Leadership Message

Dear Friends,

Students are back! We selected this theme for our Annual Report because we are so happy the Allentown School District saw most students and teachers back in the classroom while continuing to offer a virtual option in 2021-2022. The Foundation resumed our traditional programming, and we were thrilled to welcome over 200 guests in-person to our High Notes Gala and Video Matinee in March. Here are a few highlights from the year:



HELPING YOU HELP STUDENTS

- 45 of you bravely donned masks and returned to our kindergarten and first grade classrooms as **Literacy Volunteers** in the fall, and by spring we had 60 active volunteers.
- Allentown students started the school year better prepared thanks to your in-kind donations of school supplies and personal hygiene products that exceeded gifts from prior years; and middle and high school students got to use your donated science laboratory equipment and a scientific printer. Thank you for thinking of us for these items!
- Several of you reached out to us to launch **conduit fundraising efforts** that improved the weight rooms at Louis E. Dieruff and William Allen High Schools, and launched an effort to design and build the Donald R. Marushak Outdoor Education Center at Dieruff High School.
- Two individuals worked with us to create the ASDF's first **program endowments**: Reading is Rewarding will recognize and reward students who improve the most in reading every marking period at Raub Middle School; and the Mrs. Finizzi Teacher Innovation Grant for English Literature or Journalism. These endowed programs will be funded every year.
- This year you created four scholarships for graduating seniors in addition to all of you who continue to fund awards you established in past years. You really are helping Allentown students reach their academic agals!

STUDENT ENGAGEMENT HIGHLIGHTS

- ASDF was able to connect with and serve students in 13 Elementary, 4 Middle, 3 High Schools plus Newcomer-K6
- 282 student scientists participated in the District's Science Fair which also featured hands-on activities for the 882 elementary and secondary school visitors.
- Middle School Latin Dancers completed 8 weeks of lessons and dazzled an audience of over 150 family, friends, and judges. Harrison-Morton won overall, South Mountain placed 2nd, Raub won best salsa, and Trexler, best merengue!
- 880 elementary students experienced an Artist Residency in oil pastels or paper and book arts.

In June, four new members were elected to the ASDF Board of Directors, and the board welcomed its first cohort of Emeritus Board Directors. Mike Bruckner, Joshua P. Dodd, and Allyn-Jane Marks completed their terms of service to the board. We thank each of these volunteer leaders for their contributions to the Foundation over many years.

I also want to thank each of you who make the work of this Foundation possible through your gifts and grants, your time, and your talents. We have a strong community of ASD supporters in Allentown, and you do make a difference in the lives of the students.

Over the past year and a half, I've had the pleasure of talking to many people who support Allentown School District (ASD) students and teachers through ASD Foundation initiatives. Those of you who are alumni often talk about the fantastic teachers and coaches you had and programs that shaped your life. I've learned about the experimental Opportunity Program that fostered creativity, problem solving, teamwork, writing and critical thinking. You've shared memories of exciting field trips, seeing Shakespeare on stage, and learning to type or speak another language at an early age. All of this becomes possible through generous financial support from the community.

The Allentown School District Foundation (ASDF) is a 501(c)3 not-for-profit corporation committed to providing transformative experiences for the District's 16,311 (as of 10/3/22) students. Since 2009, the Foundation has raised more than \$8.1 million dollars from generous donors like you. 
Students are engaged!

Literacy


Students are readers!



Reading is a lifelong activity that adds to one's quality of life and is an essential life and work skill. **Reading is Rewarding** provides incentives for middle school students to improve their reading. This new endowed program will recognize and reward the student at each grade level who makes the most progress in reading and comprehension during each of the four marking periods. Funded by a gift from The Rev. Maria Tjeltveit, it is implemented at Raub Middle School. Students who make the most progress receive a book that they select!

The ASD Foundation started its Literacy Volunteer Program in 2017 upon learning that only 30% of ASD third graders were proficient on state reading assessments. Students typically learn to read from kindergarten through third grade, and then they read to learn. If a student can't read well by fourth grade, their chance for future success is jeopardized.

Over the past five years, the Foundation has recruited, trained and placed more than 150 literacy volunteers in ASD's kindergarten and first grade classrooms with the help of school district administrators and reading specialists. Volunteers spend at least one hour per week assisting students with early literacy activities as directed by their classroom teachers. The goal of the Literacy Volunteer Program is to empower ASD students with literacy skills for life.

We thank everyone who has volunteered their time in this program, and we welcome new recruits throughout the school year. EITC Partners

Students are researchers!

Our 2021-2022 EITC partners understand the importance of having high quality arts, music, STEM, literacy, and civic education programming in the schools. This year, 99.97% of 2nd grade and Newcomer Academy students reported that their art residency made them feel happy, calm, and/or proud which is great for the students and helps to create a positive school culture. The Pennsylvania Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) allows eligible companies and individuals to contribute up to \$750,000 per year to an Educational Improvement Organization such as the ASDF. Our valued partners (with logos below) contributed a total of \$76,750 which helps pay for EITC approved programs including art and music programs with professional artists, performing arts such as the Latin Dance Competition, literacy, civic education, and the Science Fair.

