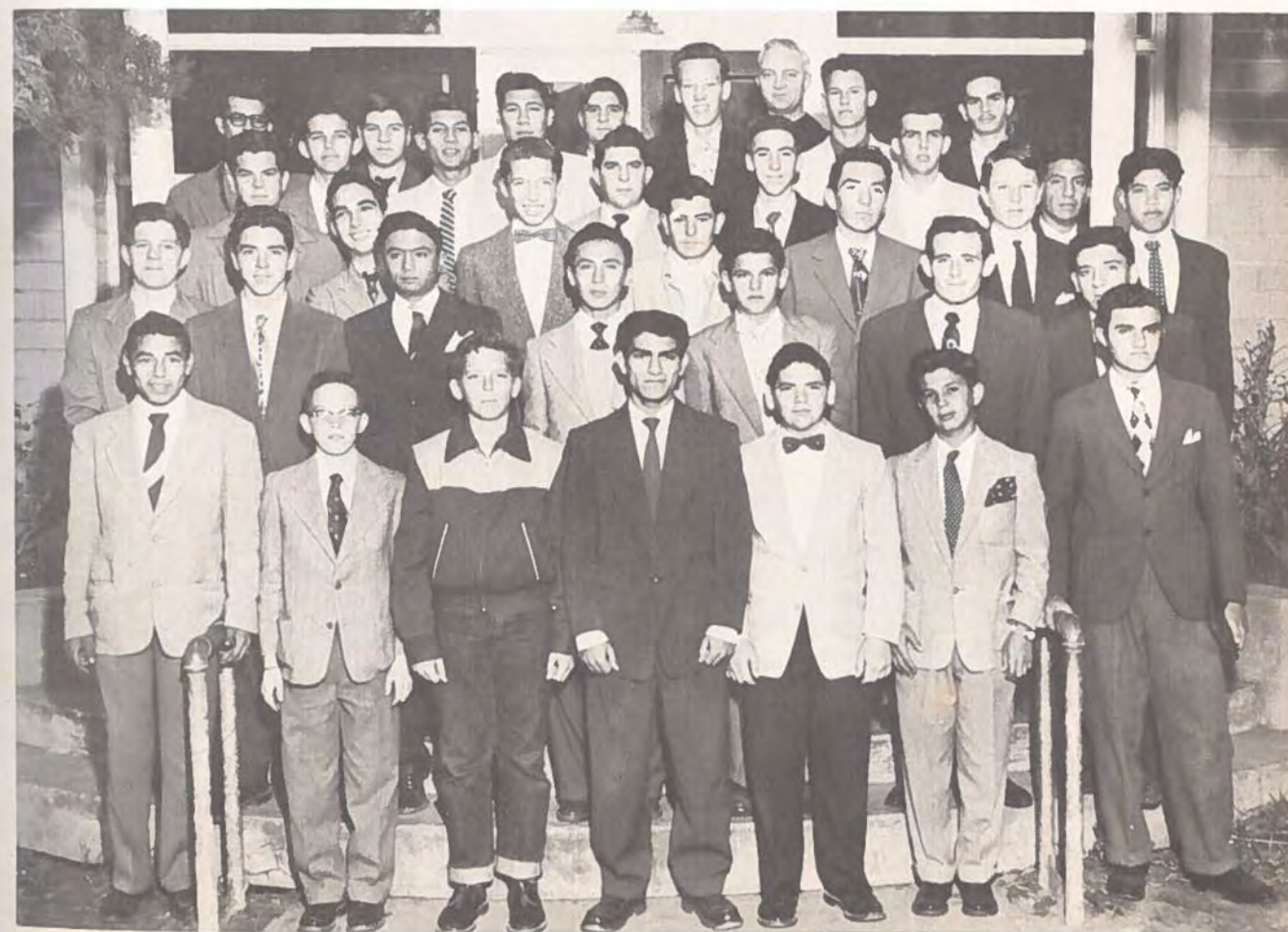

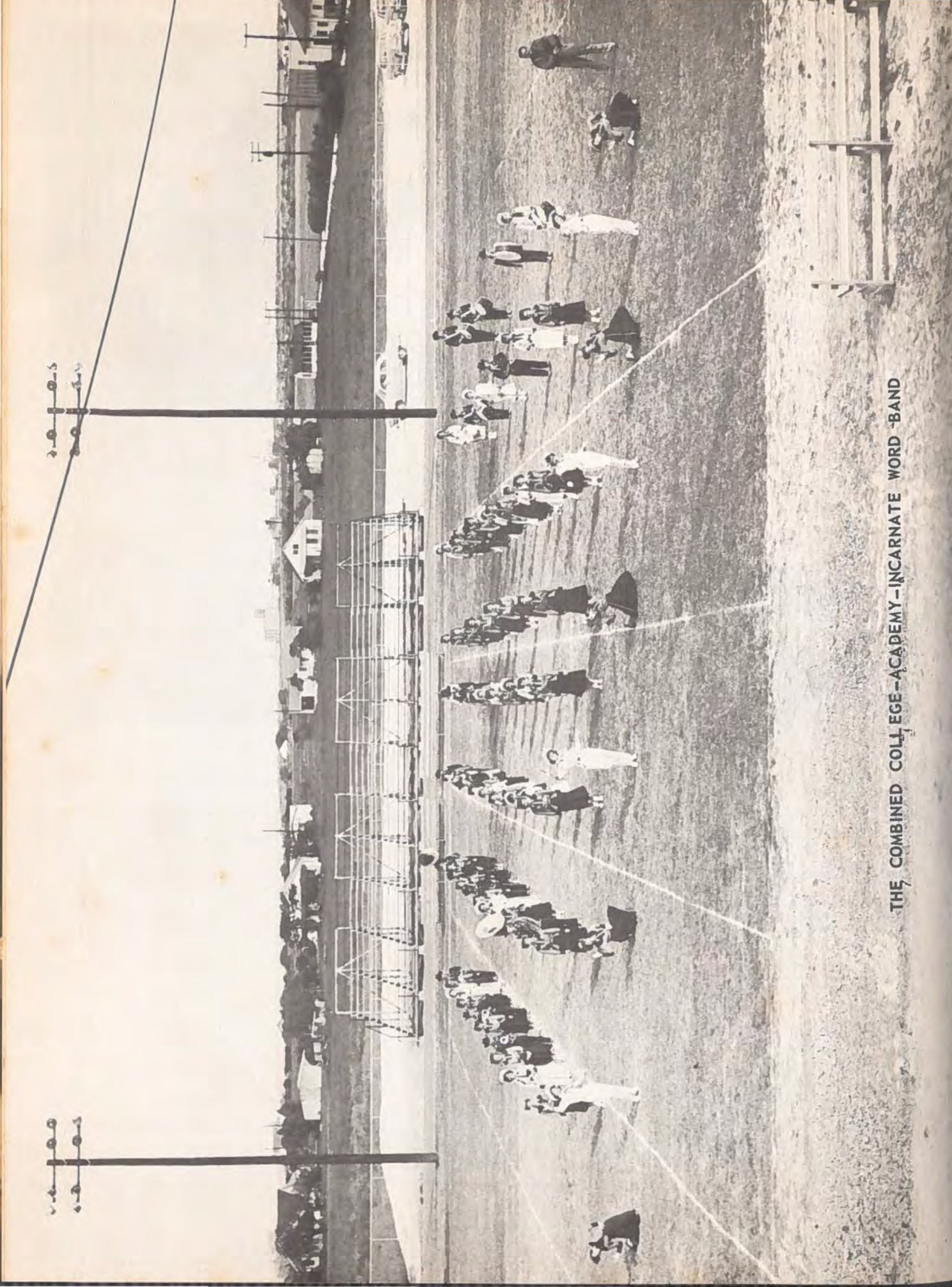

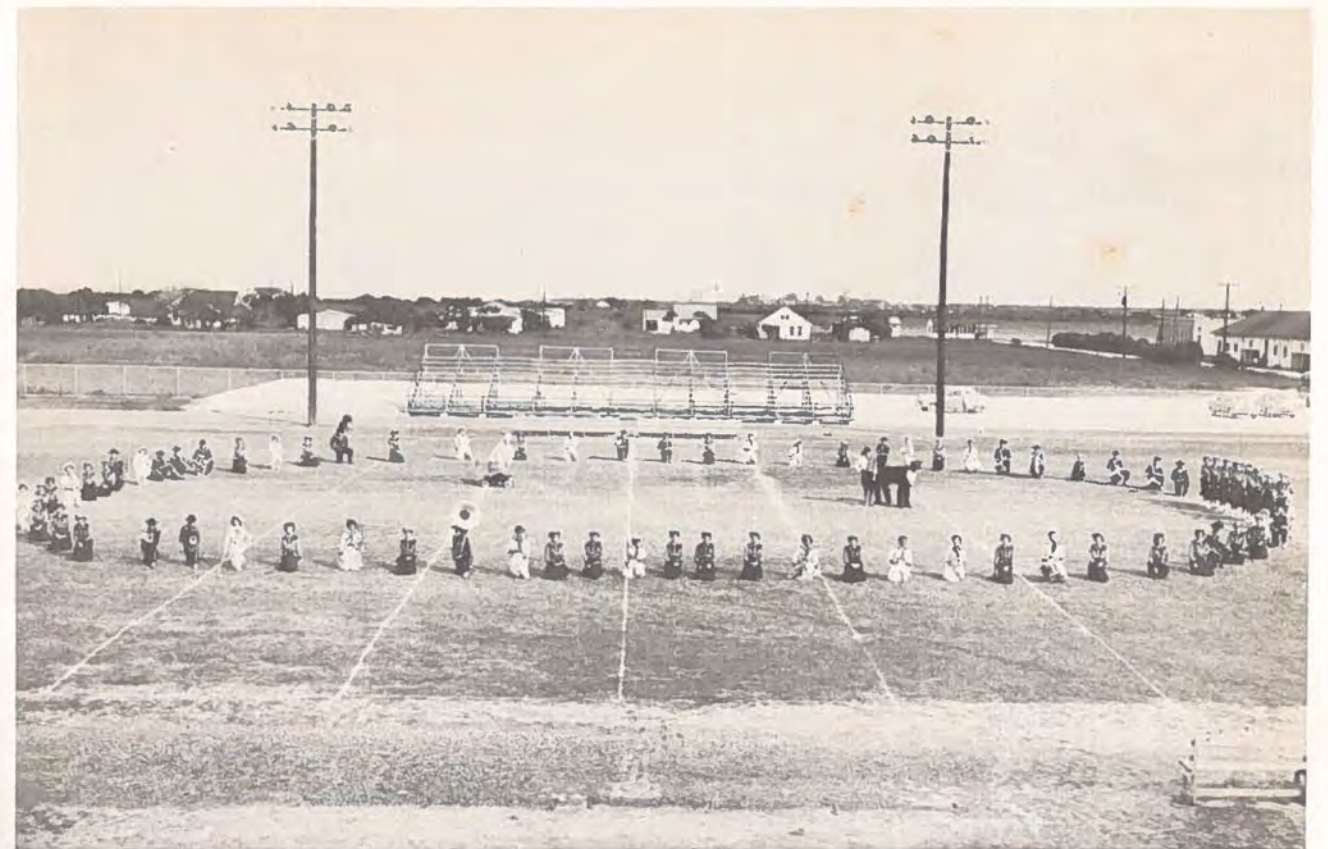

FREER—Three-year letterman Joe Holcomb had one of the greatest nights of his high school career here Friday night as he led the Freer Buckaroos to a smashing 46-13 victory over Corpus Christi College-Academy in a season football opener for both teams. The 160-pound senior halfback led through the Cavaliers like a dummy scrimmage as he amassed 305 yards of the 410 Freer total and scored five touchdowns.

Cavaliers Never in It

The Cavaliers never were in a ball game as they fumbled on opening kickoff and Freer back Eugene Roberts raced yards on the first play from scrimmage to get the Bucks off lead they never relinquished. Freer had possession of the ball times in the first quarter scored on the occasion as

Holcomb followed Roberts' initial score with three of his own on runs of 64, 36 and two yards.
