafa Brings Israel into the Classroom


#### **Christmas Lessons & Carols**

#### **Class of 2024 Retreat**

In September, the Class of 2024 went to Wild Blue Ropes in Charleston for a day of high ropes challenges, team building, and just some time to get away and be together! The scriptural focus for our senior retreat each year is "Called, Justified, and Glorified" based on Romans 8:28-30.

The retreat consisted of team building activities paired with the opportunity for seniors to challenge themselves on the high ropes course which provides a great model for life in general, and more specifically, for traversing the possibilities and challenges of our faith journey. "We need to know ourselves, where we're strong and where we're not," according to JPII Campus Minister Kevin Pastore, "and we need to recognize that we're not alone on the journey, rather we're created to accompany one another along the WAY, to be the presence of Christ for others and to allow them to be that same presence for us when needed...sometimes all it takes is a gentle encouragement to make a difference!"



6th Grade Retreat - In August, the members of the JPII Acts29 Peer Ministry team accompanied the 6th grade students on their annual class retreat held at school. The team planned the morning around the theme: "Community, Purpose, and Welcome" using Romans 15:7, "Welcome one another, then, as Christ welcomed you, for the glory of God" as the scriptural focus. The students enjoyed food, games, creating friendship bracelets, working together on Lego sets, and spending some time with our seniors who shared encountering Jesus Christ at JPII.


