#### 90 SCHOOL CAMPUSES AND 60 RESPONDER AGENCIES UNITE

On September 26, Kendra Estes, Director of Health Services and Risk Management, and Chris Contreras, District Safety and Emergency Operations Supervisor, attended the inaugural School Safety Symposium led by the Austin Regional Intelligence Center (ARIC) and Austin ISD Police Department.

After the tragedy in Uvalde, representatives from ARIC and AISD Police wanted to create a space where first responders and school officials could come together to collaborate and learn from each other to prevent further incidents. Representatives from 90 various school campuses and 60 first responder agencies attended. Presenters included the FBI, DPS, Eanes ISD legal counsel, APD Police Chief, and school safety officials and officers. Hutto ISD Executive Director of Communications and Community Relations, Noelle Newton, served as the emcee of the event.

### WELCOMING THE COMMUNITY



A recent survey indicated some of you feel like you're receiving too many messages in the district's new communication tool ParentSquare.

We want you to know that the power to reduce messages is in your hands!

Set your preferences. Go to MY ACCOUNT and change your NOTIFICATION SETTINGS for text and email to INSTANT if you want to receive messages right away, or OFF or DIGEST if you want to receive messages at 6 p.m. daily.

Likewise, if you are using the downloaded app rather than ParentSquare's online version, you can set the App notifications to suit your needs as well. Having all three options on Instant can certainly be overwhelming!

Even if a user's email preferences are set to OFF, they will still receive School Alerts, Urgent Alerts and critical notices like Lunch Balances from the system.

The graphic to the top, right points to various features available in ParentSquare that will greatly help with usability and finding what you need at your fingertips.

### ARCHITECTURE PROJECT EARNS STARS OF DISTINCTION

#### NJES RENOVATION RECOGNIZED FOR VALUE AND DESIGN

The Texas Association of School Administrators (TASA) and Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) have announced Nadine Johnson Elementary School Renovations (Design and Value) among the 55 projects that will be included in the 2022-23 Exhibit of School Architecture. This exhibit of new and renovated Texas school facilities includes projects from 36 school districts and two colleges that were submitted by 16 architectural firms. Eligible projects are newly constructed or renovated public education facilities completed in the past five years and not previously submitted in this annual exhibit.

"We are proud to learn of the recognition bestowed on VLK Architects, Inc. for the design and value of the Nadine Johnson Elementary School renovation, and I hope other school



administrators and board members benefit from seeing the exhibit on Nadine Johnson at the TASA | TASB Convention in San Antonio today and tomorrow," said Dr. Celina Estrada Thomas, Superintendent of Hutto ISD.

The project was among other capital improvements undertaken in the past five years which reflects the Board Goal 7 of the district's strategic plan: Address facility needs to accommodate growth and maximize efficiency through innovation in support of student success. Hutto ISD enrollment has increased by 29% since 2015 and is approaching 10,000 students. By 2026, Hutto ISD is expected to reach an enrollment of 12,800 students and by 2031, Hutto ISD will surpass 17,200 in enrollment growth.

In addition to addressing growth, the Board of Trustees and community stakeholders developed a road map in developing SP (Strategic Plan) 2025 that included addressing equity as well as safety with respect to all capital improvement projects.

The modernizations and improvements to Nadine Johnson Elementary School reflect the desire of the district to address growth, and provide equity at all of our "legacy" campuses. As the educational delivery models change over time, the way students and staff utilize space also changes and necessitates the need to upgrade and modernize as a priority equity decision. Working with VLK, the district's administration and operations departments tackled not only NJES, but also Cottonwood Creek, Veterans' Hill, Ray, and Hutto elementary schools to update the existing facilities and learning spaces to current educational delivery models. This included a complete refresh of furnishings and technology.

