
MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

- US News & World Report ranked Pine-Richland High School seventh in Allegheny County and 21st in the state in its "Top High School" rankings for 2019. In addition, the report ranks PRHS at 794 out of 17,245 public schools across the U.S. Criteria used include state math and reading scores, graduation rates, and the degree to which schools prepare students for college-level work using advanced placement exam data as a benchmark.
- The Pittsburgh Business Times ranked Pine-Richland School District eighth out of 105 districts in the region in its 2019 list of rankings by examining scores from the Pennsylvania System of School Assessments and Keystone exams.
- The Pennsylvania Department of Education's Division of Federal Programs honored Hance Elementary School for being named a Title I Distinguished School for 2018-2019 because it ranked in the top five percent of Title I Schools in Pennsylvania based on aggregate math and English language arts scores on the Pennsylvania System of School Assessments.
- Eden Hall Upper Elementary School was named a U.S. Department of Education Green Ribbon School, one of only three named in PA in 2019. This distinction acknowledged EH's commitment to sustainable practices and leadership in facilities, health, and environmental education. Wexford Elementary School earned the distinction in 2018.
- Hance Elementary School was named to the 2019 Pennsylvania Healthy Schools Honor **Roll**. Schools named to the honor roll are recognized for taking strides to create a green and healthy learning environment for their school and community.
- Eden Hall Upper Elementary School received the SupportMusic Merit Award from the National Association of Music Merchants Foundation for its commitment to music education and the arts by providing innovative learning opportunities for a well-rounded education.

STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS 2019-2023

Systematic & Comprehensive Process

After a systematic and comprehensive process, the PRSD Strategic Plan for 2019-2023 is complete. Beginning with a series of gallery walks with 25 members of the organization and school board last summer. The district had over 400 stakeholders participate in a series of town hall meetings and/or electronic surveys in the design process. An iterative process was used to develop and refine the plan. Given the degree that our current plan drives action, it was used as the foundation for this important work. A data and information placemat was used to ensure that future work was informed by our current performance results and input from the annual stakeholder surveys of students, parents, and staff. The existing mission, vision, and values were affirmed for the next four years. Five categories serve as the framework for the plan (See "books" below in Pursuit of Excellence category.). Within each category, there is a set of four-year long-



term goals. Each long-term goal is then achieved through an intentional sequence of one-year action items. The scope of the plan was specifically evaluated to ensure depth and quality of implementation. In addition, potential measures and/or expected results were identified for each long-term goal. These measures will eventually become part of a comprehensive scorecard. Lastly, the district was able to also complete the required elements of the Pennsylvania Department of Education's Comprehensive Plan. The PRSD Strategic Plan and PDE Comprehensive Plan were posted for public review and then approved by the board on June 3, 2019.

PR Graduate Portrait

In the Student Progress & Engagement category, one of the long-term goals is focused on the overall development of our students. This concept has become known as the "PR Graduate Portrait" and reflects four developmental dimensions (i.e., Knowledge; Skills; Health & Wellness; and Personal Qualities & Characteristics). Over the course of the second semester, a specific set of concepts were identified in each dimension. For example, Skills are defined as organizational, time management, communication (oral/ written), research, teamwork, and more. The "PR Graduate Portrait" will serve as a key area of focus as we kick-off the 2019-2020 school year and begin to implement our four-year strategic plan. More detailed information will be shared in the fall.

Pursuit of Excellence

The final category of our strategic plan is titled, "Pursuit of Excellence." There are several noteworthy elements in this category. First, each building has developed a specific longterm goal based on building needs, which are integrated within the district plan. This helps increase the visibility of those building-based goals for the entire community and demonstrates alignment to the larger plan. Next, the Pine-Richland School Board serves as a role model for continuous improvement by identifying a long-term goal for 2019-2023 and short-term actions that support that goal. Most significantly, the district is also pursuing excellence through the Mid-Atlantic Alliance for Performance Excellence and Baldrige Performance Excellence program. By developing an application that responds to



a comprehensive set of criteria, the district will receive a feedback report that will help identify strengths and opportunities for improvement. Finally, this category includes the finalization of a set of comprehensive measures to help the district monitor results. The U.S. Department of Education named Eden Hall Upper Elementary School a 2019 U.S. Department of Education Green Ribbon Schools award honoree on May 23, 2019, for providing students an environment rich in learning and opportunities to regularly participate in activities that are focused on engaging in a healthy and sustainable environment.

