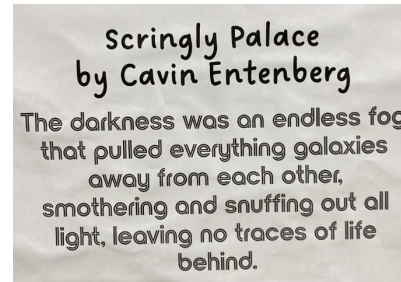
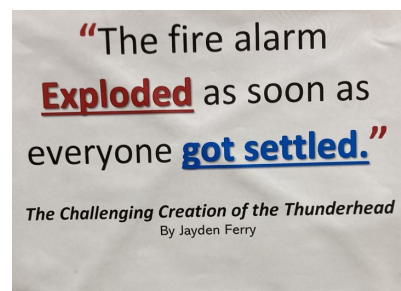

What is autism? Autism is a serious developmental disorder that impairs the ability to com-

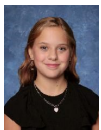
municate and interact. Autism spectrum disorder impacts the nervous system.

As a student who has made a project, I have decided to share a tiny bit about my project. My project was a short chil-

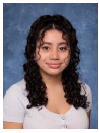
dren's book about a mythical king named Charlemagne. He ruled a lot of Europe way back in 800!

8 Out of 10 Global Problems: Disability Rights

Editor's Note: This is an ongoing series presenting 20 global problems and solutions to fix them. This is the eighth installment. The first installment ran in the 10/14/22 issue of the Tusker Tribune.

Disability Rights is ranked 8th on the top 10 global issues. People with disabilities can mean people who have vision impairment, deafness, brain injuries, and physical disabilities. Poor disability rights could mean discrimination of employment, state and local government, public accommodations, commercial facilities, transportation, and telecommunications.

People with disabilities mainly struggle with a physical environment that is not accessible, or a lack of relevant assistive technology, and/or negative attitudes of people towards disability. Often people stereotype people with disabilities by assuming their quality of their life is poor or that they are unhealthy because of their impairments. Steps and curbs that block a person with mobility impairment from entering a building or using a sidewalk.

People with disabilities are far less likely to be employed; 35.5% of people with disabilities ages 18 to 64 years, were employed, while 76.5% of people



without disabilities were employed. Adults aged 18 years and older with disabilities are less likely to have completed high school compared to their peers without disabilities.

People with disabilities are more likely to have an income of less than \$15,000 per year compared to people without disabilities. Children with disabilities are almost four times more likely to experience violence than children without disabilities.

Three ways you can help people with disabilities to get their rights is, first, by sharing disability articles, stories or even this article on social media platforms. This is especially effective if you have many "followers". It's important to spread this message, especially on platforms you know people will get the message on.

A second way to help with this is by amplifying the voices and work of disabled activists. Social media has many ways for you to boost what other people are saying and doing. Boosting other people's work and ideas is helpful to disabilities issues.

A third way you can help is by remembering disability issues when you vote. You don't have to set aside all of your opinions to make a vote based on disabled people, but at least find out where candidates stand on disability issues.

Chichén Itzá is a Mayan Wonder

Chichén Itzá was one of the Mayans' largest settlements between 600-900 AD (Over 1500 Years Old). Unfortunately for the Mayans, the Toltecs conquered the Mayan city in the 10th century.

How to Make an Eco-Brick

In the February

talked about eco-bricks and how it can be a simple fix to the plastic pollution problem. Now, we are going to discuss how to make a regular eco brick.

- **Collect plastics.** These plastics can range from wrappers to water Styrofoam! Your plastic water bottles are key, too. However, do not buy these plastics just to make the eco-brick.
- **Choose your water bottle.** When choosing your water bottle, it's best to go for one that has a volume of 600 mL or less. This is because these 600 mL water bottles can be quick to make, so you can learn from your mistakes quicker! However, the size you want your water bottle depends on what you are constructing with these eco-bricks and availability of the water bottle.
- **Clean the plastics and water bottles and dry.** This sounds like a simple step, but it vital for the eco-brick to be an eco-brick! If you don't wash the food, oil, or dirt from the plastics and water bottles, then microbials will grow within this eco-brick, defeating the whole purpose of this eco-brick. After cleaning, make sure you



dry these plastics!

- **Cut your cleaned plastics up.** For the eco-brick to be dense, you need to cut up the plastics into small pieces. Once that's done, you can start with your eco-brick!

- **Stuff a soft plastic at the bottom of eco-brick.** Now that you have your plastic cut up, start by stuffing a solid colored soft plastic and the bottom of your eco-brick. Soft plastic could look like a plastic bag.

- **Weight your eco-brick.** Now that you have finished your eco-brick, you need to weigh it to ensure the quality of it. A 600mL water bottle must be above 200 grams while a 500 mL water bottle must be above 500 grams.

- **Log your eco-brick.** As you finish and cap your eco-brick, you will want to add important information on the outside of your water bottle. You want to record data such as your name, final weigh of the eco-brick, the date, what you will use this eco-brick for, and a serial number generated by the "GoBrick App."

So, now you finally created an eco-brick. What now? With your eco-bricks, you can form different structures such as gardens. If you can't build right away, make sure you store your eco-brick away in a safe, slightly elevated spot like a shelf! Thank you for reading this article, see you next time!

The Franklin Institute Science Museum Science Assembly, sponsored by the Somers Middle School PTA, was amazing. It was such an enjoyable experience.

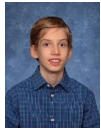

Prioritize and organize your work

Fortunately, there are many extensions for Google to stop this from happening. One example is a Self Control extension, which allows you to temporarily block distracting websites. Most of these extensions are free, and you can find them by going to the Google Chrome Web Store.

Don't stress if you get stuck.

Our plans don't always work out. You might anticipate that you can get through your math worksheet quickly, but then get stuck on a question. If this happens, don't worry. If you really can't figure out the answer, move onto the next question and try again later.
