

- The Pittsburgh Business Times ranked Pine-Richland School District 9th in southwestern Pennsylvania based on Keystone and PSSA scores from 2022, 2021 and 2019 in its 2023 Guide to Southwestern Pennsylvania Schools.
- U.S. News & World Report ranked Pine-Richland High School 7th in the Pittsburgh metropolitan area, 26th in Pennsylvania and 863rd nationally in its 2022 rankings.
- The district has a newly approved **Strategic Plan** for 2023-2027, resulting from the input of approximately 400 individuals over the 2022-2023 year, with an unwavering commitment to academic achievement and growth, starting with excellent instruction within the general education classroom. - 2022-2023 was the first full year for the district's **Sustainability Leadership Council**. Student representatives taking part in the council make up the first united six-school sustainability club. This year, students focused on recycling, moving the district to singlestream recycling that now includes plastics and aluminum alongside paper.

# Safety and Security

The district continues to take a strategic approach to school safety and security. Fostering a safe and positive school environment sets the foundation for learning. This year, we adopted the Raptor Emergency Response System to align with the Raptor Visitor Management System implemented during the 2018-2019 school year and updated emergency response language to align with standard response protocol terminology. Drills throughout the year reinforced building-specific routines and gave staff members opportunities to practice using the Raptor system. Emergency operations plans have been expanded to develop clear

response procedures in the event of an emergency during after-school athletic activities and have been reviewed and practiced by coaches and studentathletes. Training videos were created to support thirdparty partners to ensure all employees are aware of the district's safety practices. The district continues to work closely with the Northern Regional Police Department (NRPD) and other first responders. Table top drills and other activities that encourage collaboration between the district and NRPD continue to strengthen systems and response protocols.



#### Future-Focused Financial Health

The district leadership and governance team continues to manage and re-evaluate future-focused financial health given evolving economic conditions and capital needs. The district has been intentional for many years in considering a five-to-ten year view of overall finances. Public Financial Management has provided a third-party financial tool that forecasts a five-year budget perspective based on various a ssumptions. The district's capital funding plan provides a ten-year forecast. The last tax increase for PRSD was 1.97% in 2017-2018, which was approved to offset capital expenditures while allowing the district to reduce debt as a percentage of the operating budget. Most recently, the 2023-2024 General Fund Budget was passed with no change in millage rate. Looking forward, we will continue discussions regarding a possible future tax increase as well as utilization of assigned fund balance for capital improvements to help offset some large capital projects. The key to these discussions hinge upon future-focused implications to the financial position of the school district.

# School Culture and Diversity




The School Culture and Diversity Leadership Council met throughout the school year and focused on providing feedback on school culture and diversity topics and making recommendations for specific actions that support a positive school culture. Topics have included developmentally appropriate messages delivered by building administrators to students that reinforce the culture we strive for in our schools that embraces diversity and inclusion and clearly outlines unacceptable behaviors and language. Through our core text evaluation process, diversity of author, genre and characters are now considered when making new core text recommendations. The concept of cheer for our team emerged from this collaborative work. Our athletic department and building principals work with coaches, students and booster groups to reinforce ways to cheer for our teams in energetic but respectful ways. Over the course of the second semester, student (8-12) and parent focus groups were conducted to share perspectives on school culture and diversity. This information will help guide future recommendations for improvement.

# In-Depth Program Review Study Phase

Family Consumer Science, Engineering & Technology, Health Services and School Counseling

The district's final four departments participated in the In-Depth Program Review (IDPR) process study phase. Teachers, nurses and school counselors researched current trends in their programs, spoke with other districts, interviewed college/university staff members and business leaders and reviewed data trends in their field. Students and parents were asked to share input through focus groups and electronic feedback. Final

# In-Depth Program Review Implementation Phase



All but four departments were in the implementation phase of the IDPR process this year including new additions of art, world language and special education/ Multi-Tier Systems of Support (MTSS). Our art teachers worked with local businesses and organizations to reinforce the final phase of an art project—presenting. Our students' creativity and talents were on display at Pine Community Center, throughout our campuses and now our students' artwork is a permanent part of the Pearce Mill Trail Tunnel for our community to enjoy for years to come.