Sustainable features at the school include:

- Natural lighting through skylights
- Plants & trees on school grounds native to Pennsylvania
- No-mow native grasses on the grounds
- Heat-reclaiming devices for efficiency
- Room sensors to monitor & control carbon dioxide, lighting, & heat

- Wood paneling to keep noise down
- A maker roof to reflect heat

Eden Hall's wellness committee focuses on identifying and implementing initiatives that benefit the overall health and well-being of students and staff. SCHOOLS RECEIVE ACCREDITATION FROM STATE & REGIONAL PROGRAMS

PRMS Redesignated as Part of Schools to Watch Program

Pine-Richland Middle School has been redesignated, along with DuBois Area Middle School, as Pennsylvania Don Eichhorn Schools: "Schools to Watch" (PA STW) for a fourth time in 12 years as part of a recognition program developed by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform.

The school hosted a celebratory assembly to present the official "Schools to Watch" award for the school on May 21, 2019, at Pine-Richland Middle School. State Representative Mr. Mike Turzai was in attendance, along with the STW team members Bruce Vosburgh, Paul Meck, George Pry, and Steve Swogger.

In partnership with the Pennsylvania Association for Middle-Level Education, Duguesne University, and Edinboro University, the Schools to Watch selection process is based on a written application that requires schools to show how they met criteria developed by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle Grades Reform. Schools that meet the criteria are visited by state teams that observe classrooms, interview administrators, teachers, students, and parents, and look at achievement data, suspension rates, quality of lessons, and student work. Schools are recognized for a three-year period, and at the end of three years, they must demonstrate progress on specific goals in order to be redesignated. "Schools to Watch" requires schools to not just identify strengths, but to also focus on areas for continuous improvement, thus the three-year redesignation.

"We are proud of the redesignation through the Schools to Watch program," said Superintendent Brian Miller, Ed.D. "It gives us an opportunity to hold up a program against a set of criteria. STW will be embedded in the district strategic plan for 2019 - 2023 for our middle school to reflect the dynamic nature of continuous improvement."

The middle school concept focuses on a team approach for learning and supporting students.

"The daily efforts of our middle school students and staff exemplify a team of people achieving and growing together," said Assistant Superintendent Michael Pasquinelli, Ed.D. Our next set of STW stretch goals will continue this focus on teamwork and collaboration."

The program was led by Principal David Kristofic and Assistant Principal Jacob Minsinger with the support of teachers Sheri Murslack and Jennifer Bubb, and Counselor Jennifer Mullaugh. PR Parent Support Association President Stephanie Drenning and eighth-graders Jaimee Joshi, Sreyashi Mondal, Noah Moskala, and John Varghese, and seventh-graders Michael Lattari and Benjamin Lyons made presentations.

PRMS was recognized nationally in Washington, DC, at the National Forum's National Schools to Watch Conference on June 27-29, 2019.

"We are truly proud to earn the fourth honor in the Don Eichhorn Schools to Watch awards program," said Principal David Kristofic, Ed.D. "Our students, staff and parents make this school the place to be."

PRHS Receives Accreditation through Middle States Association

Richland Elementary School opened a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts & Mathematics) lab.

Richland's maker space offers students hands-on opportunities to explore science, technology, engineering, the arts, and mathematics.

"The possibilities are endless," said first-grade teacher Bonnie Allessi. "It's open-ended learning, lots of opportunities for problemsolving, along with integrating the arts and technology with a little bit more freedom. They are playing, but they're learning at the same time."

The lab was put in place through a Pine-Richland Opportunities Fund grant valued at \$13,885 to get things off the ground.

The space offers students a chance to experiment with 3D printing, puppetry, crafting, early coding and more.

Each class schedules a half-hour every week to enjoy time in the space, and how they use it is up to each individual teacher. Teachers can also bring their classes in for indoor recess during inclement weather.

The STEAM Lab committee was made up of teachers Lauren Aiello, Bonnie Allessi, Brittany Boss, Tracy Hanna, Paula Ferris, Becky Fickes, Kathy Giegel, Erica Savannah, custodian Warren Ringeisen, and Dr. Gene Nicastro, principal.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT & GROWTH REPORT

District Presents Sixth Annual Academic Achievement & Growth Report

The vision at Pine-Richland emphasizes that learning is reflected in both achievement and growth. This philosophy is captured in the sixth Annual Pine-Richland Academic Achievement and Growth Report, which has been refined each year to provide descriptive statistics and analyses across a series of standardized assessments. As a district, we are focusing on process and results.

