





HIGHLIGHTS

January Vaughan, teacher at Chesapeake City Elementary, and Danielle Strange, Elk Neck Elementary School, were named 2011 - 2012 Simon McNeely Award recipients by the Maryland Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance.

Mr. Robert Davis, Executive Director for Human Resources, received the Minority Recognition Award for Community Service and Leadership from the Maryland State Education Association.

2012 Bohemia Manor graduate and former Board of Education student member, Douglas (Bryn) Bogan, was selected as one of two Maryland students to attend the United States Senate Youth Program.

Dr. Nelson Fritts, Instructional Coordinator of Fine Arts, was selected as the 2012 Maryland Music Educators Association "Corwin Taylor Music Education Leadership Award" recipient.

Cecil County Public Library, Elkton Middle School, and Gilpin Manor Elementary School received a grant to support their SPARK (Students Progress and Achieve with Reading Kits) Program that gave every 5th and 6th grader in those two schools five books based on their individual identified areas of interest and a timer bookmark for the summer.

Elk Neck Elementary School received the Maryland School of Excellence in Arts Education Award (MSEAEA). The MSEAEA is designed to recognize and honor individual public schools for their excellent arts education programs and for providing a creative learning environment for outstanding student achievement.

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada awarded Cecil County Public Schools the GFOA Distinguished Budget Presentation Award.

Cecil County Public Schools was one of four school systems nationwide chosen to partner with the Center for Applied Special Technology (CAST) on a renowned teacher professional development program with an \$8,000 grant, funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

Rhonda Holmes-Blankenship MARYLAND TEACHER OF THE YEAR

On March 12, 2012, Rising Sun High School English teacher, Rhonda Holmes-Blankenship was named 2012 Cecil County Teacher of the Year. Rhonda is a 1991 graduate of North East High School, earned her Bachelor of Science in English with a concentration in Secondary Education from Towson University in 1995, and received her Master of Science in Curriculum and Instruction from McDaniel College in 2005. In 2010, Rhonda acheived National Board Certification as a first-year candidate.

Rhonda returned to teach in Cecil County in 2001 where she continues to teach at Rising Sun High School. Anne Gellrich, Rising Sun High School principal, stated in Rhonda's nomination letter, "Mrs. Blankenship's drive to be the best teacher for her students is one of those intangible, immeasurable qualities a good teacher has. Each student in her class knows that, to Mrs. Blankenship, their success is the measure of her success."



On October 5, 2012, Rhonda and a crowd of friends, family, colleagues, and school system leadership attended the Maryland State Teacher of the Year Gala held at Martin's West in Baltimore. Just one month earlier, Rhonda was selected as one of seven finalists for the state's top honor. When Maryland Superintendent, Dr. Lillian Lowery, and WJZ 13's Denise Koch took the stage to announce the winner, the hopeful anticipation was palpable. It was a great moment for CCPS when Dr. Lowery opened the envelope and announced that Rhonda was the 2013 Maryland Teacher of the Year. When Rhonda finally made her way to the stage to give her acceptance speech, it was clear to all of those in attendance that she was most deserved of this great honor.

Throughout the next year, Rhonda will represent Maryland in the National Teacher of the Year competition and will serve as a spokesperson and representative for Maryland educators. Cecil County Public Schools is proud to have Rhonda also represent our great county as she travels the nation serving in this highly regarded role.

CCIPS Sets State Facility Maintenance Record

This year CCPS received the news that all five Cecil County schools that were state-inspected last year had received Superior ratings from the Maryland School Construction Program. Calvert Elementary, Cecil Manor Elementary, Cherry Hill Middle, Elkton High and Perryville High Schools all earned the top ranking when their buildings were inspected for facility maintenance and cleanliness. This is a new state record. Moreover, CCPS has received twenty-five "Superior" ratings in the past fifteen years.

Past award recipients are Cherry Hill Middle, Bohemia Manor Middle, Rising Sun Middle, Calvert Elementary, Cecil Manor Elementary, Cecilton Elementary, Kenmore Elementary, North East Elementary, Bay View Elementary, Rising Sun High School, Bainbridge Elementary, Conowingo Elementary, Rising Sun Elementary, Elkton Middle, Charlestown Elementary, Leeds Elementary, Holly Hall Elementary, and Perryville Middle Schools. Cecilton Elementary, North East Elementary, Calvert Elementary, Cecil Manor Elementary, and Cherry Hill Middle Schools have all received two Superior ratings. We would like to commend all of our schools for their efforts.



of students met graduation requirements by completing the