Our world language staff collaborated on grade 4-6 curriculum to prepare for a new sequence of learning experiences for our students. Sixth grade students will begin a deeper exploration of French, German and Spanish this year, allowing them to spend even more time in their selected language in middle school as they prepare to fully immerse themselves throughout their high school careers. Special education teachers and support staff made significant gains this year with their IDPR goals. Adjustments were made to the elementary school's specialized programs (life skills, autism and emotion support) in an effort to provide students and families with resources and trained staff within our three schools. A number of intervention programs were identified and adopted to address the specific needs of our students with a goal of keeping students in their general education classrooms as much as possible. Finally, our high school has a PAES Lab (Practical Assessment Exploration System) that provides students in autism and life skills programs with hand-on occupational skill development opportunities. All other programs will continue their implementation work each year. The 2023-2024 school year will be the first year when all departments are working toward their identified goals. This focus on academic improvement will impact every student, and we are excited about the future of all of our programs.

# Sustainability



We continue to focus on evaluating opportunities to promote sustainability and reduce our environmental footprint. Last summer, we completed the replacement of HVAC units at each primary school, and this summer, we are replacing HVAC systems at the middle school, which helps to increase energy efficiency in each of these buildings. The Facilities Department has developed an internal Energy Committee to review

specific efficiency data. Additional funds have been set aside for exterior lighting and bulb replacement in order continue the conversion of lighting fixtures to LED. Our Sustainability Leadership Council and student contingent, making up the Six-School Sustainability Club, continued their work on recycling efforts and promoting the message of sustainability to their school staff and students.

#### District Debuts Three Electric School Buses

In a significant step toward increased sustainability, Student Transportation of America (STA) began transporting Pine-Richland students on new 2024 CE series buses in May. The electric buses average a range of 135 miles, and in optimal conditions, can reach 150 miles on one charge. In addition to the fuel savings, benefits of an electric school bus include the elimination of diesel fumes and minimal noise. They produce so little noise that an artificial humming noise was added for safety and will emit when the bus is driving at less than 20 miles per hour so that students can hear it approach.

Last spring, STA announced they had received a grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection Driving PA Forward-Truck and Bus Fleet Program to pay for the new buses. The Make Ready infrastructure was provided by Duquesne Light from their Community and Fleet Charging Program. The program includes a rebate that partially covers the cost of the charging stations.

# Development of the 2023-2027 Strategic Plan

The district actively engaged in the 2023-2027 strategic planning process throughout the past school year. Led by a 16-person steering committee composed of board members and district staff, the process included three community town hall meetings that had more than 400 parents, students, alumni, staff, community members and business owners in attendance. The 2023-2027 strategic plan focuses on teaching and learning, student progress and engagement, workforce development, finance and operations, pursuit of excellence and communications.

#### Belief Statement and Process Summary

The district is committed to its mission to focus on learning for every student every day. We believe in the importance and impact of a quality education and positive school culture on the development of young people. This belief serves as a compass and the strategic plan serves as the map. Current and past plans have been built with input from stakeholders. It is possible to monitor our progress and focus over the past decade by reviewing past plans and the products of that work. These products serve as a foundation for our planning process for 2023-2027.

#### Process and Timeline

Through an intense commitment of time and strategic prioritization, substantive progress was made in the development and completion of the 2023-2027 Strategic Plan. Public school board and joint governance board meetings were held for the purpose of discussion and planning over the past nine months. In addition, three Town Halls were held on October 12, November 29 and January 17 at Eden Hall Upper Elementary School. Each town hall date included afternoon and evening sessions, both in person and virtually, and each session was specifically designed to collect input and feedback from diverse perspectives. Well over 400 participants represented all stakeholder groups. A key concept expressed through this entire process was lineof-sight. Work products from each step of the process are archived on the district website. After months of review, the board unanimously approved the Strategic Plan, PDE Comprehensive Plan and other state-required reports at the June 12, 2023, public meeting.

