College-Academy Wins Season Opener, 14-6

Oscar Soliz One Man Gang As Cavaliers Defeat Freer

FREER—Chunky senior Oscar Soliz tore apart the Freer Buckaroos here Friday night as he led Corpus Christi College-Academy to a 14-6 victory in the opening game of the season for both teams.

Soliz ripped the Freer line for 172 yards rushing, scored one touchdown, and kicked two extra points. His nifty dashes set up the other Cavalier touchdown.

The Cavalier offense guided by Mickey Hardeman racked up a net rushing total of 214 yards while Hardeman's Passing accounted for 78 yards and both touchdowns.

Freer, a young green team, was badly hampered by it's lack of experience, especially in the first half.

Start Early

The young Buckaroos roared goalward the first two times they

put the ball in play but couldn't dent the scrapping goal line stands of the Cavaliers.

The Cavaliers, after stopping the opening Freer thrust on the four-yard line, romped 96 yards in 12 plays for their first touchdown.

Soliz was sparkplug of the drive, gaining 62 yards on six carries. The touchdown came on a 16-yard pass from Hardeman to end Nick Poulos. The touchdown came with 15 seconds remaining in the first quarter. Soliz kicked the extra point.

But Not Too Far

Freer took the kickoff and marched all the way to the Cavalier two-yard line but were halted again and the Cavalier's took over on the one.

College-Academy scored its second touchdown late in the third quarter on a 57 yard pass and run play from Hardeman to Soliz. Soliz kicked the extra point.

Freer took advantage of a Cavalier fumble early in the fourth quarter to score their touchdown. Taking over on the 30 they marched to the five on passes by quarterback Roy Crowell. A running play lost five yards but Crowell hit lanky Howard Harvill with a pass for the touchdown. Jerry Coleman's try for extra point was wide.

The Cavaliers made one more march late in the ball game, but the drive was stymied on the 25.

Cavaliers Fall, 40-26, In Wild-Scoring Tilt

WOODSBORO — Keith Hoffman ran Corpus Christi College-Academy ragged here Friday night as he rolled up five touchdowns and passed for another as the Woodsboro Eagles outdid the Cavaliers in a wild-scoring battle, 40-26.

The powerful Hoffman was the whole show for the Eagles, but the home towners had to stave off a surging fourth-quarter rally by the Cavaliers to preserve the victory.

After rolling up an apparently safe 40-7 margin through three quarters, the Eagles began to relax, and College-Academy suddenly made a game of it. With Oscar Soliz and Anthony Chapa in the starring roles, the Cavaliers

scored three times to come within striking distance, but they began their uphill battle too late.

Chapa's touchdown was the highlight of the night as he took the Woodsboro kickoff after the final Eagle tally and scampered 75 yards for the touchdown.

Woodsboro got off a'winging in the second quarter, with Hoffman climaxing a drive four plays deep in the second period by bulling over from the eight-yard line. Guard Chester Harrison kicked the first of his four extra points.

Eight plays later, Hoffman was back again. Taking a Cavalier punt on the College-Academy 22, the Eagles moved in to the 10 and four plays later Hoffman was over for his second tally.

The margin was stretched to

three touchdowns later in the second period as Hoffman intercepted a Mickey Hardeman pass on the Eagle 45 and raced 55 yards for the marker.

The Cavaliers finally broke the scoring ice with Soliz, Bobby Dougherty and Hardeman sparking a 69-yard drive that ended with Soliz going over from the 10. Soliz kicked the extra point.

A Cavalier fumble set up Woodsboro's fourth touchdown in the third quarter, with the Eagles taking over on the Cavalier 31. Hoffman and Charles Crowell moved the ball to the one in six plays and Hoffman smashed over.

Woodsboro kicked off, and recovered the short, on-side boot, or

the Cavalier 35. The ball rolled to the 12 yard line in six plays and from there Hoffman rolled over.

College-Academy took the kickoff and in four plays moved the way to Woodsboro 20. Dougherty picking up 30 yards the drive. Hardeman passed to Dougherty to advance to the 10 and then Hardeman banged over on a quarterback sneak.

Hoffman was at the Cavalier again on the next kickoff, passing to end A. D. Horner, who bed the ball and scampered 25 yards for the final touchdown.

Chapa then made his sensational 75-yard run and the Cavaliers got their fourth tally later as Hoffman recovered a Woodsboro fumble and moved 38 yards for the fifth. Soliz took it over from the 10.

Cecilio Diaz was a defensive standout for College-Academy while Hoffman's sparkplug role in Woodsboro.

Galveston (Sp)—Kirwin High School turned back Corpus Christi College-Academy, 21-12, Friday night on superior weight and manpower.

The Cavaliers matched the Buccaneers yard for yard and play yard in the first half but in the second period the Corpus Christi school began to weaken in lack of first line reserves.

It was the Gents' second loss in a one victory this fall, while Kirwin has won two and lost one.

Kirwin rolled to its first touchdown in the first period when the Cavaliers recovered a Cavalier fumble on the Academy 35. On the first play Joe Ortiz rumbled over right yard, cut wide and outdistanced the secondary for a score. Charles Jones converted the first of three in the night.

College-Academy came back in the second period to get back into the game. Oscar Soliz intercepted Ralph Deagle's pass on the Kirwin 10 and returned to the Buc 14 before he was knocked down. Jimmy

Dolan rammed to the 10 and Soliz ploughed through to the one. Soliz rolled over the center for the score and then missed the extra point try.