Scholarships

Senior Scholarships

The following 52 graduating students received 70 scholarships through the ASDF, all funded through generous donor gifts. Endowed scholarships (in blue) are those in which the gift is invested, and a portion of its income is awarded annually (2022 distribution rate: 4.4%). The principal for endowed scholarships must be at least \$10,000 and cannot be expended so that the scholarship can be awarded in perpetuity.

The funds are managed by a professional fund manager and supervised by the ASDF Investment Committee. Expendable scholarships (in black) are those in which the gift or a portion determined by the donor is awarded annually. A total of \$63,365 was awarded to 2022 graduates, while alumni from the classes of 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021 continued to receive their Roland & Louise Neuweiler Wotring awards bringing the total scholarships this year to \$117,365.

The Senior Scholarship program was founded in 2013. Individuals, groups, and alumni classes interested in contributing to a scholarship or creating a new award are invited to contact the Foundation. New scholarships were created this year with combined contributions of \$67,000.

The **Margaret and Scott Koch Textbook** Scholarship will be awarded to a senior who has made a significant contribution to WAHS Athletics, both on and off the field.

The **James P. Musselman** Endowed Scholarship was created by Mrs. Bertie Musselman in memory of her husband, a beloved art teacher at William Allen High School. It will be awarded annually beginning in 2023 to a student pursuing a degree in art.

In memory of **Thomas "Thunder Tom" Makhoul**, this award will be given to one student from William Allen and one from Dieruff High School who exemplifies what he stood for – goodness, light, and living life to the fullest; and his love for WAHS, his cousins, watching movies, and riding his bikes.

The **PREVAIL Scholarship** was created by Karen and Mike Houser to assist a student who prevailed over significant obstacles to achieve academic success. The recipient will receive \$2500 a year for four years. This award will be given for five years.

Contributions were given this year to establish a scholarship in memory of **Mr. Kurt Zwikl**, past president of the ASD Foundation, a former PA Congressman, and community leader. An effort is being made to raise additional funds to create this as an endowed scholarship when the balance reaches \$10,000.

Planning for the High Notes Gala prior to widespread Covid vaccinations required creativity to design an inperson event with social distancing. To do so, we reimagined the Gala format to a strolling reception with small group student performances. We created a professional video of the high school musicians, dancers, actors and poets to further showcase the performing arts at Sunday's Video Matinee. A High Notes Art Gallery on Sunday gave visibility to 2D and 3D art students. Donors, friends, sponsors and advertisers helped the ASDF raise over \$76,000 via its 12th Annual HIGH NOTES Gala. The student performance video and a new ASDF Who We Are and What We Do video are available on the ASDF website.

The traditional New York City bus trip to see a Broadway show was once again postponed. We continue to hold funds that are donated by Broadway Sponsors for a future trip. Operations for programming through the rest of the year are supported by remaining proceeds.

Teacher Innovation Grants


Teacher Innovation Grants (TIG) have offered educators the means to try something new giving ASD students enriched learning opportunities since the first grants in 2010. Since then, more than \$162,000 has been granted to 164 ASD educators. TIG grants provide funding for teachers, school counselors, coaches, and nurses to develop original in-class or extracurricular projects

that inspire students to go beyond routine day-to-day learning. Grant recipients are chosen on a competitive

basis with grants of up to \$1,200 per applicant.

This year marks the Foundation's first **endowed TIG award**, the **Mrs. Finizzi TIG for English Literature and Journalism.**Mrs. Marguerite Finizzi was a longtime teacher at Harrison-Morton Middle School (1956-65), Dieruff High School (1964-1976), and Allen High School (1976-1996) where she was also adviser to the *Inklings* literary arts magazine and *The Canary* school newspaper. This endowment was established through a gift of Mr. William Choi, WAHS '92, in honor of the 25th anniversary of Mrs. Finizzi's death. Mr. Choi served on *The Canary* and *Inklings* as Editor-in-Chief, and his time with Mrs. Finizzi shaped his life. This gift will ensure a TIG for English Literature or Journalism is awarded each year.

Since TIG is one of the Foundation's most impactful programs, we are especially grateful for donors and sponsors. With a sponsorship of \$1,200, a TIG grant can be underwritten with an individual, family, or business name to publicly recognize support of ASD educators and students.

Conduit Gifts

Students are athletes!

The ASDF supports and encourages independent gifts which will benefit the Allentown School District and its students, and which fall outside of the Foundation's strategic priorities, programming and normal fundraising efforts. Known as pass-through for tax purposes, the Foundation distributes these contributions for the benefit of the school district at the direction of the donor.

This year the Foundation served as a conduit for more than \$104,000 in charitable gifts and grants for the

District. The William Allen Alumni Association had forty-six contributors who raised funds to support the WAHS Alumni website (https://www.williamallenalumniassociation.org/). The Louis E. Dieruff High School (DHS) Class of 1970 began a project that has expanded to include thirty-one alumni and members of the community raising funds to design and construct the Donald R. Marushak Outdoor Education Center under the leadership of Mr. Rob Bell. The Mr. Roy Arlotto Stage Lighting project at DHS was completed with donations including \$40,000 from The Harry C. Trexler Trust. Allentown school director Nick Miller initiated a fundraiser to help renovate the DHS and WAHS weight rooms.