#### Strategic Plan Structure and Format

Designed for the long-term planning horizon of 2023-2027, the Strategic Plan is organized in the following six categories: Teaching & Learning, Student Progress & Engagement, Workforce Development, Finance & Operations, Pursuit of Excellence and Communications. Each category contains two or more long-term goals that stretch across the four-year time frame. To accomplish each long-term goal, a series of short-term actions are noted in the columns and rows that show a progression of work over time. These actions reflect the high level focus of the plan. During implementation, each box is clarified through an action planning process. For additional context, a background section and rationale were added for each long-term goal. # Wexford and Richland Debut New Libraries

Both Wexford Elementary and Richland Library kicked off the 2022-2023 school year with renovated library spaces. Richland added brightly colored carpeting and furniture to fit an open and light theme. The previous Richland High School shelving units were replaced with shelving more appropriately sized for young students. The bulkhead was removed and ceilings replaced to create a brighter atmosphere, while new LED lighting reflects the district's commitment to sustainability. The Wexford renovation allows for interactive learning. Tables and chairs can be moved around for different types of learningindividual or group work, and new shelving allows for students to more easily find what they are interested in reading. New paint and carpet brighten the library space. The renovation was a collective effort with PROF and the Wexford PTO to engage students in collaborative inquiry and literacy with librarian Andrea Clarkson.

# District Presents Tenth Annual Academic Achievement & Growth Report



The mission of the Pine-Richland School District is to focus on learning for every student every day. The vision at PRSD emphasizes the fact that learning is

reflected in both achievement and growth. We believe that learning happens differently for different people, requiring flexibility and variation in the approach. Learning also requires effort and persistence, as well as the support of everyone.

Monitoring and measuring learning results within our district is paramount to our cycles of learning and the improvement of our educational approach, through curriculum, instruction and assessment efforts, as well as the differentiation and intervention necessary for learners of all abilities and varied backgrounds to succeed. Pine-Richland is a learning organization, in which continuous improvement is embraced and deeply ingrained in the culture. Our journey in the pursuit of excellence has been informed by the National Institute for Standards and Technology Baldrige Performance Excellence framework. Within the Baldrige Performance Excellence framework, "LeTCI" is used as an acronym to describe evaluation factors for reviewing results (i.e., Levels, Trends, Comparisons and Integration). We utilize those elements when gathering data for analysis to ensure appropriate benchmarking and the ability to assess performance levels and trends over time, with the ability to segment that data by relevant grade levels, disciplines and subgroups.

While data analysis is an ongoing process for us to drive improvements to our curriculum, instruction, and even the assessments themselves throughout the

school year, we pause each fall to create a reflective, aggregate profile of the outcomes for the prior school year within the Academic Achievement and Growth Report. Teams consistently leverage real-time formative data to drive instruction within the classroom level and leverage lag data from standardized assessments both at the classroom and building level for course recommendations and intervention mapping. Over time, these concepts of using both real time and lag data to ensure appropriate student learning opportunities to improve outcomes has been coined "Data for Action" within the Pine-Richland School District. We do not simply curate sets of data to admire statically; we view these sets of facts as criteria from which to launch measurable educational programming and hold ourselves accountable to successful outcomes.

This collaboratively-authored report includes the most densely detailed net results for the district, allowing individuals to quickly analyze the learning outcomes in the district at the highest level.

The aggregate, summative district standardized testing results, in addition to the ones we monitor throughout a given school year, provide us with direction as to the next areas of improvement we can target, as we prioritize our relative areas of strength and opportunity. Senior leaders, principals, Academic Leadership Council members and other teacher leaders own the analysis process together.

Data contained in this report is used as an input to the internal findings citations by the data subcommittee during our In-Depth Program Review Process when we study our K-12 programming within departments or support areas to prioritize recommended improvement actions for systematic implementation and integration with other aspects of our learning system. Additionally, it is used as an input to our Strategic Planning Process as we design impactful, high leverage long-term goals and short term strategy actions, particularly within the Teaching & Learning category.

