# Leadership Message

Dear Friends,

On November 5, 2019, the Allentown School District Foundation (ASDF) will be observing its 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary. During the past ten years, we have raised more than \$3,500,000 to support the Foundation's transformative programs. To those who have provided their gifts of support – either as donors or volunteers, and many times both – you know the hard work that it has taken to get this far. We are solely reliant on gifts and grants and we are sincerely grateful for everyone's support.

I believe ASDF is needed now more than ever. Our students, teachers and staff recognize the value of the program funding we provide in many areas that cannot be fully funded due to the financial constraints at the district level. Here are some of our key accomplishments during the past academic year:

- The ASDF provided positive educational experiences for more than 10,000 students.
- Our Teacher Innovation Grant program provided funding for 25 teachers, known as TIG Fellows, permitting them to create innovative programs and projects for 3,118 Allentown students (see page 7).
- Our literacy program trained 90 reading volunteers who visited kindergarten classrooms once a week.
- The ASDF Board approved a new strategic plan on June 6, 2018 dedicated to improving and strengthening its commitment to programs in science, literacy, music, visual arts, teacher innovation grants as well as providing scholarships for graduating seniors. It is important to note that the Foundation's programs support the five strategic areas which are part of the Allentown School District's Strategic Framework.
- Three new board members were elected to the ASDF Board of Directors: Don Hinkle, Kay Kurtz and Angela Nolan. These Allentonians bring an amazing abundance of experience and commitment to an already outstanding board.
- Board giving has remained at 100% and has increased 244% since two years ago.
- Our finance team remains focused on accountability, with filings of the ASDF official audit and Form 990 consistently on track.
- On September 19, 2018, we held our first Recognition Breakfast at the Barristers Club to honor volunteers, donors and supporters. More than 120 attended the event as we recognized four outstanding citizens as Champions of Education to thank them all for their incredible support (see the back cover).
- The ASDF serves as a valuable conduit for donors who wish to make charitable contributions which benefit the school district. For example, donors have made substantial charitable contributions through the Foundation for the new Learning Dome at Dieruff High School and for playground improvement at several schools.
- With enthusiasm and dedication, the Foundation's professional staff is operating at a level necessary to continue and to improve its programs and services. We can always do more, and that is why we appreciate your support.

The Foundation has a lot more work to do. As I cycle off the ASDF Board of Directors, I relinquish my presidency to Dan Bosket, who was elected on June 6, 2019 to serve in this capacity. I have known Dan for a long time and I know he will provide the leadership necessary to continue on our path of sustained support for our Allentown kids, and educators. Thank you for believing in our mission.

# Elementary School Programs



In the Allentown elementary schools, ASDF programs focus on literacy, arts, and music. With student families representing more than 50 countries, achieving English literacy is an important priority. ASDF recruits volunteer

readers to support the district's **Kindergarten Reading Program**. 91 volunteers visited kindergarten classrooms on a weekly basis. The Lehigh Parkway ES program **"I Am on a Bookshelf,"** students are taught to think

creatively and to write their own books which were published and displayed at a public event at the Whitehall Barnes & Noble bookstore. The Foundation allocated resources to Newcomer Academy to fund **art and music residencies** that specifically benefitted elementary students who had moved to the city from Puerto Rico in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria. Fourth and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students at Central ES visited the Da Vinci Science Center and Cedar Crest College through the program **An Allentown Adventure**, which was inspired by the book of the same name by ASD teacher Janice Altieri. Participating students learned about the

history of their city and memorialized their experiences by creating works of art. At Muhlenberg ES, 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students enjoyed a **sculpture residency** with Francis Beaty during spring 2019 that inspired various creative art projects. ASDF funds for **music** programs providing opportunities for students to learn how to play instruments and how to perform. In 2018 – 2019, 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students were able to play the **flutophone** and gain valuable experience learning how to read music.

## Middle School Programs



ASDF programs in the middle schools help students to explore, create and expand their horizons as they begin to consider their future. For the 6<sup>th</sup> year, the ASDF has supported **National History Day**, which challenges students to engage in research and create history papers and presentations often using digital and multimedia resources. Muhlenberg College's Trexler Library hosted a student research day, offering academic support and the free use of library resources. To underscore this year's theme, "Triumph & Tragedy in History," Holocaust survivor, Marion Blumenthal Lazan, addressed 502 students from Raub and Trexler in a passionate retelling of her life (see photo left). **The Science Fair** introduced 636 students to the scientific method of inquiry as they developed original projects in the program's 6<sup>th</sup> year. 125 students competed in the Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science (PJAS) program, including 110 at the middle school level, and 29 ASD students won first place. Founded by Lee Butz, the **Allentown DRIVE**

baseball program recruits students to learn not only how to play the game, but also to learn the values of teamwork, sportsmanship and hard work. The South Mountain Mountaineers were this year's champions, beating the Trexler Bulldogs 15-5 in the championship game at Coca-Cola Park. The program has expanded to the elementary schools. The Raub Video Club received a MacBook computer donation, and students toured the facilities of the donor, Vistacom. The new computer will improve the students' technical abilities next year when they once again participate in the **"What's So Cool About Manufacturing?"**, a competition for which they produced an award-winning video about local manufacturer Crayola Inc. Three middle schools, under the direction of mural artist Matt Halm, contributed to a large ASD districtwide **mural project** in the making. The **MS Strings** program with El Sistema enabled 30 young musicians at Raub to receive violin lessons and play weekly as an integrated group. Students learn Latin dances like the salsa, merengue, and bachata each year through the **Latin Dance program**, which culminates in a head-to-head middle school dance competition in November. Additionally, a donation from Wells Fargo permitted the Foundation to offer Lehigh County Technical Institute summer camp scholarships to ASD students who then had the opportunity to attend a hands-on career-related camp.