The district is leveraging the support of its members of the Academic Leadership Council (ALC) to lead data analysis sessions with departmental and grade level teams of teachers and to identify and prioritize strengths, opportunities, action steps, and recommendations. Additionally, the district has included information about the benchmark assessments utilized K-12, including STAR 360 (Grades K-6) and Classroom Diagnostic Tests (Grades 7-12) which help to measure student growth and performance throughout the year. As a disclaimer to all who review this report, it is important to note the narrow focus on standardized achievement test results (i.e., Pennsylvania System of School Assessments (PSSAs), Keystone Exams, College Board SAT, ACT, and Advanced Placement (AP) Testing). These are important and high stakes assessments. However, we also know that measures of school effectiveness and learning are far more comprehensive than the information in this report. Those measures include a holistic look at our schools and students, such as classroombased assessments, school climate, participation in extra- and co-curricular activities, graduation rates, attendance, discipline, post-secondary readiness, social-emotional development, wellness, and more. The report highlighted the following key findings:

- Providing an introduction to the Future Ready PA Index
- Emphasizing PSSA achievement levels at or above the top decile in 2018 over 2017 in almost all cases
- Using benchmarking tools to drive instructional interventions down to the student level
- Collaborating with the ALC & teachers during data analysis & action planning sessions

The report also identifies areas of focus, which include:

- Continued examination and revisions of curriculum, assessment, and instruction at all grade levels
- Integration of regular, collaborative data analysis to replicate best practices among teachers
- Ensure alignment & effectiveness of Multi-Tier Systems of Support interventions to meet students' unique needs
- Establish a systematic approach & consistent implementation of curricular resources & instructional strategies

PA VALUE-ADDED ASSESSMENT SYSTEM PROVIDES **GROWTH DATA**

The Pennsylvania Value-Added Assessment System (PVAAS) is a statistical analysis of Pennsylvania state assessment data, which provides districts and schools with growth data to add to achievement data. This analysis provides educators with valuable information to ensure they are meeting the academic needs of groups of students. Educators are using PVAAS (growth data) to make datainformed instructional decisions to ensure the academic growth and achievement of all students.

ACHIEVEMENT & GROWTH DATA ARE DIFFERENT

 Achievement data measures a student's performance at one single point in time, is highly correlated with a student's demographics, compares student performance to state standards, and is critical to a student's post-secondary opportunities.

• Growth data measures a student's growth across time (i.e., across years), with little to no relationship with student demographics, compares performance of a student group to its own prior performance, is critical to ensuring future academic success, and allows districts to have a more comprehensive picture of their own effectiveness in raising student performance.

PA SCHOOL PERFORMANCE PROFILE PROVIDES **SNAPSHOT OF STRENGTHS & OPPORTUNITIES**

In addition to the Pine-Richland Academic Report, parents can view the Pennsylvania School Performance Profile, which is a web-based resource for districts to communicate performance results to various constituencies and assist districts in aligning and focusing resources for continuous improvement. Review PSSAs & Keystone Information

The Pennsylvania System of School Assessments (PSSAs) test students' skills in mathematics and English Language Arts in grades three through eight and in science in grades four and eight. The following performance levels are used: Advanced (Superior Academic Performance), Proficient (Satisfactory Academic Performance), Basic (Marginal Academic Performance), and Below Basic (Inadequate Academic Performance).

The Keystone Exams are end-of-course assessments designed to assess proficiency in the following subject areas:

- Algebra I (PR Grades 7-10)
- Biology (PR Grades 9-10)
- Literature (PR Grades 9).

WHAT ARE QUINTILES?

Quintiles are subsets of students. Students are placed in quintiles based on their performance relative to all students in the state. For example, the first quintile represents the growth made by students scoring in the lowest 20 percent. The fifth quintile represents the growth made by the highest scoring 20 percent of students.