Stakeholder surveys are conducted annually to assess satisfaction levels among students, parents and staff members. A portion of the survey questions focuses on elements of learning. Buildings review this data annually as they are setting goals for their collective focal areas. Our focal question continues to be "How do we focus on academic learning for every student every day?" The learning system at Pine-Richland School District is illustrated by the Model for Teaching and Learning image, allowing us to focus on Data for Action.

# Key Highlights of This Year's Report

- > A companion document for both the PSSA and Keystone standardized testing results has been published in recognition of the need to review historical performance on these assessments with a lens towards specific subgroups (e.g. special education, ethnicity, economic status, and gender) between the years of 2018-2022 given concerns about the impact of the pandemic on student learning outcomes.
- > Aggregate, summative district standardized testing results, in addition to the ones we monitor throughout a given school
- year (e.g. universal screening results), provide us with direction as to the next areas of improvement we can target as we prioritize our relative areas of strength and opportunity.









# Board Approves Budget for 2023-2024 with No Tax Increase


2023-2024 Budgeted Revenue




2023-2024 Budgeted Expenditures

The Pine-Richland School Board approved the general fund budget for the 2023-2024 school year with total expenditures of \$106,845,488 and total revenues of \$103,725,288 with utilization of fund balance for capital improvements in the amount of \$3,120,200. The board maintained the following tax rates for the fiscal year 2023-2024 with no increase:

- > Real Estate Tax rate of 19.5867 mills (no increase)
- Earned Income Tax of 0.5 percent
- Act 511 Per Capita Tax of \$5 for individuals age 18 and older
- Pennsylvania School Code Per Capita Tax of \$5 for individuals age 18 & older

#### **COST-SAVING MEASURES**

The district has addressed the financial climate and has looked at several alternative revenue sources and cost-saving measures for the past several years. Some of them included:

**Energy Curtailment Program Parking Fees** Advertisements Facility Rental Agreements **Rebates & Commissions** Student Activity Fees **Grants & Donations** 

During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the district terminated three swap transactions resulting in savings to the school district. The district will continue to monitor each debt instrument for additional refunding opportunities to achieve savings and lower interest costs, if possible.

### INDIVIDUAL TAXPAYER SAVINGS OPPORTUNITIES

- > The board approved the Homestead and Farmstead Exclusion Resolution for the upcoming tax year. The resolution provides for property tax reduction through a "homestead or farmstead exclusion," which is provided by the state gaming industry/casinos. Residents should have an application on file with Allegheny County indicating the house they live in is their homestead. They will also receive a reduction in assessed value for their school tax. Each approved homestead will receive a real estate tax reduction in the amount of \$217.35.
- In January 2023, the board approved a property tax rebate program for all qualifying senior citizens, widows and widowers for the 2022 calendar year. The application reflected a due date of June 30, 2023. If the filer meets the criteria, he or she could see anywhere from \$250 -\$650 in tax rebates.

### **BUDGET BALANCING ACT IMPACTED BY VARIABLES**

As you know, balancing the budget can be extremely difficult. Some of the variables that factor into the district's budget include:

Salaries & Wages – Personnel costs for administration, faculty and support staff represent 63.48% of total annual budgeted expenditures. These expenditures are established by collective bargaining agreements and compensation plans.

Employer Benefit Costs – The district's employer contribution rate for the Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS) will decrease to 34% of salary costs from 35.26% in 2022-2023. That translates to about \$48,973 (or \$7,867 in increased costs to the district after receiving state funding for retirement contributions) in the 2023-2024 budget. This rate is set by the PSERS Board of Trustees and mandated by state legislation.

**Premium Costs** – Allegheny County Schools Health Insurance Consortium medical premium costs will increase by 14% for covered employees. Dental and vision insurance premiums will increase by 3%. Overall group health insurance expenditures for the District are budgeted to increase by \$1,078,045.

