## The Lotus Lantern's Connection to Korean Culture

**Lotus Flower Lantern Workshop**

On Saturday October 21, members of the Korean Spirit and Culture Promotion Project (KSCPP), a non-profit, nongovernment organization dedicated to the

promotion of greater awareness and understanding of Korean history and culture, offered a Korean lotus lantern making class at the Somers Library.

The organization was first founded in 2005 by Kim Jae Woong, and travels throughout the United States, Europe, and Korea. These lanterns are traditionally used for weddings and holidays. Once a year, usually in the spring, Koreans celebrate Yeondeunghoe, a Lantern Lighting Festival in Korea to celebrate

Buddha's Birthday. Buddhism is the most popular religion in Korea and its beliefs and traditions are embedded into Korean culture. In Buddhism, the lotus lantern means to light the light of wisdom and escape from the darkness of defile-

ments and ignorance.

The lotuses grow in many beautiful colors. White symbolizes purity, Pink is associated with the Great Buddha because it is reserved for the highest deity, Red lotuses symbolize love, compassion, passion and all the qualities of the heart, Blue is a symbol of knowledge, and lastly Purple symbolizes dignity and spirituality.

Did you know that lotuses grow in the mud underneath the water, stem through the water and bloom above the water, and never get stained by mud or dirt? They also are one of the most unique flowers because they produce their fruit at the same time that they bloom. Both these things have

great significance in Buddhism.

The lanterns are made with wire and then 8 pieces of cut out paper is securely glued onto the structure, using a special handmade paste of flour and water. Then it is left to dry before adding the beautifully colored petal paper. Regular glue is used to stick each individual delicate paper petal onto the structure of the lantern in rows of eight and finally the green leaves are added by two rows of fours at the end, the last row facing the other direction outward.

The lanterns are lit with candles or little

electrical candles can be used to prevent fire hazards. They can be placed on tables or near windowsills to be admired by all who see them. It is important to note that many other Asian cultures also admire and celebrate the beauty of the lotus flower.

The cultural values in Korea are encapsulated in the nation's founding philosophy of "Hongik Ingan", which literally means to live for the benefit of all mankind. In my opinion everyone in the en-

tire world should follow this philosophy because it works for the good of all living creatures. This is teamwork at its finest, where everyone works together to improve life for everyone else as a whole.

About 70 years ago, Korea was the poorest country in the world after being nearly destroyed by three years of the Korean War, from 1950 to 1953.

Many leaders around the world thought Korea could never recover from the damage, but the nation proved them all wrong. Then in 1997, Korea experienced a devastating economic crisis which

left the country in a lot of debt. But its people worked together and donated all their gold jewelry to the Korean banks to help pay off their country's debt. Many citizens worked hard and worked overtime without pay so that future Korean generations would have brighter futures.

Today, Korea is the 6th most powerful country in the world. Amazingly, in its

long history as a nation, Korea has never

invaded another country. It is the only country to have gone from complete poverty to success in such little time. Most of its citizens have attended college, and their healthcare is one of the best in the world and also affordable for all. Its average crime rate is much lower than that of the United States and other countries in Europe. It is also on the path to possibly being the first country in the world to ever break the 90 years of age life expectancy average, with its current life expectancy average being one of the top ones at 83.7 years of age.

If the whole world followed the example of

Korea, then the world would be so much happier. In Somers Middle School, many of us take taekwondo classes, enjoy Korean dramas, listen to K-pop, and enjoy Korean snacks and food brands such as Bibigo. It is important to learn about other countries and their cultures so we can become good

global citizens in the world.

# Yes, There's a 'National Breadstick' Day

Have you ever heard of National Breadstick Day?

National Bread Stick Day is October 27th!

Breadsticks were created in the 17th century (1600's) by an Italian baker called Antoino Brunero. He originally created the food for Duke Victor Amadeus II, who had digestive problems throughout his life. Afterwards, breadsticks quickly became popular because they were easy to digest and would last for days. Now, in the 21st century, breadsticks are usually a soft bread served at restaurants. However, breadsticks, while time consuming, are easy to make at home! Here's

how... 1. Proof yeast: Add warm water, yeast and sugar to the bowl of

a stand mixer and stir gently. Rest for 5 minutes. The yeast should lightly foam on top. If it doesn't, the yeast may not be fresh. (If using Instant yeast, skip this step and add all of the ingredients to the bowl.)

2. Make dough: Add 1 ½ cups flour, salt and vegetable oil and mix on medium speed. Add another 1 ½ cups flour. The dough should be slightly sticky, but pull away from the sides of the bowl. Knead

mixture for 5-7 minutes.

3. Let rise: Transfer dough to a large, greased bowl and cover tightly with plastic wrap. Allow to rest for about 1.5 hours.

4. Shape breadsticks: Once risen, punch dough down and divide it into 12 equal parts. Roll each piece of dough into a rope shape and transfer to a greased cookie sheet.

**5. Second rise.** Cover and allow to rise again for 1 hour. **6. Bake** breadsticks at 425 degrees F for 10-12 minutes. Remove from oven, brush tops with butter and transfer to a wire cooling rack.

7. Season the breadsticks however you would like. My personal favorite is a mix of cinnamon and sugar.
