On Thursday 12/14, we had a false lockdown drill. Here it is from the point of view of an eighth grade student who was in the main office at the time it

occurred.

Earlier today, I was about to make announcements to the school about after school clubs, etc. And suddenly, the lock down alarm

went off

Soon after, the Somers, state and county police were on site, unlocking the rooms as over 100 kids

were in the main office, including people who were making announcements. In a memo sent to parents, it said that students and staff followed procedures perfectly and everyone tried to do their best.

The event lasted one hour, which was the longest lock-down initiated in SMS history. I acted with concern with dragging my mom out of the school, taking precautions and not being near the school.

When I was told I could go in, I watched as Mrs. Mangone delivered the announcement lifting kids from lockdown after one hour and three minutes. Mrs. Pepe was doing a Q&A with the students, and she was telling the kids that if the alarm goes off, they should not open the door for anyone after it goes off. Also, the internet went off for most of the districts that use the Lower Hudson Regional Information Center (LHRIC) maybe due to the lockdown. No one knows why.

This same incident hap-

pened two weeks after the high school had an accidental lockdown alarm malfunction and now it happened here. That needs to spark questions in people's minds—with all these drills going on, are kids getting used to these accidents? This is a major issue since at any point a threat can bypass the security measures and if that does happen, will kids think it will be another accident?

Thursday's lockdown accident proved that everyone should be prepared for anything to occur at any moment.

"No, it has to be me...I'm sorry. go or I'll make you..." I whispered.


They took off and I held my double knives up. "So who wants a piece of me?" I teased.

WHAT TO BAKE OVER THE WINTER BREAK

WHIPPED HOT COCOA TIME: 5 mins

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INGREDIENTS:

- 2 TBSP Powdered Hot Chocolate Mix
- 5 TBSP Heavy Whipping
- 34 cup Chocolate Milk
- Optional: Marshmallows and/ or Shaved

Chocolate for Garnish INSTRUCTIONS:

- In a small mixing bowl, combine the heavy whipping cream and hot chocolate mix.
- Whisk or beat with a mixer until the consistency is fluffy.
- Heat chocolate milk in the microwave for 1-2 minutes depending on your microwave wattage and how hot you prefer your beverage. For younger children, you might want to make warm chocolate instead of hot chocolate!)
- spoon the whipped chocolate on top of the chocolate milk.

FOR THE COOKIES

- 1. 1/2 cup unsalted butter I stick
- 12 oz (about 354.88 ml) semisweet chocolate
- 3. 11/2 cups flour
- 1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 11/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt 6.
- 7. 11/4 cups brown sugar
- 8. 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 10. 25 large marshmallows approximately

FOR THE ICING

- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter 1/2 stick, melted
- 3. 1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1/4 cup hot water
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

assorted sprinkles

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. In a medium saucepan melt the butter and chocolate, stirring frequently. Once melted, set aside to cool slightly.

- In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, cocoa powder, baking powder and salt. In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat the sugar, eggs, and vanilla on low speed until well combined.
- Add the cooled chocolate mix-ture and blend until just com-
- bined While mixing, add the flour mixture slowly and blend un-
- til just combined. Prepare cookie icing by combining all ingredients in a medium bowl and mixing together with a whisk. Place wire cooling rack (with cookies on it) over a baking sheet (to catch any excess icing). Spoon a small amount of icing onto the top of each marshmallow and use the back of the spoon to spread it a bit. After icing just, a couple cookies, top with sprinkles before the icing
- dries. Allow icing to set up about 30 minutes before serving.
- Scrape down the sides of the bowl, then cover the dough and refrigerate for at least 1 hour. The dough should be firm. If making the dough a day ahead, let sit at room temperature for 30 minutes before shaping.
- Preheat oven to 325*F. and line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper. Use a table-spoon (or a tablespoon sized cookie scoop) to scoop the dough, then roll the dough in your hands to create balls.
- 10. Arrange the balls about 2 inches apart on your baking sheets, then flatten slightly.
- 11. Bake cookies for about 12 minutes.
- 12. While the cookies bake, cut the large marshmallows in half.
- 13. When the cookies have baked, remove from oven, and press one marshmallow half into the center of each cookie. Return the cookies to the oven and bake another 2-3 minutes. Allow the pan of cookies to cool for a few minutes, then transfer the cookies to cooling rack.





As we took pictures of people wearing orange, it really made us and them happy to see that they got a chance to show people outside of school that they support




non-bullying. Lots of people wore lots of fun things like a wig, tutu, and so


The Big Trade—Yankees Acquire Juan Soto
