

Should the Government Get Access to Encrypted Cell Phones?

You may have heard that the FBI demanded Apple to help unlock the iPhone used by one of the San Bernardino attackers.

The leader of the FBI, Director James B. Comey, stated, "If the government succeeds in this case, it could set a precedent for others."

Apple is refusing to give the information to the FBI to unlock the phones. Apple is following the privacy laws.

In court, the judge asked the FBI, "If Apple agrees to give you the information, this will not be the last request to unlock iPhones, correct?"

Unfortunately, that is true. Not that I don't want the culprits caught, and our country to be safe, but I think privacy is a very important consideration. I feel very uncomfortable with people going into my iPhone and looking through my personal messages without my consent, and I believe that this sentiment is shared with everyone.

Bruce Sewell, Apple's general counsel, asserted that Apple's defiance of the government's court order in the San Bernardino case was not motivated by financial concerns. "This is not a marketing issue," he said, rejecting suggestions by the Justice Department, which he said "diminishes" the serious issues being debated.

In order to find out what people think about Apple's actions, I have interviewed several teachers, asking them "What do you think should happen and whose side are you on, Apple's or the FBI's?"

One teacher, Mr. Wilbert, 7th grade science teacher, responded, "I think that the

safety of citizens needs to be upheld, but there needs to be a balance of privacy and the company's willingness to aid our country's overall safety. I am not sure that I have a side."

Mr. Mullaney, 7th grade Social Studies teacher, stated, "I am probably on the side of the government, because you need to take an exception to people's privacy, while searching for justice, we need to solve more crimes and help keep this world safe."

Mr. Pappas, 7th grade ELA teacher, responded, "I am on the governments side. If the terrorists are using a phone to communicate secretly, and if that puts people at risk, then we need to know about that."

Mr. Lugo, 6/7/8th technology teacher, answered, "I am on the FBI's side when there is a big catastrophe. (However), you don't want anyone unlocking your phone for no reason, right?" More information on this topic, as it goes along.

In summary, I will be very interested to see how this pans out. On one hand, the FBI already uses search warrants to go through peoples' personal belongings, with no choice given to them, when they are suspected of having committed a serious crime. From February 11 to February

18, the NBA was busy. Between All-Star Weekend festivities and the trade deadline, every NBA GM was running around trying to make their roster better in every way possible.

On Friday, February 12, BBVA Rising Stars challenge featured players in their 1st, 2nd, or 3rd NBA season who are playing at a high level. The two teams are separated by USA born players, and other worldwide players. Similar to an All-Star Game for younger guys, there is usually very little defense played.

Last year Wolves SF Andrew Wiggins won MVP, this year it was Wolves Zach LaVine. LaVine and Wiggins are showing a promising future and the Wolves are beginning to surround their franchise around them. On Saturday Night, the Skills Challenge took place as Wolves rookie Karl-Anthony Towns defeated Isaiah Thomas of the Celtics.

Also, Klay Thompson beat defending champ and fellow Splash Bro, Steph Curry for the 3-Point Contest. Finally, a Dunk Contest of the ages between Zach LaVine and Aaron Gordon ended with Zach LaVine winning his second consecutive championship.

Over the last three weeks, there were some pretty incredible things. There were the 369 combined points scored in the NBA All-Star Game, there was a



letdown of an NBA Trade Deadline, and there was Kobe Bryant's last All-Star appearance.

Starting with the All-Star Game, there was the high scoring that there is every year. There is slim to no defense played because nobody wants to be physical and run the risk of getting hurt. With 18,298 attendants (average NBA game is 65,000) there were not as many people as expected.

With a 5x NBA Champion Gregg Popovich coaching the West, and inexperienced Tyronn Lue for the East, most people knew what the turnout would be before the game even started. Despite having John Wall, Kyle Lowry, and LeBron James, the West was just more talented. With Steph Curry, Kevin Durant, Russell Westbrook, and Kawhi Leonard, they are a powerful force. Russell Westbrook became the first player in 60 years to get the All-Star MVP award in two consecutive years.

Another important event in NBA news was the Trade Deadline. Typically, teams wait until the last 48 hours or so before the Trade Deadline is up to make moves with their players, and we have seen that become more and more of an exciting event every year.

However, many people were surprised this year as it was really a letdown. Stars like Derrick Rose, Carmelo Anthony, Dwight Howard, and Kevin Love were highly anticipated to be traded, but nothing happened. A few bench players moved around, but that was it.

Last year, players like Isaiah Thomas and Goran Dragic were traded. In response to those trades, the Celtics fought their way into the 8th seed last year, and are 3rd in the East, sitting with a 37-25 record. Also, since Dragic joined the Heat, they turned around a 10th seed spot last year to a 5th spot in the East right now. Bottom line, the deadline was a bust.


Chapter 1