**Tuition Expenditures** – The district is required by law to pay tuition costs, which are projected at \$1,107,421 for 2023-2024, for students who reside in Pine-Richland to attend cyber/charter schools. None of these costs are reimbursed by the state. For more information on the budget, visit pinerichland.org/budget.

> Since 2013, PROF has awarded nearly \$364,000 in grant funds to Pine-Richland staff. Funding priority projects for student enrichment is a key component of our mission. This year, PROF awarded the largest grant fund to date - \$28,000 to develop the Eden Hall Discovery Center and outdoor classroom in partnership with the Eden Hall PTO and the district. Other impactful grants included a laser engraver, library enrichment materials and a Conversation Corner at PRMS: books and a sustainable library project at Hance Elementary; and a World War II Soldier Box project at PRHS.

- > In that time, PROF partnered with community organizations and businesses to award \$384,500 in cash scholarships to graduating seniors. PROF's scholarship sponsors provide game-changing funds to students while also recognizing their outstanding achievements during their time at Pine-Richland. This year's scholarship recipients were awarded a total of **\$45,000**, including two PROF-trustee sponsored scholarships totaling \$5,000.



#### Attendance

The board requires that school age students enrolled in district schools attend school regularly, in accordance with state laws. The educational program offered by the district is predicated upon the presence of the student and requires continuity of instruction and classroom participation in order for students to achieve academic standards and consistent educational progress. #### Discipline Code

The purpose of the PRSD Discipline Code is to present standard behavioral expectations based on school board policy for all students in the district. Parents are encouraged to become familiar with the PRSD Discipline Code and to review these documents with their children. Parents, guardians, and students are also referred to Board Policy 218 of the board policy manual for additional information regarding the discipline code, student conduct, and consequences of inappropriate or proscribed behaviors and conduct. In the event of any conflict between the terms of the discipline code and any board policy, the applicable board policy will control and take precedence. #### Public Outreach & Awareness System (Child Find)

PRSD uses a public outreach awareness system to locate and identify children thought to be eligible for special education within the school district's jurisdiction. The district provides details of where to find out more information about the district's special education and early intervention programs through announcements on PR-TV (broadcasted throughout the community), in the annual report (distributed to residents, township buildings, and libraries) and via electronic communications (e-notices and website).

#### Discrimination and Harassment

The board declares it to be the policy of this district to provide an equal opportunity for all students to achieve their maximum potential through the programs and activities offered in the schools without discrimination on the basis of race, color, age, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender or gender identity, ancestry, national origin, marital status, pregnancy or handicap/disability.

The district shall provide to all students, without discrimination, course offerings, counseling, assistance, employment, athletics, and extracurricular activities. The equitable distribution of district

resources is one means the district shall use to ensure all students receive a quality education. The district shall make reasonable accommodations for identified physical and mental impairments that constitute handicaps and disabilities, consistent with the requirements of federal and state laws and regulations.

Discrimination is inconsistent with the rights of students and the educational and programmatic goals of the district and is prohibited at or, in the course of, district-sponsored programs or activities, including transportation to or from school or school-sponsored

The board also declares it to be the policy of this district to comply with federal law and regulations under Title IX prohibiting sexual harassment, which is a form of unlawful discrimination on the basis of sex. Such discrimination shall be referred to throughout this policy as Title IX sexual harassment. Inquiries regarding the application of Title IX to the district may be referred to the Title IX Coordinator, to the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights of the U.S. Department of Education, or both.

Annual notices are required for the PRSD website and related publications. Violations of this policy, including acts of retaliation as described in this policy, or knowingly providing false information, may result in disciplinary consequences under applicable Board policy and procedures.

Confidentiality of all parties, witnesses, the allegations, the filing of a report, and the investigation related to any form of discrimination or retaliation, including Title IX sexual harassment, shall be handled in accordance with applicable law, regulations, Policy 103 and related administrative regulations, and the district's legal and investigative obligations.