"Fundamentally, while addressing growth and equity, whether renovating existing facilities or building anew, the Board and district administration work closely with the district's architects to also address energy efficiencies, building control systems, lighting and indoor air quality upgrades, and deferred maintenance projects," said Henry Gideon, Assistant Superintendent of Operations at Hutto ISD.

"In addition to the design process, much attention was given to include safety systems including access controls, protected vestibules, cameras, and other physical improvements to enable staff and students to learn in secure environments," added Gideon.

Everyone has the right to be respected and the responsibility to respect others, in person and online.








# FOUR HUTTO ISD CAMPUSES EARN PURPLE STAR DESIGNATION



#### **USABILITY ON PHONES**



QR (Quick Response) codes began being used over a decade ago. We've seen QR codes on signs, flyers, and even as a more efficient boarding pass for air travel.

Most recently, we saw them more widely used as a contactless method to look at menus when we ventured out to eat during COVID-19.

Even so, technology has continued to evolve surrounding these two-dimensional bar codes that contain text and numbers and often feature URLs that direct users to sites where they can learn about a subject.

Most of us know how to use QR codes with a camera phone, but many people do not know how to read a QR code when it is delivered on their phones. The dilemma: How does one open a QR code on your phone without using a second phone camera or a special downloaded app?

There's actually multiple ways to read a QR code from your own phone, and you no longer need external apps to do so. Here's a couple of ways:


#### USING THE BUILT-IN IPHONE PHOTOS APP

- 1. Take a photo or screenshot and open the photo with the QR code in Photos.
- 2. Wait a brief moment for the app to recognize that a QR code is present in the image, and show a bracketed symbol in the lower right hand corner.
- 3. Tap the bracketed symbol in the lower right hand corner of the image.
- 4. You will be offered the option of opening the URL in the appropriate app, such as Safari, Google Chrome, YouTube, etc. Do so by clicking the option of your choice.


#### USING QR CODES IN PARENTSQUARE

- 1. If you are using the app and not the online version of ParentSquare, simply touch and hold down on the QR code on your phone within the ParentSquare app.
- 2. Then select the option to open the link.

Voila! You do not need a 2nd phone.



PRO TIP: Parents and community members have voiced frustration with our use of QR codes in ParentSquare because many do not know how to read QR codes from a phone. Share this educational information next time you share a QR code in a message.

### **GIFTED AND TALENTED STUDENTS**

#### **REFERRALS OPEN FROM OCT. 3 - NOV. 3**

The Hutto ISD referral window for screening students for gifted and talented educational programs will be open from October 3 through November 3. Parents, guardians, teachers, other certified staff members, and community members may refer students who they believe exhibit the characteristics of giftedness. Referral forms are available in English and Spanish on all campuses and on the Hutto ISD GT web page during the referral window.

A gifted/talented student shows potential for performing at a remarkably high level of accomplishment when compared to others of the same age, experience, or environment. A gifted/talented student may exhibit high-performance capability in an intellectual, creative, or artistic area, possess an unusual capacity for leadership, or excel in a specific academic field.

Hutto ISD provides services to gifted/talented students in a variety of ways. Elementary GT students participate in the BLAST program. This interdisciplinary pull-out model promotes students' independence, creativity, and all core subject area skills. Middle school GT students are clustered together and served by GT trained teachers in regular core subject classes or in advanced classes where applicable. GT services at the high school level include Pre-AP, AP, and Dual Credit classes in the four core subject areas. During their junior and senior years, students may receive college credit by passing the appropriate AP exams and/or completion of Dual Enrollment courses offered by Temple College.

### **CASTING A VISION**


A huge thank you to all those who attended our Equity, Racism, and Inclusiveness Public Forum on September 28. We continue to value these opportunities to showcase the work of the ERI Task Force while also communicating with our school communities and our larger Hutto community so there is transparency in this work that seeks to improve the educational experiences of every student.

Our time together kicked off with a reminder of the DEI vision for the district followed by an interactive chalkboard splash activity where attendees answered the question "Who are our students today?"