Pine-Richland Outperforms State & Top Decile Schools Overall on Assessments

Some key findings highlighted in the 2018 Academic Achievement & Growth Report include:

- Pine-Richland students outperformed the state average at all levels of the PSSA Math & ELA assessments & the top decile benchmark for combined advanced/proficient performance (i.e., top 10% of schools in Pennsylvania) at all grade levels in math & ELA except for fourth-grade math.
- The percent of students at the advanced/proficient levels increased or remained stable across all grade levels on the math PSSAs & increased on the ELA PSSAs for grades five, seven and eight when comparing 2015, 2016, 2017, & 2018 grade level achievement.
- The Pennsylvania Three-Year Value-Added Report indicates varying levels of evidence that students met the Standard for PA Academic Growth in math for 2016 through 2018. The district significantly exceeded the standard for PA Academic Growth in math for grades five & six; demonstrated evidence that grade eight met the standard for PA Academic Growth; reflected moderate evidence that grade seven did not meet the standard for PA Academic Growth; & did not meet the standard for PA Academic Growth in grade four.
- Grades four & eight in math had significant evidence of no growth, although grades five, six, & seven met or exceeded the standard for growth for 2018.
- The 2018 Pennsylvania Value-Added Report indicates significant evidence that students did not meet the Standard for PA Academic Growth in ELA for grades four & eight. Conversely, the 2018 Value-Added Report reflects significant evidence students exceeded the Standard for PA Academic Growth in ELA for grades five, six, &

- seven & grade six showing moderate evidence students exceeded the standard for PA Academic Growth.
- Fourth grade PR students outperformed the top decile benchmark on the Science PSSAs & the state average when comparing the percent of students scoring in the combined proficient & advanced category.
- PR students with an IEP in fourth grade out performed the overall performance of all Pennsylvania students both without & with IEPs in the combined advanced/proficient category in science.
- The analysis of student performance through the PA ELA, Math, & Science Assessment Anchors helps PR understand areas of relative strength and opportunities for improvement. Those areas along with information regarding quintiles are outlined in great detail and can be viewed at www.pinerichland.org/academicreport.
- A higher percentage of all PR test-takers In 2018 scored advanced/ proficient on the Keystone Algebra 1 & Literature exams in comparison to test-takers statewide, who scored advanced/ proficient. Of note, this is more than double the percentage of PR students scored at the advanced level in comparison to statewide on Algebra I and Literature.
- The 2018 District Value-Added PVAAS data indicates significant evidence that the district exceeded the standard for PA Academic Growth on the Keystone Algebra 1 & Literature exam, & moderate evidence students did not meet the growth standard on biology. The three-year average value-added measure shows evidence the district met the growth standard.

District Focuses on Next Steps & Opportunities for Success

The district outlines detailed steps for continued opportunities for success. Some include the following:


- Revisiting Keystone, PSSA, and PVAAS data analysis process, results, findings, and next steps with grade level and vertical teams for PSSAs & Keystones.
- Continue refining implementation of compacted/extended & current math pathways and monitor alignment with PA Core in Math, particularly in Grades K-5 where new resources were just integrated in 2018-2019 & in grades six through eight where resources were embedded in 2017-2018.
- Using STAR 360 math as a predictor of student performance on the PSSA & ensuring alignment & integration with the Multi-Tier System of Supports (MTSS) resources & process.
- Refining MTSS processes for math to determine next steps for a systematic approach to interventions for enrichment and/or remediation.
- Continue professional development and support for co-teaching and MTSS models & new curricular resources, instructional & assessment strategies.

The dashboard elements are designed to emphasize student growth measures focusing on all learners, English Language (EL) acquisition among EL students, career awareness instruction beginning at the elementary level, indicators of student success after graduation, student access to course offerings such as AP, International Baccalaureate (IB), college credit, and Career Technical Education programs of study. 






FROM THE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Basketball










Gymnastics









High/Middle School: From 7:20 a.m. to 7:45 a.m.


Eden Hall Upper: From: 8:30 a.m. to 8:35 a.m.

District Kicks Off Rams Way Initiative



The Pine-Richland School District Department of Student Services and Special Education is launching an initiative to deploy a district-wide system of positive behavioral supports and interventions. The purpose is to provide an intentional and preventative approach to improve upon a positive school climate. Procedural and behavioral expectations will be intentionally communicated and taught at appropriate developmental-levels from grades K through 12. The Rams Way will focus on developing and improving positive behaviors through the use of common, developmentallyappropriate language and expectations.