#### **Complaint & Investigative Processes**

The school board encourages students and parents/ guardians who believe they have been subjected to discrimination or harassment to promptly report such incidents to designated employees in accordance with PR School Board Policy 103: Nondiscrimination/Title IX Sexual Harassment Affecting Students and 103.1: Nondiscrimination - Qualified Students with Disabilities, which can be found on the PR Policy Manual, which is linked to the district's website. Complaints of discrimination or harassment shall be investigated promptly, and corrective action will be taken for substantiated allegations. Confidentiality of all parties shall be maintained, consistent with the district's legal and investigative obligations.

Students and third parties who believe they or others have been subject to discrimination, Title IX sexual harassment, and/or retaliation for reporting of such should promptly report such incidents to the building principal, even if some elements of the related incident took place or originated away from school grounds, school activities or school conveyances. A person who is not an intended victim or target of discrimination, but who is adversely affected by the offensive conduct, may also file a report of discrimination

The building principal shall promptly notify the Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator of all reports of discrimination, Title IX sexual harassment or retaliation. The Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator shall promptly contact the complainant regarding the report to gather additional information as necessary and to discuss the availability of supportive measures. The Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator shall consider the complainant's wishes with respect to supportive measures.

#### **Surveillance Cameras & Audio Recordings**

Under School Board Policy 817 (Use of Video Surveillance Cameras), the district is permitted to use video surveillance in any school building, on school district property, or on any transportation vehicle being used by the district. The district does monitor district buildings, property, and transportation vehicles with surveillance cameras and individuals using any such facilities should expect that such surveillance may occur. In addition, the use of audio recordings is permitted on school district transportation vehicles (Policy #810.2). The district began recording audio on all equipped buses beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.

In 2018, the school board approved a revised Policy #808 Food Services as well as an administrative regulation, which addresses student meal balances and unpaid meal charge procedures.

Pine-Richland School District recognizes that student wellness and proper nutrition are related to students' physical well being, growth, development, and readiness to learn. The board is committed to

providing a school environment that promotes student wellness, proper nutrition, nutrition education and promotion, and regular physical activity as part of the total learning experience. The board recognizes the need for insurance coverage for unforeseen accidents that may occur to students in the course of attendance at school or participation in the athletic and extracurricular programs of the schools. The board shall provide parents/guardians the opportunity to purchase insurance coverage, at no cost to the board, for injury resulting from accidents sustained by students in school programs, school activities, and while traveling between home and school other than on a school bus. The premium will be paid by the parents/guardians. The board shall maintain insurance coverage by a qualified insurer over and above the first responsibility of family coverage at no cost to the student for injury resulting from accidents sustained while participating in an interscholastic sports program, the cheerleader program, and band program. #### Student Fundraising

Fundraising activities must comply with School Board Policy 229 (Student Fundraising) and must be requested in writing to the building principal or director of athletics on a district-approved form. #### Student Assistance Program (Policy 236)

The district reinforces the connection between emotional well-being and student success through a continuum of the school and community mental health supports. The Student Assistance Programs and School-Based Mental Health Services are available in all PR schools, K-12. Specifically, all staff members (administrators, teachers, counselors, nurses, coaches, bus drivers, custodial staff, food service personnel) are trained annually on risk factors and warning signs of suicide and appropriate responsible reporting procedures (Observe, Listen, Refer). The district and school suicide prevention coordinators continue to provide age-appropriate curriculum for students K-12 in the development of resiliency, understanding good emotional and physical health, protective factors, healthy coping and problem-solving skills, responsible reporting, and identifying trusted adults at school and in the home environments. Anyone can refer a student to SAP when they are concerned about someone's behavior. Students can go directly to the SAP team to ask for help. The SAP team contacts the parent for permission to proceed with the SAP process. Visit pinerichland.org/sap for more information.

#### Suicide Awareness, Prevention, and Response (Policy 819)

The board is committed to protecting the health, safety, and welfare of its students and the school community. Policy 819 supports the provision of a comprehensive district program designed to promote behavioral health and prevent suicide. The Board directs the district to provide education on youth suicide awareness and prevention; to establish methods of prevention, intervention, and response to a suicide attempt or suicide death; and to promote access to suicide awareness and prevention resources.