Kirwin Rolls

Kirwin began rolling again later in the period from its own 35. Seven plays later, plus a couple of Cavalier penalties, the Bucs halted on the Gents' 36. Harry Guns broke over tackle, reversed his field and scored.

Late in the second period the Cavaliers began a downfield march from their own 32. Mickey Hardeman, Bobby Dougherty and Soliz pushed to the 19 where Hardeman hit Soliz with a pass on the eight. Dougherty crunched over tackle to the four and Soliz sneaked over the center for the final Cavalier touchdown. Soliz' kick was deflected.

Bucs Score Again

Midway in the third quarter Kirwin gained possession on the Buc 40 by the punting route. Seven plays carried to the seven with Ortiz skirting right end for the touchdown.

Kirwin rolled up 17 first downs to 11 for the Cavaliers, and gained 289 yards rushing compared with 165. College-Academy connected five out of six passes for 63 yards, while Kirwin completed one out of five for 13 yards.

May Have Cost Them

The triumph, third of this season for the Greyhounds, may have cost them, for dual-purpose Chino Gonzalez was hurt early in the third quarter and taken from the field in an ambulance. At the time his right leg seemed to be injured.

Statistically the affair wound up fairly evenly, with the Cavaliers' late-game spurt drawing them up within shooting distance. They were trailing badly at the half, both in scores and statistics, but came out all angry to start the third period and it was a slam-bang deal from there on.

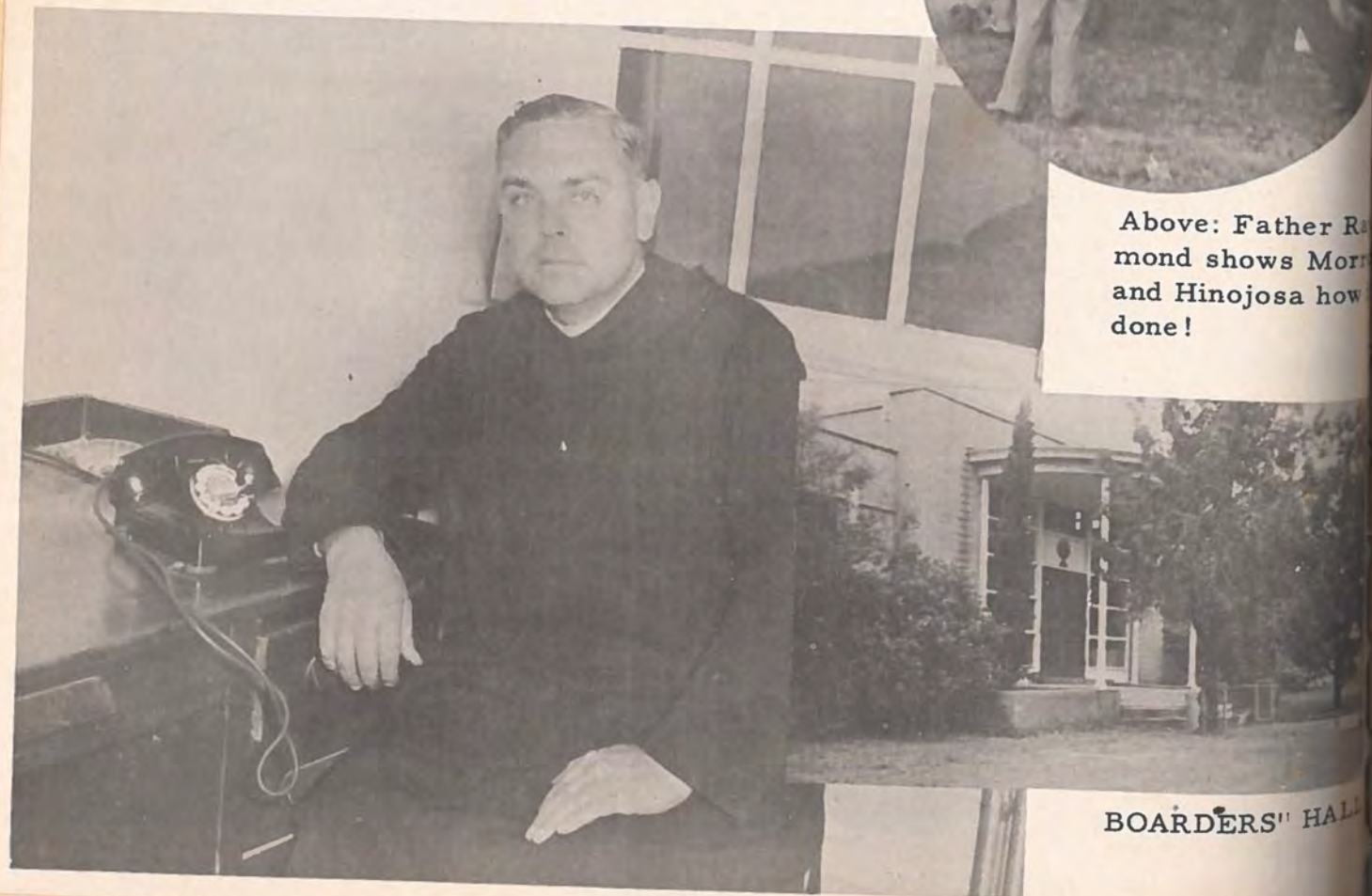