"The RAMS Way" initiative spells out the acronym for a common set of behavioral expectations, which is being shared across the district that includes:

R-espectful / A-ccountable / M-otivated / S-afe

Students will be learning what it means to be Respectful, Accountable, Motivated, and Safe in various areas of each school building, including the cafeteria, hallways, bathrooms, attendance and the bus. The expectations will be developmentally modified to fit each grade span. The district has been training building-level teams on roles and responsibilities. Team members are developing behavioral matrices and lesson plans specific to each building and individual environment (e.g., hallways, cafeterias, playgrounds, bathrooms, attendance and buses) in advance of the 2019 -2020 districtwide kick-off. All schools will highlight individual incentive programs to acknowledge and reward positive behavior. Building-specific information will be shared by principals over the summer months and throughout the 2019-2020 school year.

BUDGET & BOARD UPDATE

Board Approves Budget for 2019-2020 with No Tax Increase

The Pine-Richland School Board approved the general fund budget for the 2019-2020 school year with total expenditures of \$91,457,895 and total revenues of \$91,457,895 with no utilization of assigned fund balance. The board maintained the following tax rates for the fiscal year 2019-2020 with no increase:


- Real Estate Tax rate of 19.5867 mills (no increase)
- Earned Income Tax of 0.5 percent
- Act 511 Per Capita Tax of \$5 for individuals age 18 and older
- Pennsylvania School Code Per Capita Tax of \$5 for individuals age 18 & older



The district has addressed the financial climate and has looked at several alternative revenue sources and cost-saving measures for the past several years. Some of them have included:

The district will continue to monitor each debt instrument for refunding opportunities to achieve savings and lower interest costs, if possible.


- The board approved the Homestead and Farmstead Exclusion Resolution for the upcoming tax year. The resolution provides for property tax reduction through a "homestead or farmstead exclusion," which is provided by the state gaming industry/casinos. Residents should have an application on file with Allegheny County indicating the house they live in is their homestead. They will also receive a reduction in assessed value for their school tax. Each approved homestead will receive a real estate tax reduction amount of \$179.53.
- In January 2019, the board approved a property tax rebate program for qualifying senior citizens, widows, and widowers for the 2018 calendar year. The application reflected a due date of June 30, 2019. If the filer meets the criteria, he or she could see anywhere from \$250-\$650

2019-2020 Budgeted Revenue Federal Sources—\$705,964 Local Sources — \$71,258,521


2019-2020 Budgeted Expenditures

BUDGET BALANCING ACT IMPACTED BY VARIABLES

As you know, balancing the budget can be extremely difficult. Some of the variables that factor into the district's budget include:

Salaries & Wages - Personnel costs for administration, faculty, and support staff represent 63.83 percent of the total annual budgeted expenditures. These expenditures are established by collective bargaining agreements and compensation plans.

Employer Benefit Costs – The district's employer contribution rate for the Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS) will increase to 34.29 percent of the salary cost from 33.43 percent in 2018-2019 that translates to about \$777,257 (or approximately \$345,097 in increased costs to the district after receiving state funding for retirement contributions) in the 2019-2020 budget. This rate is set by the PSERS Board of Trustees and mandated by state legislation.

Premium Costs – Allegheny County Schools Health Insurance Consortium premium costs will increase by 1.9 percent for Preferred Provider Organization (PPO) plans and Exclusive Provider Organization (EPO) plans for covered employees. Overall, group health insurance expenditures are expected to increase this year by \$48,895.

Tuition Expenditures – The district is required by law to pay tuition costs, which are projected at \$929,571 for 2019-2020, for students who reside in Pine-Richland to attend cyber/charter schools. None of these costs are reimbursed by the state. For more information on the budget, visit www.pinerichland.org/budget.

- Mr. Greg DiTullio as a representative for the Pine Township Parks & Recreation Board
- Mrs. Christine Misback as a representative for the Pine-Richland Opportunities Fund
- Mr. Peter Lyons as a Food Service Advisory & Wellness Committee Representative
- Mrs. Dana Kirk, director of financial and operational services, as a delegate to the Allegheny North Tax Collection Committee with Mr. Marc Casciani serving as an alternate

In addition, Mr. Lyons was re-elected to the Allegheny Intermediate Unit Board of Directors. The Allegheny Intermediate Unit Board of Directors is comprised of 13 elected members representing member school districts.

During the 2018-2019 school year, Dr. Matthew Mehalik and Mr. Peter Lyons led the board in a discussion about board goals and strategic planning.