# High School Programs



ASDF high school programs emphasize the talents and creativity of Allentown students. The **ASD Science Fair**, **Concert on the Plaza**, **A Cappella Fest**, and many other community events, showcased academic, musical and artistic excellence during the past year. 189 high school students took part in this year's ASD intra-district science fair, during which participants presented their projects. The signature fundraising event for the ASD Foundation was, once again, **HIGH NOTES**, the dinner and student revue held annually at Miller Symphony Hall. Net proceeds support the operations of ASDF as well as gifts for each middle and high school performance group. This year's gala featured 21 middle school and 104 high school students. Students were rewarded for their hard work with a Broadway trip, sponsored by ASDF, to see the musical, **Prom**. Dieruff High School's select choir performed at **A Cappella Fest** in Muhlenberg College's Empie Theatre, with proceeds benefitting music programs at both Allen and Dieruff.



Significant contributions from donors such as the Major League Baseball Foundation's Baseball Tomorrow Fund, IronPigs Charities, Reviving Baseball in the Inner Cities (RBI), Scott's and Butz Enterprises were used to renovate the Union Terrace and **William Allen Canary**



**Baseball Fields**, including brand new dugouts for the Canaries. Additionally, the Dieruff High School's closed planetarium was repurposed into an exciting, interactive **Learning Dome**. The project, led by AHS graduate Lee Butz, garnered wide community support and raised more than \$475,000. Programs and projects such as these celebrate the potential of ASD students, giving them extraordinary opportunities to learn and share their talents and resources with the community.

# 2018-2019 Teacher Innovation Grants



The ASDF awarded 20 Teacher Innovation Grants (TIG) to 25 TIG Fellows, totaling \$20,358, selected from a pool of 38 competitive proposals. The grants funded projects involving literacy, social studies, life skills, physical education, STEAM, music, three cross-curricular projects in 11 ASD schools. As one of the Foundation's signature programs, TIG grants have made a difference in ASD classrooms since the first small grant in 2010.

TIG grants provide funding for teachers, school counselors, coaches, and nurses to develop original in-class or extracurricular projects that inspire ASD students to go beyond routine day-to-day learning. Grant recipients are chosen on a competitive basis with grants up to \$1,200 per applicant awarded this school year. Contributions from the Donley Foundation and the Bill Suga Memorial Fund helped to make grant funding possible and volunteers on the TIG Committee made the selection process enormously successful.

# Senior Scholarships

The following 2019 graduating students received 69 scholarships through the ASD Foundation, all funded through the generous gifts of enlightened donors. Endowed scholarships (**in blue**) are those in which the gift is invested and a portion of its income (Endowment Distribution Rate: 3.0%) is awarded. The principal for endowed scholarships must be at least \$10,000 and cannot be expended so that the scholarship will be awarded in perpetuity. The funds are managed by a professional fund manager and supervised by the ASDF Investment Committee. Expendable scholarships (**in black**) are those in which the gift, or a portion determined by the donor, is awarded annually. A total of \$60,153.50 was awarded to 52 students in 2019.

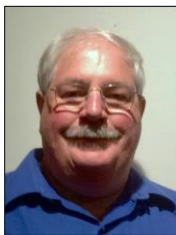

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# Louis E. Dieruff Alumni Association



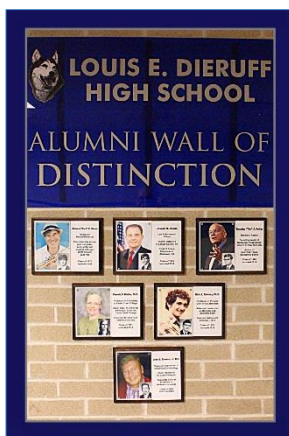
We sure love our traditions here at "Husky High".

There is a humorous line in *Fiddler on the Roof* during Tevye's song about Traditions. After describing numerous traditions, he says, "You may ask, 'how did this tradition start?' I'll tell you - I don't know. But it is a tradition."

In contrast to Tevye's response, we do know how many of the traditions at Dieruff High School began. We created them! Our active Alumni Association continues to embrace and nurture those traditions. And, we proudly launch new ones.

One of our most treasured traditions is singing the Dieruff Alma Mater, with passion. Back in 1959 when Dieruff first opened its doors, Mr. Peter Carpenter composed that anthem, and it still warms the hearts of our faithful alumni.
