




#### **Maryland State Assessments**

- Since 2003: Elementary reading scores increased 16.8% Elementary math scores increased 13.5%. Middle school reading scores increased 17.1% Middle School math scores increased 20.7%
- Ten schools received all-time-best scores in reading.
- Twelve schools received all-time-best scores in math.

#### **Advanced Placement Exams**

•CCPS showed an increase in the number of exams completed and the number of exams that • 20.0% received a score of 3 or higher.

•For the past 3 years, CCPS has outranked both the Maryland and Global average for the number of exams scoring a 3 or higher.



# 2010-2011 Highlights

• Students in the Class of 2011 reported that a total of \$11,140,874 in scholarships (merit, athletic, and academic) were offered to them.

• Tatiana Flores of TEES was named the CCPS Outstanding Safety Patroller by the AAA Mid-Atlantic Foundation.

• Dr. C. Nelson Fritts, Instructional Coordinator of Fine Arts was selected as the 2011 AEMS Alliance Arts Education Advocate of the Year by the Arts Education in Maryland Schools (AEMS) Alliance.

• Through energy conservation efforts, CCPS saved 2.5 million kilowatt hours of electricity, which saved 3.75 million pounds of carbon dioxide from being emitted into the atmosphere.

• The Cecil County's Judy Center Partnership was recognized by MSDE in collaboration with the Judith P. Hoyer Foundation with the Most Improved Partnership Award.

• Katie Hendrix, student at PHS, was accepted into the MENC (Music Educators National Conference) All National Honor Chorus.

• Walter Price was selected as the Groundskeeper of the Year by the Maryland State Association of Baseball Coaches.

The Center for American Progress has ranked Cecil County as one of the top Maryland counties in its recent nationwide study, *Return* on Educational Investment: A District-byDistrict Evaluation of U.S. Educational Productivity. The study rated school systems on how much academic achievement they get for each dollar spent as compared to other districts in their state. Cecil County Public Schools ranked sixth when measured against the other twenty-three school systems. In addition, the study created a second set of data which they referred to as "adjusted return on investment" that accounts for variables outside of a school system's control such as the education of low-income, special needs, or non-English speaking students. ### **SCHOOL SYSTEM FUNDING** How Local Taxes and State Funds Help

Cecil County Public Schools, like all school systems in Maryland, is fiscally dependent. This means that the school system has no direct taxing authority. All revenues necessary to prepare schools for students, pay our teachers and employees, and purchase the supplies and services to deliver instructional services to each of our students are received

from Cecil County government, the State of Maryland, and the federal government. Miscellaneous revenues are received from other sources, such as investment earnings, nonresident and summer school tuitions, and rental facilities.


The State of Maryland revenue represented 55.5 percent of FY '11 revenue. These funds included the foundation funding formula, transportation and special education formulas, and maintenance of schools. In addition, the state's contribution to the State Retirement and Pension System for eligible employees is reflected in this revenue.

In FY '11, 8.7 percent of revenue was received from the federal government in the form of grants targeted for use in specific areas. The major federal revenue received in FY'11 included: Title I, Title II Teacher Quality, Special Education, Perkins Vocational and Technical Education, Safe and Drug-Free Schools, and Technology Literacy.

Other revenue sources included investment earnings, nonresident and summer school tuition, insurance recoveries, etc., and represented 1.5 percent of total revenues.

Cecil County government's appropriation to the school system was 34.3 percent of the school system's receipts. This funding was provided to the school system from the local government's tax revenues that included two primary sources- property tax and income tax.

The Business and Education Partnership Advisory Council (BEPAC) is a 501c(3) organization in partnership with the Cecil County Public Schools. BEPAC members serve on advisory committees, participate in the speaker's bureau, and most recently provided engineering expertise as mentors for the Project Lead the Way (PLTW) pre-engineering capstone projects. The students in the Science,



necessary to be successful in the 21st Century workforce. BEPAC continues to collaborate with the Maryland Business Roundtable in providing classroom lessons that emphasize to students that "...what they do in school matters."

BEPAC welcomed eight new members and recognized five new school business partners. The 65 members have pledged continued support in expanding school partnerships, retention and recognition of teachers, mentors for the middle school AIM High dropout prevention program, middle school career exploration, advisors for all Career and Technology Education (CTE) and STEM programs.

The BEPAC membership meetings are held on the fourth Tuesday of every month in the Board Room at the Carver Education Leadership Center, 7:30-9:00 a.m. Meetings are open to the public.
